## NUMEROUS REPORTS OF DAZZLING OBJECT OVER BRISTOL

On the evening of November lith, 1960 numerous reports of a brilliant object were received by local newspapers and police in the vicinity of Bristol. Information at LUPORO's disposal at prespent does not give enough detail for a verdict to be given. Most reports were received at about 8.45 pom, but it is possible that more than one object was seen. To spotlight the confusion, here is a quote from a long report in the Western Daily Press the following day: "It passed clean over Bristol, covering a dead straight line from north to south, or south to north. Opinions varied as to the direction." Reports were received over a 65 mile area, and here are just a few eyewitness accounts:

Mr. Leonard Payne, ambulance controller, 5, Fernsteed Road, Bishopsworth; "A ball of fire against the black sky - the brightest thing I have ever seen. It had a long blue tails and looked enosmors.

An eyewitness on Backwell Hill: "It was just like a flash of lightning. It was travelling very fast."

Mr Gordon Dewey: 52, Hazelbury Road, Keynsham: "It was shaped like a long silver cigar. The trail was white, ending in red sparks and it went with a "wooshing sound."

A Hilton Meteorological office spokesman: "The flash Khuminecho the whole building like a sudden shaft of moonlight." He said he thought it was a meteor, but admit ted "You cant be too sure."
R.A.F. Iyneham: "Ie were amazed at the strength of the flashbut our radar screens weren't 'on the air" at the time."

Another separate report, very similar, appeared in some London daily newspapers on the 12th. Captain J. Tasty Beresford, Knock Camp, warminster wilts: "h brilliant wite flash lit the sky and temporarinly blinded me. It remained stationary for af e second e, then $1 t$ moved to the north, leaving a wake of white sparks."

Here are some of the comments from the authorities when confronted with the question "What is it?":-
 a large meteorite or a satelite entering the earth 's atmosphere." The Air winistry Operations Centre: "It could have been a large jet airoraft with a condensation trail behind it, one of our jets was in the area at the time, but we can't account for the blue flash."

Another comment accredited to the Air Ministry: "We have no knowledge that a satellite of ane description has entered the earth's atmosphere - but the only other possibility is a larse meteorite."

It is hoped that further details, following investigation by LUFORO, san be given in the next issue of tre Bulletin. Perhaps we will then know what colour it was, whether it did stop, and if it was travelling north or south, or bo th:

RADAR CONFIRINS MANCHESTER SIGHTING

Hazel Grove residents Mr. \& Mrs. Cooke ( 87 , Mill Lane, Hazel Grove, Stockport) and a visitor Mr . Hobday (17,E1gin Drive, Sale, Cheshire) saw a large golden sausage-shaped object on October 28th,1960.

It was seen for five minutes at about midnight, and no sound was heard. It was mainly gold, but had a blue secondary colour from the rear and was of a blurred shape.

It was estimated that the object was hovering at 5,000 feet and then moved in a SSW direction at very high speed. They all egreed it was not an aeroplane.

Mr. H.Bunting,Grad.I.E.E., President of the Direct Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena, investigated the sighting, and interviewed another person at a nearby establishment. He gave Mr. Bunting information about the sighting, on condition that when used, his name and place of work were not revealed. "Tithout any prompting, past year, doing right angle turns at - high speed. The man, naturally, is a

- firm believer in UFOs.

The explanation put forward by a spokesman at Manchester Airport Meteorological Office (quoted in the $\mathbb{E} v-$ ening Chronicle, 29/10/60) that the object could have been a balloon, sent up by Liverpool Radio Sonde Station at Aughton, which had risen high enough so that it was reflecting the rays of the SUN, is absurd as the sighting was at midnight late in October: he was able to give time, date, duration, place etc., of the sighting, expleining thet it was tracked on radar at $30,000 \mathrm{~m} \cdot \mathrm{p} \cdot \mathrm{h}$. .

GLOWING OBJECT OVER COVENTRY

A long cylindrical object, glowing white and about four times the size of the fuselage of a big airliner, was reported sighted at Coventry on December 2na, 1960, at 4.15 p.m..

It was seen by a number of men at Telephone House, Coventry, where it was wetched through binoculars for about five minutes, moving in a scuthwesterly direction.

Mr. Hobbs, area engineer, reported the sighting to the "Coventry Evening Telegraph ${ }^{\text {s }}$ which quotedhim as saying that they had seen a "very big puff of smoke followed by several smaller purfs".

Despite the description of the object, there were people who suggested that it was a Russian sputnik. A check by astronomer H.C. Wiles showed that a sputnjk would have been on a west to east course, and not a swor course as was the UFO. But John Frien-

ds, Coventry's weather expert, told the 'paper thet "unusual things can be seen when the setting sun is shining on an aircraft. I saw an object which I took to be en aircraft just to the right of the planet Venus, which was exceptionally bright last night."

Just in case any readers were still doubtful he added "the American belloon would have been over this country just after 4 p.m. yesterday."

SIGHTING AT WALTON-ON-NAZE
```

Mr. Michael Rockett, of Lytton Avenue, Enfield, while on holiday with friends at Walton-on-Naze, Essex, saw what they thought might be a "flying saucer".

The sighting cccured at 1.40a.m. on September 4 th, and the object wes shaped like a light bulb and luminous. He thought at first that it must have been one of the pier lights, but as he walked with his friends for about twen-. ty minutes the object seemed to follow them. Then it stopped and from it came a beam of light, not very strong, that light up the sea in front of them. He described it as "mst uncanny". Then the light shut off, the object turned south, and then disappeared at great speed towards the north-west. As it passed, they distinctly heard the throb of engines.

The night before, they had seen two oval objects fly rapialy over the sea at 11.30 p.m..

Mr. E.W. Algar, a Walton crastguard, said that a similar object was seen by the three light vessels and coast-guerds some menths age.

Witnesses were interviewed by LUFORO investigator, Mr. B.L. Wright.

Elstree Aero Club, electric pylons, an experimental rocket plant and a reservoir are all in the near vicinity. Mrs. Aaron is familiar with aircraft lights and has flown many times with her husband, an aircraft pilct.

She stated that it was definitely ' unworldy' and could not sleep any

Following the publication in LUFORO BULLETIN (No.6) of the Evenlode Incident, when strange circles appeared in à field at Evenlode, much interest has been shown, and news of similar occurences has reached us.

Here is an extract from a letter sent by Roger G. Myld:
"I was very interested to read of the 'Evenlode Incident, as my father saw something rather similar near the Ivinghoe Hills about 2 years ago. To put it briefly, it appeared to be a perfectly circular depression in the middle of long grass, surrounded by almost impenetrable undergrowth. It was about thirty feet across, and, although the centre clump was still standing, the rest was lying flat - but all facing outwards, as it were.
" In other words it radiated out-" wards from the centre like spokes from the hub of a wheel. There were no tracks or signs to be seen to indicate that anyone or anything had been there previously. ${ }^{9}$

SAUCER NETS, the American publication, printed the results of our investigation of the circles together with the following interesting report:

## EVIDENGE OF UFO LANDING IN TENNESSEE

"In a case somewhat similar to several others in the past few years, a circle appeared mysteriously on the ground overnight - this time in the front yard of a home in Martin, Tennessee. Miss Josephine Damron, who lives with her mother and brother near Martin, told reporters thet on the morning of June $30 t h$ she ncticed what she first believed to be mole workings in her yard. Upon closer examination, she saw that it was a perfect circle with its circumference a black greasy substance about six to eight inches in diameter. It looked a bit like oil, but when touched felt like car grease. However, after drying out in the sun, the substance had a'cherred beady effect, according to the witnesses. The circle was measured and found to be almost exactly fifteen feet in diameter.
"Since that time, two other such
circles have appeared elsewhere in the vicinity of hartin, and none heve been explained."

Whatever the thing was, it was burning with an intense heat, and the owner of the house on which it landed ves unable to extinguish it. By the time firemen put the blaze out, there was little left of the UFO to investigate. It is thought to have been about 15 inches in diameter, but no one knows whet gas flcated it or what cause the fire.
"A similar incident cccurred in Winston-Salem several months previously. Said Fire Chief w. N. Dixon, :We? there's any way to do it?."

LaRGE YELLOT DISC FILMED OVER SAULT, CANADA.

The foilowing UFO report is reprinted from Saucers, Space \& Science, the excellent Canadian macazine edited by Gene Duplantier, (125, Woodycrest Avenue, Toronto 6, Ontario, Canada.) It is a report,special to s.s. \& s, by Norman R. Ouellette, Saweer Observation Club.

About noon, in the last week of June 1960, six jets were flying over Sault Ste. Marie, ontario. They flew in formation, three on each side of the sky. The sun meanthile was ne arly overhead. Suddenly an object came very swiftly between them across the sky and apparently broke the sound barrier. It was reported on radio station CJIC the same day that the objest wss an unidentified plane(not shaped as our own).

Mrs. Arthur Kinizel, a resident of Sault was watching the je te from her backyard. She admired the diamond shape pattern the jets made with the ir smoke trails, so she took out her 8 mm Kodak Brownie movie camera. She sterted shooting the desion left by the jets and manared to include also an unknown flying object although at the time she was unaware of it. Tat sky was clear blue and a slight wind prevailed. ween the film was developed, she ran it on her projector.

Mre. Kunzel observed for a little over 5 steonds, a large brisht yellon disc-shaped craft with the smoze trils us its background. Tais film, up to time of riting(Outober, SS\&S) has not yet been shown to the air posce or any otacr autacority.

The SAWCER OBSERVAION CLU 3 of salt Ste. Marie verified that the strace orsft had hiden itself in the sun as tise sun's rays shone near the obiect. Accordine to Mr. Oullette, director of that olub: "This film proves enough thet flying seuccrs exist because of the jet trsils and the objcot."

Four different snapshote were taken of the film at varied positions and are availahle at one dollar per set. write to Mr. Ouellette, 35a, Huason Street, Squit Ste. Marie, Ontario, Canada.

On Aurust 13 th at $10.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. , a 1 gre oval-shaped object was seen over Hollywood. ll.45: State policemen stanley seott and Charles Carson cruising near Corning, south of Red Bluff sees same or similsr object. At first they took it to be en airliner, but then saw it had no inss. A red light shoned at each end, and several white lights were seen on the side.

It was moving at a low altitude, and as the officers halted their cer it stopped in mid-air, reversed dircetion and aceelerated. After olimbing efey hundred feet it stopyed and hovered. Twice the object approached the police car, one red liwht sucepins the ground like a secrohlizht. One of the officers angled their red light up towarde the object ohich suerved away. Durine the sighting a static-like roar drowned the police radio.
 object performed feats which were absolutely unbelievable After a time, a second UFO joined the first. The remained together a while, fleshing their red lirhts occasionally. Then they he dded eastward and disappeared."

At midnight, after the officers had sent their first flee sh, the rear station st Red. Bo wi. confirmed, the. UPO. report for the press. The San Prenoisco rimminer: The Ted Bluff radar station admitred that at $11.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. , saturday, when the phenomenon was first seen by hichoay patrolmen, it vas tracing 'an object'".

The Corning Daily Observer: "One of the objects was spotted on the radar scope at the AT radar station ne rr Red Bluff... This morning the reds station monas considerant more vague then it was Saturday, nirht then it confirmed the officers' report of the object.
 EXPIANATION, TAKEN FROM "NICAP SP CI AT, BUILETIN" (Oct.1960) PRINTED BELOw?!
"In utter disregard of astronomical records, the Ap haas issued an impossible explanation of the August $13-14$ UFO sightings in the vicinity. of Red Bluff, California. The Red Bluff case ineluded a dramatic encounter by state police, visual reports by orther witnesses, and an Ar radar station's admission that it had tracked 'En object' at the time of the state police sighting.

Answering a NICAP request for the AF conclusions, the off icial spokesman on UFOs, Lt. Col.L.J.Tacker, sent this signed statement:
"The individuals concerned wi thessed a refraction of the planet wars and the two bright stars Alderouran and Betelgeux ( correct spelling: Betelguese)...Not only was there a temperature inversion but during part of the time double inversions existed." A check on August 13-14 star positions by NICAP astronomioal advisor reveals these facts:

1. Hers and the two stare were below the horizon, invisible when police sighted the UPO t 11.15p.m., Aurust luth.
2. nara did not appear until an hour later. Aldebaran was just visible shove the horizon at 1 gem. August 1 s, end Betelause did not rise until ne ry. 3 arm.

It is ahsointoly impossible for Mars, sigeharsn. or Betcleuese to have been the URO seen from 11.15 to 12.45 , August 13-1A, nor could they in any may explain the relatively low $\bar{\sim} I$ titude radar tracking.

Apparemtly the $A$ rambled that no one would check the star positions, when the v risked this answer. Probable reasons:

1. To kill this important new report sid stop the rowing prese interest in the nev wave of siontinrs.
2. To avert sn g speculation that the Red Bluff UPO come from the orbiting 'mystery object' tracked by astronomical observatorices and the space Surveillance Control Centre. (NICAP, 1J36, Connecticut Avenue N.W., Washington 6. D.C., U.S.A.)

FOLLOWING the resignation of Mr . H . Bunting as Editor and Vice-President of Manchester U.F.O. Research Society, Mr. R. Miller-Lawson will edit their publication "Outer Space Review".

GRAY BARKER did nct go up in a flying saucer after all. The offer sent him, and many otheris, fell through, but he has been told that he will be given the opportunity in the future.

## DR. DONALD H. NENZEL, skeptic of

 UFOS has admitted that he failed to get all the factual evidence before explaining away important sightings.CAPTAIN EDTARD J. RUPPELT, former chief of the U.S. Air Force investigation project and author of "The Report on Unidentified Flying objects ${ }^{\text {P }}$ has issued a statement to the press reversing his former beliefs. His book came down on the side of extra-terrestrial space-craft, although it remained inconclusive. Ancther edition of the book has been printed with chapters contradicting previous opinions.

THE CANADTAN NATIONAL Research Council is still puzzling over a radar sighting reported by a patrolling B-29 bomber pilot. Interpreted, the object would be some sort of space ship ten miles long.

On the night that the object lit up the sky over Bristol, Friday, November llth, (see page one) the same or a similar object was seen passing over Mid-Cornwall. Mr. A.C. Purton of St. Erme sent the following report taken from November 17th issue of the mwest Briton".
"Seen in the Night Sky
"Railwaymen at work, or going to work on Monday at 4.30 a.m. report a brilliant flash at that time. Mr. Bob Harris of Wheal Busy signal box said he had never experienced anything like it. Mr. Kenneth Magar of Chacewater, a signalman at Probus, said he was passing through Aloweth wien he heard an explosion, and thensaw a rocket-like streak tearing across the sky in a southerly direction, leaving a trail of smoke.
"A ball of fire which those who saw it believe may have been a large meteorite lit up the sky over Mid-Cornwall on Friday night, Mr. D.J. Hick, a Chacewater butcher, said it bathed his van in a bluish-white light which lasted about tornty seconds. When extinguished it left a glowing trail in the sky. 'It looked like a huge rocket, except that it was much too big for a firework' he said. At the same time television viewers throughout the area had a bright white band across their screens. Observed at Troon and Redruth it appeared to many as a powerful flash of lightning.
"On Saturday night, the intense light of the aurora borealis was visible in most parts of Cornwall."

The above is very similar to a report, sent by M. P.W. Matthews, taken from the "Western Evening Herald"(Plymouth), l4th January 1959, which reads:

"A brightly-lit sphere in the sky, seen by people living in three different areas of Devon and Cornwall early yesterday morning, was thought by service auth.. orities to be "more than likely a meteorite".
"Mr. Albert Edward Jaccbs, of 20,Julian Street, Cattedorm: Plymouth, said he was just leaving for work at $4.50 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$, when he glanced upwards. There was a large sphere over the Sound. It was very bright and lit up the clouds.

While he watched, although there was no sound, what appeared to be a rocket was projected from it. This travelled a couple of miles and then went out. The light from the sphere went out, too.

> "Falling to Earth
"When leaving his lodging at Trehyllys, Probus, yesterday, Mir. Norman Hendy, a signalman at Probus signal-box, saw what he took to be a flash of lightning, but as the flashing continued, he looked skyward and observed a ball of flame with a blue tail', which appeared to be falling to earth. Flashes were coming from the tail. The spectacle lasted for about thirty seconds. A similar object travelled slowly and silently scarcely 150 feet over callington early yesterday morning.
"It was seen by $\mathbb{N r}$. and Mrs. John Higmen, caretakers of the County Primary School. They described it as similar in shape to a tadpole。 The hy d was all lit up like a ball of fire while the tail was aglow with rainbow colours.
"The sight of the thing startled us?, said Mr. Higman, and we stood and watched it travel overhead. ""
