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Experts baffled by UFO sightings

MORE tales of the unexplained are doing the rounds in Waltham Forest.

Following reports of ghostly goings-on at The Village pub come claims of UFO sightings.

Painter and decorator Tony Golbourne, of Wigton Road, Walthamstow, says he saw a large orange object hovering in the sky when he looked out of his bedroom window in the middle of last Monday night.

Said Tony: "It looked bigger than a dinner plate if you held it up against the window. I have never seen anything like it."

He said it could not have been the moon as there was a new moon in the sky last week.

"People tend to think you're pulling their leg or you're a raving nutcase if you tell them these things but in all my life I have never seen anything like what I saw the other night.

"I was shocked and a little bit frightened."

This is not the first time Tony has seen unidentified objects floating above Walthamstow.

In the summer he said that he had on several occasions seen a blinding white sphere edging towards him from the north.

However, at that time in July, a meteor shower was passing through the solar system, leaving a trail of white light in its wake.

But Tony is not the only one to have seen strange and unexplained events. Chingford resident Melinda Gooding, of Kingsley Gardens, told the Guardian that she saw a blinding white light in the sky on Sunday evening.

Roy Lake, of the local branch of London UFO Studies, said he was quite concerned at the recent happenings.

"I have a feeling there's something going on, particu-

larly in Walthamstow," he said. "There has been a lot of activity in the skies recently."

A spokesman for the Met Office in London said that it had received no reports of strange sightings.

The police, too, have heard nothing. Inspector Chris Jackson at Chingford told the Guardian: "There's been no talk of it. We would expect to have heard of something like that."

London UFO Studies holds its next meeting on November 24, at the Unity Hall, Bramley Close, Walthamstow.

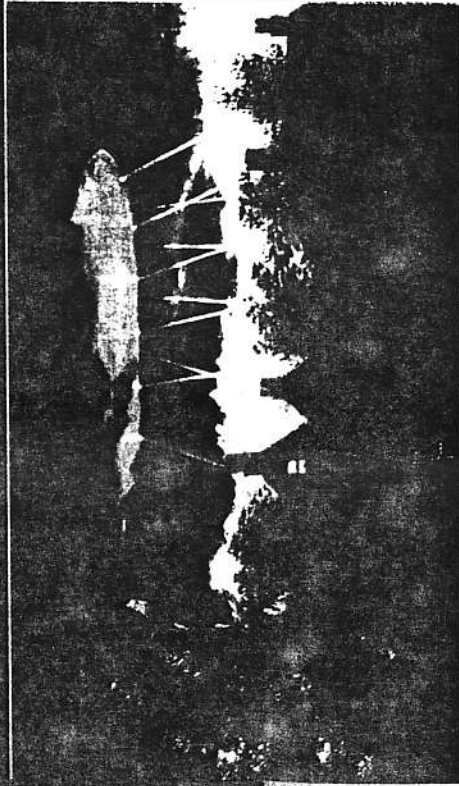

Fire in the sky

Just what was the strange object a York artist saw in the sky on the night of the Minster fire? Was it a UFO? SIMON RITCHIE reports

YHarner cannot forget what he saw in the sky on the night of the Minster fire. It has haunted him ever since, but only now has he decided to talk openly about it. The 55-year-old from Dunsborough Avenue has even recorded his experience on canvas.

"It is something that I've never forgotten and I never will," he said. It was 11pm on Sunday, July 8, 1984. It was pouring with rain and Royce and his wife Heather were returning home after a night out with friends in Malton. "We got to near the golf club on Malton Road when my wife shouted 'What the hell's that?'" "I pulled in, wound the window down and looked up. I could not believe what I saw. "There was a very large elliptical object, dull orange in colour which was pulsating. It had a definite edge to it. It had a clear shape. "It was stationary about 200ft above the ground. It was windy so the clouds were passing over it.

"We were watching in awe for about a minute or so, then beams of light came out of the object at angles, just like someone had turned on a switch. "They were the same width all the way down. They did not fan out as a torch light would do. Then it went behind the clouds and we could not see it anymore. "Royce then drove round the corner to their home in Dunsborough Avenue. "We looked again but we could not see anything. We thought it might have come down somewhere. "During the night I kept getting up and looking out of the window. It was not until the morning that I found out about the Minster fire. "I read in the Press at the time about a number of people who had seen strange objects in the sky that night and were ridiculed at the time. My wife said to say something but I did not want to be labelled a crank. "It was only when I read the recent articles on UFOs in the Evening Press that I thought I would come forward. "I had an open mind on the subject of UFOs until that night. "Van driver Eddie Acaster, of

Huntington, claimed to have seen an 'orange-coloured' Zepplin like object moving fast over York at 10.30pm - half an hour before Royce's sighting. "Taxi driver Bill Whitbread saw a similar object hover over the Minster at 2am the following morning. "A short time later the building caught fire. If it generally believed lightning was to blame. What was it?

BRYAN Marlowe took this amazing photograph of a UFO flying over Acomb, York. He was out walking in a field off Aakham Lane with his son Raymond, a former Royal Air Force crew member, when the object came into view. "It was about 1,500ft high and travelling with a wobbly, revolving motion at about 50mph in a north-westerly direction," said Mr Marlowe, 65, of Otterwood Lane, York. "The object gave off an incandescent glow and appeared to be constructed of a highly polished, almost translucent, white metal. It was completely soundless in flight and did not emit any exhaust or vapour trails." Mr Marlowe took a second photograph as it

accelerated away to the north-west until it was no longer visible. He had his camera with him as he wanted to take some pictures of a bull in a field. The sightings took place at 3.30pm on Monday, August 17. He forgot about the film until a few days ago when he got it developed. He is now going to send the photographs to Ground Sauter Watch, USA, and the British UFO Research Association. He added: "My son, who has flown many hundreds of hours as aircrew in RAF transport aircraft, has seen all manner of flying objects, including Iraqi Patriot missiles, and is convinced that the object we saw and photographed was alien to this planet."

I've seen a UFO, villager tells police

A WORRIED villager alerted police last night after he spotted a suspected UFO hovering in the skies over Norfolk.

The man telephoned officers at Great Yarmouth claiming he saw the flashing blue and white star-shaped disc above Freehorpe.

He told police the mystery object was in the area for about 30 minutes before it moved off into the night.

PC Martin Petersen said: "He sounded quite genuine according to the officers who spoke to him. We had no other reported sightings in the area."

ERIC SYKES is 72, stone deaf, virtually blind and is convinced of the existence of UFOs.

"I firmly believe they are observing the Earth, ready to step in to save things so we don't blow the planet away," he said, in a rare interview in a London office shared with Spike Milligan.

"The Government has been concealing evidence and has put a lid on it.

"Do you know in America you can insure yourself against being abducted and they've had a claim already?" says the comic, whose third novel is entitled, *UFOs Are Coming Wednesday*.

Of today's comic talents Rory Bremner is a favourite: "He is absolutely brilliant, as are Victoria Wood and Paul Merton. I like Rowan Atkinson but wish he hadn't done *Mr Bean*. I think it's dreadful.

"If he walks down the street and gets hit on the head, he over reacts.

"In reality if an Englishman

walks down the street and gets hit, the first thing he does is look around to see if anyone saw it. Then he rubs his head."

Sykes wears glasses with no glass (they are a sophisticated hearing aid) and spends much of his time writing scripts.

But his sight is so poor he can no longer read. So he writes in blocks and has chunks read out to him for revision.

He does not strike one as a recluse, so I grill him about that breakfast. He reveals: "I have three spoonfuls of a kind of bran they give horses. It's a bit like sand."

I am left none the wiser.

UFO mystery baffles city

NORWICH was today at the centre of a baffling UFO mystery over this spectacular picture which has gripped the nation.

The silent, biscuit-shaped object was captured by stunned Glen Webster on his camcorder in the sky above Mile Cross.

Experts are now examining the tape in a bid to discover exactly what 32-year-old Glen saw from his window.

The unemployed painter and decorator today revealed reading the *Evening News* prompted him to tell of his sighting.

The amazing film has surfaced just days after we told how motorist Nick Colman was tracked by a mysterious light near Avlsham.

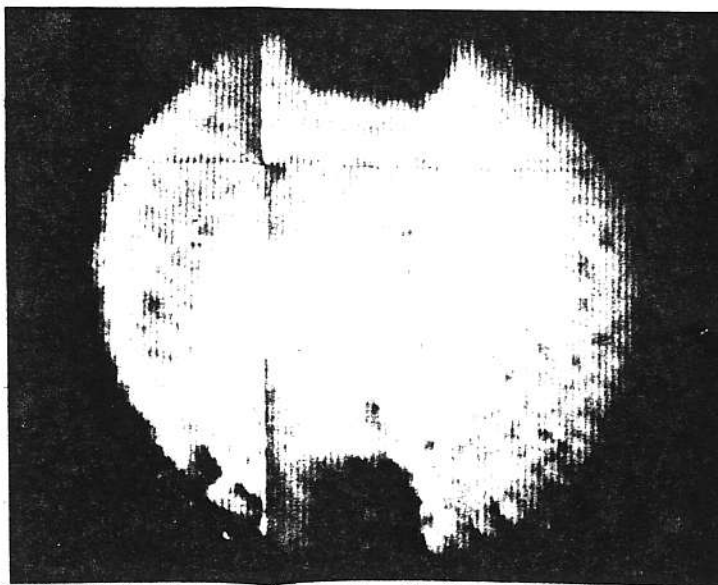
The sightings have reopened the UFO debate and left everyone wondering if there really is something out there.

Glen scrambled across his room to grab his camcorder and capture the mystery object, zig-zagging above his home.

He ran outside to get a better shot before it headed off towards Great Yarmouth. But he did not even look at it again until after he had filmed bonfire night celebrations.

Father-of-two Glen, of Applevard Crescent, said: "If it hadn't been for the stories in the *Evening News*, I wouldn't have had the confidence to tell anyone about it.

"I had got the camcorder for bonfire night and it was only when I was showing the tape to my parents that they convinced

The specialist noticed two smaller background objects which could also be UFOs.

The minute-long film shows a black object in three segments passing across a yellow axe-head shape. It spins rapidly before zooming to the night.

The film original, which has already been copyrighted, has been sent to UFO boffins.

Experts say it bears a striking similarity to a sighting in New Zealand in 1978.

Glen's sighting is being linked with two others on the same night revealed by the *Evening News* this week.

Expert Ian Simmons, British editor of the *Fortean Times*, which records strange phenomena, watched the video.

Mysteries in sky help swell ranks of UFO spotters

"Nobody knows where they are coming from but so many of the descriptions are consistent and fit a pattern so we are trying to investigate them all."

The current obsession with UFOs caused many people in Moseley and Balsall Heath to call *The Birmingham Post* after strange lights were seen in the sky last week. Police could not

Fantastic lights prove frightening sight for driver

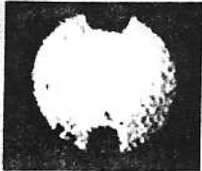

only to discover the light had gone.

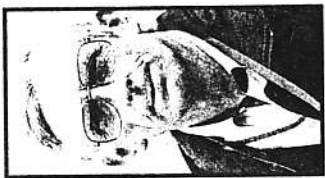
"Then my car lights went off and on again. I looked up and realised this light had gone overhead and was about 200 yards in front of me and about 100ft in the air.

DOZENS of UFO-spotters are flocking to join a new group investigating the mysterious goings-on in the Norfolk skies.

Experts in Norwich say there have been more than 40 reported sightings of strange objects in the region's skies since January.

Society chairman Alex Clark says its membership has increased to 80 in the past few months as more people accept the idea of the unexplained.

The society has launched a probe into two reported sightings at Freethorpe and Aylsham last week.

Alex, a student from Hovingham, said: "We had about 20 members three or four months ago but since then a lot of people have become involved. We have gone from a very amateurish group to a proper society.

"We investigate all reports of sightings. In eight out of 10 sightings we find a rational answer. That could be an aeroplane, military base, boat or helicopter.

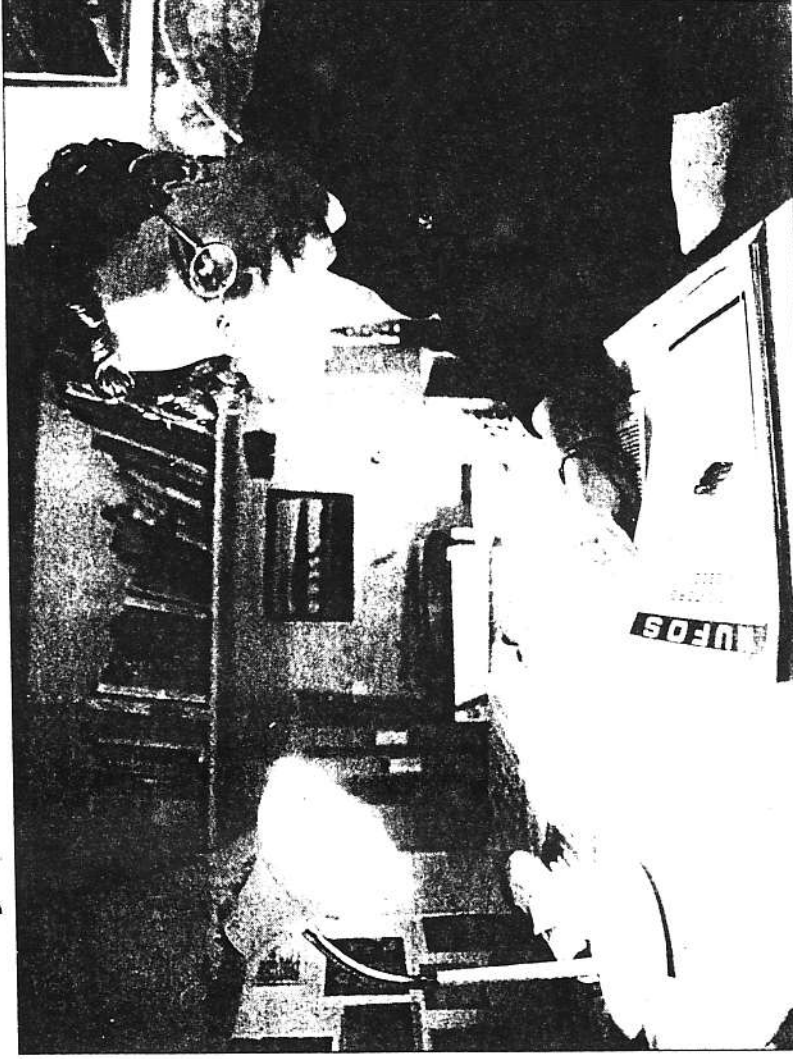

ALIENS have landed in Bonnybridge, if you believe concerned residents who have reported over 2,000 UFO sightings over the last three years. Everything from floating cigar shaped objects to flashing lights have been witnessed in the Scottish sky and the mystery has attracted reporters and scientists from all over the world.

Now, Michael Hutchinson of the UK Skeotics Society, and Simon Hoggart, Guardian columnist, have come together to debunk the myths. As co-authors of *Bizarre Beliefs* published this week, they offer alternative rational explanations to UFOs and a whole heap of other so-called paranormal phenomena. In their drive to uncover "hoaxum and fraud", nothing is safe, from tarot reading to hypnotism, the Bermuda Triangle to the Curse of Tutankhamun.

UFOs get short shrift. "At Bonnybridge, isn't it strange that we have loads of sightings yet none of them tally?" asks Hutchinson. "Most witnesses are well intentioned but misguided, he asserts. "If you really suspect that a flying saucer is about to land in your back yard, you re-

hardly in the best mood for calmly noting exactly what is going on."

The gullibility of the human mind is a key factor in perpetuating belief in paranormal events. The authors make the point that eye witness

reports of little green men only started flooding in after the rise of the black and white gothic horror movie. The first flying saucer was seen in 1947. Our own Loch Ness Monster did not

really begin to create waves of interest until 1933 and no-one was officially abducted by aliens until the Sixties.

Hoaxers play on this gullibility and have long enjoyed manufacturing mysteries. Doctored photographs of UFOs were practically a cottage industry 20 years ago and more recently, crop circles have held the nation in thrall. Despite televised confessions by several of the more prolific hoaxers, many people still believe that crop circles are made by aliens from outer space. "Even intelligent people adore mysteries", explains Hutchinson.

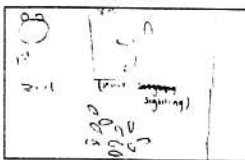
So what's the harm? Hutchinson is adamant that the book is not just for spoilsports: "Holding information back from people is always wrong. I don't really care what people believe but they need to be able to make up their own minds taking into account all the evidence."

Unlikely passion is out of this world

IT WOULD be a lucky alien who closely encountered Tracie Austin.

Tracie has a winning smile, a vivacious personality and an unshakable belief in the existence of extra-terrestrial. And should the inter-galactic traveller wish to acquire a useful earthly skill, she is also an accomplished musician and qualified teacher of the piano.

Tracie Austin is a UFO enthusiast, though you wouldn't think it to look at her. Slim, blonde and attractive, she scarcely gives the impression of someone obsessed with flying saucers and strange lights in the night sky.

Yet since she saw an unidentified flying object over London seven years ago, 30-year-old Tracie has developed a passionate interest in the mysterious visions that many of us tend to dismiss as the stuff of bad sci-fi movies.

Tracie is a believer — so much so that next year she is organising N O T I B

Staffordshire's first major UFO conference in 20 years.

Brought up in Birches Head, Tracie attended Carr outside school before taking O and A levels at the Caudor College and studying piano at the Guildhall School of Music in Drama in London.

It was as a student at the Guildhall that she and her boyfriend Karl Hennings — they now run the Rock and Pop Music School in Stou — saw a UFO in broad daylight over the nation's capital.

"We were at the Barbican Centre, just chatting, and when we looked out of the window we both saw this very, very, unusu-

al craft overhead. It was conical in shape, like a dunce's cap. It was floating and rotating and moving very slowly across the sky, emitting a glow.

"I couldn't believe it. I'd never really thought about them before, and I was simply amazed. We watched it until it disappeared, and Karl said it must be something from another planet, or another dimension.

"As both Karl and I had seen it, I knew we couldn't have imagined it. And in any case, the next day the London Evening Standard reported that loads and loads of other people had seen it too."

"That absolutely convinced me. After that there was no doubt in my mind that UFOs exist. We

talked to our friends about it and some said they'd seen UFOs themselves. Even an aunt of mine said she'd seen one."

The young musician then began reading up on other UFO sightings and studying published material on the possibility that beings from other worlds regularly enter our terrestrial air space.

She read dozens of books and magazines, studied videos and attended conferences addressed by recognised authorities on the subject. "The more I studied the phenomenon, the more convinced I became that there is intelligent life out there," she told me.

But does she really believe that there are little green men skimming overhead in flying saucers?

She replies that — incredibly — many people claim to have been abducted by aliens, and their accounts contradict the popular conception of the little green men. They tend to be little grey men. "The evidence suggests the typical alien being

is small and greyish white in colour and about the size of a 10-year-old boy. They are very, very thin, with black elliptical eyes which wrap around the side of the head.

"There is a small indent for a nose and a slit for a mouth, according to people who claim to have seen them. There are reports that the 'greys' carry out genetic experiments on the humans they abduct, taking eggs from women and sperm samples from men. Some claim to have seen the hybrids created by these genetic experiments."

So how would Tracie herself feel if she had a close encounter of the "third kind"?

"UFO researchers say there are several types of alien beings visiting our planet. Some are hostile and some are friendly.

"The greys are said to be friendly and if I met one I suppose I'd be half scared and half fascinated. My heart would race a bit — like the time I saw the ghost of a headless woman at the Guildhall school."

At Tracie's conference at the City Museum in Hanley next June, the speakers will include Graham Birdsall, editor of UFO Magazine, and Tony Dodd, an ex-policeman who is director of

Quest International and a world authority on UFOs.

Although orthodox science accepts that the balance of probability is that intelligent life does exist elsewhere in the universe, Tracie admits that some sceptics will find her beliefs eccentric. "Of course some people will think I'm crackers," she told me. "But I would just ask them to stop and think and listen to the evidence."

She says that people who close their minds to the subject are "living in boxes."

"All I would is: if you don't want to come out of your box, at least lift the lid and take a peek outside. You might find something very interesting out there."

MICHAEL ASPEL moves us on from deep sea probes to deep space mysteries in the final edition of *Strange But True?* (Friday, 8.30pm, ITV) as he sifts evidence of visits to this planet by alien craft.

The programme concentrates on UFO sightings by perhaps the most credible class of witness — professional pilots.

The first half provides a potted history of UFO-spotting and includes interviews with serving airline pilots, some of whom say they were put under pressure at the time of sightings not to report what they saw.

The second half recreates the Kaikoura sightings in New Zealand, at an air force base where warrant officer Ian Uffindell noticed what he thought was a freighter hovering above the airfield and seemingly not intending to land.

The control room at Wellington was equally baffled by a second craft on the radar.

Over several days, the UFOs were spotted by pilots and on radar. A local TV news crew hitched a ride on a plane hoping to strike lucky — and did so.

The plane was allegedly pursued by a UFO, and the footage can be seen on the programme.

In August 1978, Captain Lou Cockerill was piloting a routine holiday flight from Gatwick to Malta. What he saw as he flew over Germany still haunts him today.

Cockerill and first officer Paul Coomber spotted a white sphere flying high above them. "It was brilliantly bright," he recalls. "Two identical but smaller objects dropped from it and shot off at speed in opposite directions."

Cockerill quickly radioed Rhine Air Traffic Control. "They claimed they'd seen nothing on radar but we later learned that

identical objects had been spotted over Malta and Italy."

Cockerill describes his close encounter in this week's *Strange But True?*, which reports on the staggering number of UFO sightings made by pilots.

Since 1947, 3000 UFO sightings have been reported by pilots worldwide. But Jenny Randles, one of Britain's leading UFO researchers, believes the figure is higher. "Only one in 10 pilots make a report," she says.

The programme reveals how British officials have tried to silence airline crews. Pilot Graham Shepherd tells how a large metallic disc

flew beneath him near Preston, Lancashire, in 1967. He was told by his senior captain to keep quiet. "He said quite clearly it would compromise our careers," he says.

"I am sure officials keep sightings quiet because they still have no idea what UFOs are," says Jenny Randles. "It's a cover-up of their own ignorance."

She claims that 95 per cent of sightings

can be rationally explained. Cockerill's spheres, however, fall in the other five per cent. "For 17 years, I've wondered what I saw that night," says Cockerill, now 65. "I always used to pooh-pooh UFOs but not now. On starry nights, I look up and wonder who or what really is out there."

He said: "If they were planes refuelling then they must have been travelling sideways to do it.

"It was a perfect night to see

what I and my daughter saw.

"After seeing the lights we saw three civilian aircraft and a military plane but we saw their lights clearly whereas the objects around the lights could not be made out."

Mr Crimliss added: "Whatever the lights were, they did not make any noise.

"Plus, I have seen a video of planes refuelling in mid-air and the lights that Tuesday were not in the same configuration. The

lights were flying low at the same level for a long time and heading from land out to sea. I think the explanation is rubbish."

Mr Crimliss saw the lights above Scalby but others saw them above Sleights, near Whitby, Ravenscar, Burniston and several days later over Malton and Norton.

The spokesman for RAF Staxton Wold said he confirmed the air activity that night with an RAF radar station in Norfolk which said that American F15 fighters were on exercise in the area.

REPORTS of UFOs hovering above York have led to calls from baffled readers who also claim to have witnessed them.

The Yorkshire Evening Press has been inundated with calls following Tuesday's report that bright "flying saucer-shaped" objects had been seen in the York area.

Paul Mortimer, 32, of **Burton Stone Lane**, York, saw a number of unexplained shining lights as he drove from Selby to York at about 4.50pm last Friday.

"I saw one very bright light quite high in the sky as I drove towards Escrick," said Mr Mortimer, a self-employed signwriter. "A second later it had dropped vertically to more or less the height of the tree-line. Then I lost sight of it.

"Further towards Escrick, I saw a light in the shape of an upturned flying saucer, but at a slight tilt. It seemed to glow. It began to flicker and, as it did, two smaller lights emerged from either side. Then they all vanished.

"People thought I was making it up until it was reported in the Press."

Three "flickering" lights were spotted above the A19 between 4.30pm and 5pm the same afternoon by Margaret Batty, of **Barby**, Selby, and her daughter Ruth, of York, who works at Selby District Council's housing department.

"We were looking east when we both saw these lights," said Margaret. "They were there one minute and gone the next."

Caroline Greaves, 26, of **Leeman Road**, along with a friend and her three children, saw three lights in the direction of Clifton at about 5.15pm last Friday.

"They were brighter than fluorescent lights," she said. "There was a big one, a medium one and a small one, like a mother duck and her ducklings.

"We saw them coming towards us for about three minutes and then they were stationary for another four minutes. There was no noise.

"I wasn't frightened, I was very calm about it. I have an open mind on the subject of UFOs, but I now believe that something is going to happen — and happen soon."

Incident at Roswell

BLACK and white film footage of an alleged alien autopsy is still being talked about some weeks after it was broadcast on television in Britain.

The question is, did mankind receive a visitation from the little white men on July 4, 1947, in the desert near Roswell, New Mexico?

Evidence of extra-terrestriality and anything out of the ordinary will always fan the flames of curiosity. There's nothing we earthlings like better than to speculate on whether there is anybody out there?

UFO fans will be delighted to know that *Incident at Roswell*, the documentary broadcast on Channel 4 this summer, is now available as a video.

If you missed the programme there is now a chance to judge for yourself.

As a baited bonus to those who did, the video carries additional footage of the alleged autopsy carried out on an alien-looking being in 1947. The burning question is, of course, is this genuine?

At the moment experts are looking at the film, examining the materials used and doing everything they can to confirm or deny its authenticity. It was shown as the highlight of

the eighth British UFO Research Association's conference in Sheffield in August.

Incident at Roswell is a fascinating documentary, put together in a most professional way.

But it really raises more questions than it could ever hope to answer, most to do with the genuineness of the entire thing. Having run through the tape several times, you do begin to wonder if this is just one long inter-planetary wheeze.

At the end of the video, after the credits, the entire contents of an autopsy is shown. An alleged surgeon pokes and prods and removes an organ or two which conveniently go out of focus as they are brought nearer the camera.

As a documentary, the video is incomplete and inconclusive but as the basis of a talking point for aficionados of the subject it is a rich source.

We could do with some help here to help us to live better and stop being so greedy. My grandad saw a big disc come out of the sky and disappear into the sea off Napoli."



Shop proprietor Nigel Colson, 32, of Bournemouth, said: "I once saw a very bright hovering green light over Badbury Rings while the Druids were there. I was shocked and baffled, I'm sure there are other life-forms out there. An investigation is a good idea. I'm certain the Government knows more than it is saying."



Store manager Phil Francis, 32, of Bournemouth, said: "There's a lot more issues they should give priority to, like education and housing. Seeing is believing. I've never seen a UFO and would like them confirmed with my own eyes. It's not the sort of thing I worry about, I'm more concerned with everyday matters."



Administrator Jayne Francis, 45, of Bournemouth, said: "No money should be spent on this and we should be out of Europe - the sooner the better. This is really wacky. I don't believe in UFOs. There's a cover-up, probably to stop panic."



Shelf stacker Helen Sayles, 32, of Poole, said: "This scheme is a bit wacky. I've heard of people seeing UFOs but I don't think I believe them. I don't take much interest - I just live my life. There are certainly more important things like feeding the world's hungry. I've never seen a UFO and don't expect to."



Retired clerical worker June Taylor, 47, of Westbourne, said: "The first time the subject was taken seriously. When my son was 10 he was shaken by seeing a long, cigar shaped object fly past his window. I also know a driver who was frightened when his coach was stopped by a UFO. His engine wouldn't work until the object left."



Part-time student Pauline Ellingham, 19, of Charminster, said: "I think the governments know more but are scared of major panic. Look what happened with the American radio play War of the Worlds. UFOs are not necessarily anything to be scared of. It's OK for them to study humans as long as it's not me they abduct!"



Retired accountant Alfred Brelsford, 63, of Pokesdown, said: "Anything unexplained is always interesting and some good may come out of research. We must observe priorities and cash spent on saving people dying of cancer is more important. Low level research would be OK as soon as we've sorted out the nation's health."
