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## CE4 - abducted by aliens

ACCORDING to UFOlogy there are five sorts of Close Encounters.

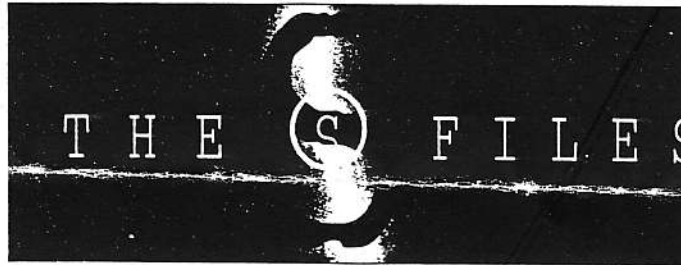
CE1, as first defined by the expert Hynek, is seeing a UFO within 150 yards. CE2 is one where a UFO leaves some form of physical evidence, such as a burn on the ground.

A Close Encounter of the Third Kind (as immortalised in Steven Spielberg's film) is a sighting of an entity associated with a UFO. CE4 is abduction by an alien and CE5 is a direct contact or communication with an alien being or race.

Nick Pope, former UFO desk officer at the Ministry of Defence's Secretariat (Air Staff) 2a claims that the abduction phenomenon is a fact of life.

"The evidence for abductions is so strong as to be virtually undeniable," he says. And in his new book, *The Uninvited*, he lifts the lid on the plethora of accounts he has amassed during his own Fox Mulder-style search for the Truth.

The S-Files was recently contacted by a man from Worthington who believes he was abducted by aliens in 1949, when he was just seven years-old. He now wants



to go through regressive hypnosis to delve deeper into his deeply disturbing experience.

It's a compelling, at times confusing, tale and even Walter (not his real name), who has previously undergone electric shock therapy, still has difficulty coming to terms with what he believes happened to him.

He was off school, recovering from a bout of chicken pox, on the day it happened. Walter remembers the day was sunny and warm and he was wandering through fields near Armathwaite Hall, where he found a quiet spot to lie down under some trees. While staring up at the sky he spotted a black speck, which, believing it to be a fly, tried to swat away at first.

But the speck wasn't a fly at all. As it came closer, Walter saw it was a huge oval craft with three spherical shapes, like metal ball-bearings underneath. And in the middle he remembers seeing a white energy source.

"The next thing I knew was that a black rubbery circle had formed underneath me and there was an intense heat, hotter than the sun could ever be. I was burning, my flesh seemed to be scorched and it felt like my head was itching with a thousand creepy crawlies."

Then, completely enveloped in the 'carpet,' he was lifted off the ground and sucked up toward the craft.

Paralysed with fear, Walter couldn't even scream as he was pulled past the stainless-steel like surface of the

craft and into a vast chamber inside.

The walls were covered with huge black computer-like machines; green, blue, orange and purple lights flashed and strange noises: different toned thumps and vibrations, echoed around.

But Walter was not alone: there were six other children in the room - three boys and three girls. And then there were the creatures - strange reptilian-like beings which did not speak.

"They seemed to get inside your head, like telepathy. They touched our hands and faces in a gentle manner but we were all petrified and were crying for our mums," said Walter, who still shudders when he recalls what happened next.

The children were taken in pairs and strapped down on beds where they were hypnotised into a deep sleep ...

An alien

On May 31 1968, Dr Gerardo Vidal and his wife, driving outside Bahia Blanca in Argentina, entered a dense fog bank and lost consciousness. They came to on a strange road, their car badly scratched and their watches stopped. 48 hours had passed, and they were in Mexico, thousands of miles from home.

This is possibly the oddest car story in the archives of *Fortean Times* - one to strain the credulity of even the most enthusiastic student of strange phenomena - but there are dozens of slivers' yarns almost as weird.

For instance, many close encounters with UFOs begin with a drive, often late at night. Shortly before two in the morning, while driving across the Nullarbor Plain east from Perth, Western Australia, on January 21 1988, Tav Knowles and her three sons and two dogs encountered a hovering UFO. Something landed on the car roof with a thump and the vehicle seemed to rise up. Sean Knowles, the driver, passed out, the dogs went berserk, and there was a rotting smell. The car was then released and crashed to the ground, bursting a tyre. The family jumped out and hid until the UFO shot off. For about 15 minutes, everyone's voice became high-pitched, as if they had been breathing helium.

A psychologist might say that long

In the files of *Fortean Times*, the journal of strange phenomena, lurk some wild and weird road tales

journeys through monotonous countryside can induce a hypnagogic state on the threshold of sleep - a sort of 'white line fever' - where hallucinations can appear startlingly real.

But it is certainly unusual for four people to have the same dream. And the busier tyre was real enough. What's more, at about the same time a fishing boat off the nearby coast was approached by a UFO which also made the crew speak in squeaky voices. Make of it what you will...

These exotic stories are not always from faraway places. On October 27 1974, for instance, John and Sue Day and their three children were driving home to Aveley in Essex at around 10pm when they saw a bright light following them and entered an odd fog bank. When they got home, it was one in the morning. About three hours had gone missing.

Under hypnotic regression many months later, a

bizarre tale of abduction and medical examination by aliens emerged. And, just as in the Australian story, the car had been lifted up from the road.

Here's another tale from 1988. On the night of June 29, a shy teenager called Chris Davis from Browntown, South Carolina, was changing a flat tyre near Scape Ore Swamp when he was attacked by a scaly green biped with glowing red eyes. Davis drove off, but the creature ran after him and jumped on the roof. He accelerated and swerved and the creature tumbled off into the darkness. When the terrified teenager reached home, his father examined the car and found the wing mirror twisted, and scratches on the roof.

Two weeks later a couple found their Ford 'chewed up' near the swamp and heard about the teenager's encounter. Davis was interviewed by the police, the Lizard Man (as he became known) hit the papers and

soon, as is the way with these things, other witnesses came forward. That summer, Browntown had more visitors than at any time in history.

The American investigator John Keel summarised 16 encounters between American drivers and what he dubs 'Abominable Swamp Slobs'. He remarked on their penchant for chasing cars, something no bear or shy Bigfoot would ever do.

Several encounters have features that parallel the one in Scape Ore Swamp. In August 1986 Joseph Whaley was chased in his jeep outside Edison, Georgia, by a large grey hairy hominoid with claws and long pointed ears, which tried to haul him from the jeep.

Then there was Charles Wetzel's encounter in Riverside, California, in November 1958. A long-armed scaly creature with glowing eyes leapt in front of his car and left long scratches on the windshield.

And in November 1966 a young woman was changing a tyre on a lonely road outside Brooksville in Florida when she encountered a huge hairy biped with large green eyes and an eerie greenish glow.

So next time you're driving at night, keep a careful eye open. There may be more out there on the road than the occasional hedgehog... □

"There was nothing round here that it seemed to be coming from. It was really weird."

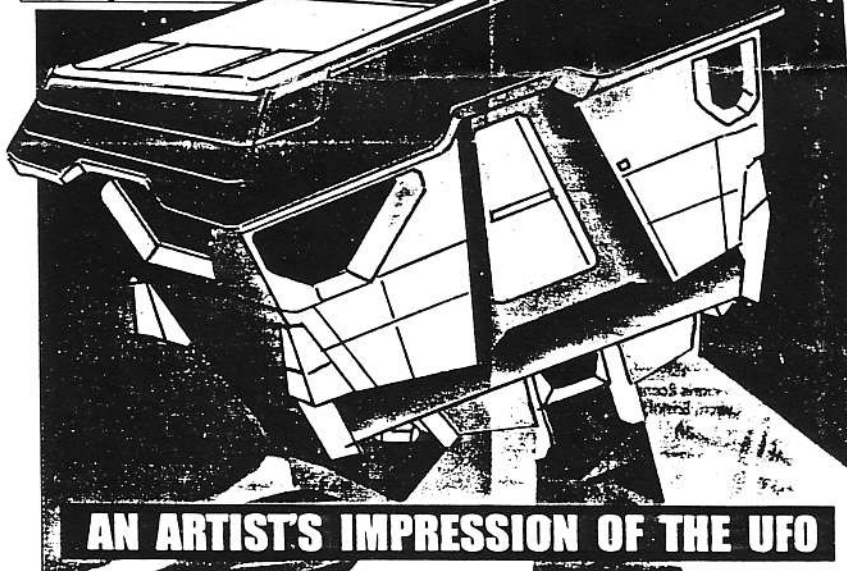
Mr and Mrs King had no idea what the lights were or where they came from.

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# Mystery of hovering lights that zig-zag too

Flood of reports excites UFO experts



AN ARTIST'S IMPRESSION OF THE UFO

**A** MYSTERIOUS series of West sightings has excited UFO experts after 17 separate incidents in six days.

John Downes, head of the Exeter Strange Phenomenon research group, has been inundated with calls reporting strange bright lights that hover or zig-zag in the sky.

Six people saw them on Sunday July 27, three people on Monday 28, and at least two more every day until Friday August 1. All the incidents occurred between Budleigh Salterton and Tiverton in East Devon.

Tracey Wilson, an accountant in Exeter, saw the lights from her bedroom window in Tiverton at 10pm on Monday.

She said: "I went to open the window and saw these bright orange and white lights moving across the sky. They glowed for about two minutes, flared brightly and then disappeared."

**M**y first instincts were that they belonged to an aircraft, but that doesn't account for the way they flared. They were much brighter than normal aeroplane lights."

Most of the 17 witnesses said the lights burned as brightly as magnesium, but some saw only one colour and others more.

Barry Pavne from Dawlish, near Exmouth, saw a light at 10.30pm on Tuesday while he was out walking his dog.

He said: "I saw a bright orange and white light flying slowly above me. It seemed to zig-zag a little and I remember thinking it was heading north towards Exmouth."

"It definitely wasn't an aeroplane and after a few minutes it seemed to disappear."

William Frazer-Jennings of Budleigh Salterton reported

seeing a bright rectangular light at 9.30pm on Sunday.

"It just appeared and rose slowly," he said. "I rushed in to get my binoculars and saw it hover for about four minutes and then blink out. Because my house is on a hill I had a pretty good view."

Ufologist Mr Downes, aged

37, traced the sightings on a map and found a clear line which, if carried forward, went across the Bristol Channel and into South Wales.

He said: "It's incredible. The phone just kept ringing."

"There have been previous sightings in all these areas. We are taking this very seriously."

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## UFO reported in Beckton

**FIVE** Beckton locals claim to have seen a UFO hovering above flats near Campion Close in the early hours of Thursday (July 17) morning.

Jacqueline Honeyman, Vivien Critendon and her two sons were shocked to see the object, described as a bright light the size of a football, which was spotted at around 3am.

After watching it for several minutes, the light moved backwards and decreased to the size of a star, before disappearing.

"It couldn't have been an aeroplane or a helicopter because it wasn't making a noise and the light was not flashing," said 50-year-old Jacqueline of Campion Close.

"I rushed inside to get my camera, but the flash would not work when I tried to take a picture."

"Then the minute I got back inside I tried to take a photo of my dog and the flash worked."

"I called my husband and he saw it from the bedroom window."

The sighting occurred close to busy London City Airport, but staff there say the airport was closed at the time.

A spokeswoman said: "Flights finish at around 9.30pm and start up again at 6.30am, but we saw nothing unusual on our

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## Residents mystified by UFO sightings

**AN X-FILE** investigation is being mounted by residents in Shenden Close, Sevenoaks, following sightings of an 'unidentified' flying object around the cul-de-sac.

Householders claim to have watched a "disc-shaped craft with lights around the rim" hovering above trees between midnight and 3am for several months. It was seen again on Tuesday night.

Dorothy Shuter, who lives in the road, told the *Chronicle* that several people, including her son and next-door neighbour, had spotted the UFO.

She said: "My son saw it first and told me. On another occasion I walked outside

and saw it myself.

"You feel a bit silly saying you've seen something like this but when other people have seen it you start to wonder what's up there? I've no idea what it is."

She said the object made no sound and often remained in the same position for several hours before

moving across the sky.

"I wouldn't have believed it unless I'd seen it myself," she said.

The last UFO sighting reported to police in this area was in July 1985 when a woman motorist, who asked not to be identified, saw a "snake-shaped" craft just above trees below West-erham Hill.

# CIA story a lie: truth is still out there, UFOlogists insist

Richard Hall, the chairman of the Washington-based Fund for UFO Research, a non-profit scientific organisation dedicated to an "open debate" on the subject of UFOs and extra-terrestrial beings, said: "The report contains a story, poor, and very inaccurate, account of the 1950s and 1960s were spy planes."

According to the document, CIA's Role in the Study of UFOs, 1947-90, the US Air Force knew sightings of flying "discs", "saucers" and other objects were glimpses of the Lockheed U-2 and the SR-71 Blackbird surveillance aircraft.

The disclosure, however, has drawn denunciation from "UFOlogists", who regard it as a fresh cap of deception on a tattered bundle of lies.

"We're not conspiracy theorists at all. We just want to know the facts. This document is not only dumb — because UFOs were not put into the sky — it's downright deceptive. It suggests that we didn't know what we were looking for, which is something we're not prepared to do."

He added: "We are now even more interested in getting behind the cover-ups, which have happened since Roswell in 1947." Hall was referring to the alleged

crash of a spacecraft and recovery of alien bodies in New Mexico.

The document, by Gerald Haines, a historian, was written for Studies of Intelligence, a secret CIA journal. It says the air force was intent on concealing the identity of the objects. A straightforward public explanation would have exposed its large fleet of spy planes — a security risk in the face of the Cold War. Instead, the air force disseminated spurious explanations, allowing UFO hysteria to grow.

The air force put out the word the

sightings were simply "natural atmospheric phenomena"

The U-2s, which flew at more than 60,000ft, and the Blackbirds, which reached 80,000ft, bristled with powerful cameras and electronics. The U-2 ignored Soviet nuclear arms in Cuba, a book sparked the 1962 missile crisis and nuclear war.

After the Cuba incident, the air force painted the silver planes black — and the UFO sightings largely ceased. (© The Times, London)

# The stars who saw E.T. (but not on the cinema screen)

A NUMBER of Hollywood stars are claiming to have encountered unidentified flying objects.

David Duchovny, Charlie Sheen, Cliff Robertson and Olivia Newton-John are among celebrities who report experiences with mysterious space craft.

Duchovny, alias Mulder in the X-Files, says he was jogging along a beach in Orange City, New Jersey four years ago when he saw a triangular UFO overhead.

"It was definitely not a plane," he said. "I don't know what it was. I don't think I'll ever know."

Charlie Sheen, star of the science fiction thriller *The Arrival*, says he saw a UFO in the skies over Malibu, California, in 1976. It carried out complex manoeuvres, then from a standstill, accelerated to an indescribable speed and disappeared.

"I witnessed an aircraft doing things acrobatically that I really don't believe are possible with anything we've created."

Cliff Robertson, who won an Oscar in the film *Charly*, was in Pacific Park, California, in 1963 when he saw something gleaming in the sky. Using binoculars, he could make out a cigar-shaped metal object. After hovering motionless for ten minutes, it shot straight up and disappeared.

"I don't know of anything on this planet that could manoeuvre in such a fashion," he said.

Knot's Landing star Michelle Phillips reports spotting a UFO in the Californian desert in 1969. She

saw a brilliant light race across the sky, stop and hover, then zig-zag away. It was too fast for a satellite, too slow for a plane and too high for a helicopter, she said.

Olivia Newton-John was driving with a friend in Australia in 1964 when she felt pins-and-needles all over her body, as though she were surrounded by static electricity.

She gazed upward and saw a silvery, triangular object hurtling toward her, she says. Then it changed into a multi-coloured globe. It started and stopped several times, darted from side to side and flew off.

"She recalled: 'It was able to change directions like no plane I'd ever seen.'"

The sightings are recounted in a book, *Hollywood and the Supernatural*. Author Brad Steiger said: "Their reports are highly credible and represent additions to the UFO literature."

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# Confessions of the UFO hoaxer

I ALWAYS thought that we were a sensible civilised nation, a role model for the third world, but as we approach the millennium this illusion seems to be crumbling.

When the pollsters tell us that the vast majority of people believe in alien UFO's and life on Mars, I can't help thinking that most of our citizens are either cranks or superstitious peasants.

The saddest cases have to be those who claim to have been abducted by aliens.

The most damning negative evidence of all is that until fairly recently there was no record of any astronomer, amateur or professional, sighting a UFO. They see many of the same objects reported as UFOs, but they recognise them for what they really are.

Unfortunately, there are a great many unscrupulous people ready to exploit the 'believers' for all they're worth. And then there are the hoaxers and practical jokers who exacerbate the situation.

In the mid 1980s a few friends and myself started experimenting with lights on kites and tissue paper hot air balloons. The hot air balloons were a stunning success. On clear still autumn nights they would hang like a jewel in the sky, illuminated by the flames of the burning fuel within. As the fuel ran low, they would grow dim and descent. Almost every balloon we launched was

reported in the local press (including your own paper) as a UFO! Witnesses invariably interpreted the fading light falling to earth as a stationary object suddenly accelerating away towards the horizon!

One of our best hoaxes was probably a 5ft diameter paper balloon released near Hadleigh Castle, which was spotted by a couple from Rectory Close, Hadleigh, as it drifted overhead. Their report in the press was perfect in almost every detail: time, date, height, direction of travel, etc., except that they described it as an 'enormous revolving object with portholes all around!'

What a shame that all the other UFO hoaxers, won't come clean. But, whilst so many of these sad UFO buffs continue to cling to their beliefs, I suspect that the hoaxes will continue. There is a certain comic pleasure (and power?) to be gained from fooling the gullible. Unfortunately, it is likely

that all this new-age-crank-religion-alien-hocus pocus will only increase until the millennium is well past; it is certainly a matter of record that similar superstitious mass hysteria affected many people just before the end of the last century.

What a sad reflection on humankind, and on our own culture, that we have learnt so little since our ancestors worshipped the sun and sacrificed their children.

# New UFO sighting 'not a laser from nightclub'

A spokesman for North Wales Police had received no other calls reporting a sighting of a UFO at the time of the sighting. # Military Lied About Nature Of UFOs, CIA Reports

NEW YORK — In the darkest days of the Cold War, the military lied to the American public about the true nature of many unidentified flying objects in an effort to hide its growing fleets of spy planes, a CIA study says.

The deceptions were made in the 1950s and 1960s amid a wave of UFO sightings that alarmed the public and some officials in Washington.

The CIA study says the air force knew that most reports by citizens and aviation experts were based on fleeting glimpses of U-2 and SR-71 spy planes, which fly extremely high. Those planes were developed in the 1950s and 1960s to photograph enemy targets. From secret bases, mainly in California and Nevada, the aircraft repeatedly flew across the country and eventually overseas to bases in countries that included Britain, West Germany and Taiwan.

While commercial airliners in the 1950s flew at altitudes of up to 30,000 feet (9,100 meters), the U-2 soared to more than 60,000 feet and the SR-71 to more than 80,000 feet, or 15 miles, nearly the edge of space.

The planes carried powerful cameras to spy on foreign military installations and sensitive electronic gear to capture radio and radar transmissions. The spy craft were developed by the intelligence agency and often flown by the air force.

Rather than acknowledging the existence of the top-secret flights or saying nothing about them publicly, the air force put out false cover stories, the CIA study says. For instance, unusual observations that were actually spy flights were attributed to atmospheric phenomena like ice crystals and temperature inversions.

"Over half of all UFO reports from the late 1950s through the 1960s were accounted for by manned reconnaissance flights" over the United States, the CIA study says. "This led the air force to make misleading and deceptive statements to the public in order to allay public fears and to protect an extraordinarily sensitive national security project."

The study, "CIA's Role in the Study of UFOs, 1947-90," was written by Gerald Haines and appears in *Studies of Intelligence*, a secret CIA journal. The 1997 edition, with the study on unidentified objects, can be found on the World Wide Web at: <http://www.odci.gov/csi/studies/97uncias/>

## UFO sightings: Woman reveals she saw object

ANOTHER UFO witness has come forward to back up the claims of the Wisbech family who sighted a strange object flying near the A47.

The 21-year-old woman, who does not wish to be named, was returning from a deer stalking expedition at 7.30pm around the same date as the party of four were travelling back to their Wisbech home.

The secretarial worker and her farrier boyfriend (26) saw a triangular shaped object through the sights of a hunting rifle as it hovered over the A16 near Holbeach.

She reports an eerie

silence, no engine noise, and a "boomerang" shaped object with lights on it.

She said: "The whole thing lasted six or seven minutes.

"It was the strangest experience of my life and when I read about the other sighting, it gave me the shivers."

Only this week *The Evening Telegraph* revealed how a car full of people were buzzed by a strange object on the A47 between Peterborough and Wisbech.

The British-based International UFO Research Network (IUFORN) is investigating the case.

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## Light thrown on Aviemore UFO incident

THE TRUTH is out there ..... the recent mystery surrounding strange alien lights hovering in the sky near to Aviemore has been solved.

Aviemore Police received a telephone call from Rothiemurchus Estate following a report in the "Strath" two weeks ago describing how a couple had fled in terror from Tullochgrue after being "buzzed" by an unidentified flying object.

Rothiemurchus' head stalker, Mr Jimmy Gordon, contacted police to explain that he and a fellow estate worker had been out that night, July 10, spotlighting for foxes.

Sergeant John Grierson said: "They were using the estate's Land Rover which has four very high power lights on the front. They also had hand lamps with them which have red filters which would account for why the lights turned red when they moved.

The pair were spotting for foxes at exactly the same time as the lights were encountered and it would appear that they were in the sky if the couple were watching from Tullochgrue."

Sergeant Grierson said that it was not uncommon for spotlighting on estates to be mistaken for UFOs.

Joanne Munro, (17), from Edinburgh, and friend Andrew Smith, (28), told the "Strath" how they had been driving along a dark country lane near to Tullochgrue, just south of Aviemore, when they spotted six strange lights in the sky.

They said that they had stared transfixed for nearly two hours at the circular shaped UFOs before fleeing after one of the bright lights came too close for comfort.

# Five kinds: from flying saucers to cigar-like craft

Sir, - As American military aircraft have been stationed in East Anglia since 1942, almost without a break, it does now seem likely that they initiated the many reports of sightings in our skies and elsewhere of unidentified flying objects (UFOs).

Indeed, it appears that the "rubber men" sometimes associated with crashed UFOs were, well, just a way of making the public believe they had come from another planet.

In recapping on my UFO records, I find that on May 7, 1977, while clawing through a box of old books on a street cart in Soho, London, I came on a 501 page military-like manual of 50 pages entitled *UFO Guide and Handbook*.

## Paperwork backs up existence of UFOs

With the introductions dated London 1957, the manual stated that "the USAF at first investigated, then denied, and finally admitted the existence of UFOs".

Interestingly, the contents of the manual were datable because the compiler, Clifford Thornton by name, said his analysis covered sightings made "during the past nine weeks" which meant we were concerned with the early post-war years into the middle 1950s.

The manual claimed that in 1957 there were "14 different types of UFO, in five broad categories: type I - large cigar-shaped

craft; type II - flying saucers; type III - manual craft; type IV - disc-shaped low-flying craft; type V - small spherical remote-controlled craft".

Referring to type IV, the manual described one version as descending almost to the ground. It was "thought to be a manned low-level reconnaissance/photographic craft, perhaps topographical survey".

The description concluded: "Not many sightings have taken place as, usually, the machine operates late at night or early in the morning, but always after dark".

Even more interesting, in my view, was the realisation on the death of a retired British army officer in West Suffolk in 1994, that the paperwork his family were about to destroy revealed him as one of the trusted British spotters commissioned by the USAF/RAF to keep an eye on wide-eyed local UFO enthusiasts!

He appears to have conducted correspondence with the public as if he were a complete novice.

I was given the paperwork, for the asking, including the many specialist publications he started taking from the early 1950s.

This seems to fit in with my Soho manual discovery about UFOs as dating from the early post-war years.

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# Night we saw UFOs in forest

ONE of the world's biggest UFO mysteries, which happened right here in Suffolk, is the subject of a nationwide lecture tour which arrives in Ipswich early next month.

Speculation over what happened in Rendlesham Forest has never died down since reported sightings of UFOs outside the American airbase at RAF Woodbridge in late December 1980.

A forthcoming book, *Left at East Gate*, is an account of what is said to have happened.

It is co-written by Larry Warren, a former security guard at the base who claims to have witnessed the strange occurrences.

Mr Warren and co-author Peter Robbins are Americans who have teamed up to promote interest in UFOs, or unidentified flying objects.

They will give a joint lecture and sign copies of their book in the 180-seater council chamber at the Ipswich Corn Exchange on June 6. Organiser of the event is Dave Wright, a life-

long enthusiast of the subject known as UFOlogy. He is confident the Ipswich lecture will give the interest in UFOs the boost it deserves.

"It's time this happened in Suffolk. There's not been a talk by Larry Warren here before, as far as I'm aware, so I'm pleased this is happening," said Mr Wright, who lives in Ipswich.

### Incident

UFO enthusiasts agree there were unexplained incidents over more than one night, said Mr Wright. In the first, two guards were ordered into the woods to investigate flashing lights and came across a triangular craft which they followed through the forest until it shot off into the sky.

The main incident took place the following night when a party of officers and guards saw a cloud of mist form in a field on the forest edge. A red light flew in to hover above the mist and exploded and a large craft was observed on the ground where the mist had been.

Military authorities have always denied that any such incidents took place as described, but Mr Wright and others disagree strongly.

"There was definitely something other-worldly in Rendlesham Forest at that time," said Mr Wright.

Left at East Gate takes its title from a direction Larry Warren says he was given as a guard involved during one of the incidents.

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## UFO watch on Yorks coast

UFO investigators are to watch the skies over the Yorkshire Coast next week after a spate of strange sightings in the area.

Over the past two months there have been more than 10 reports of UFOs in the Scarborough, Filey and Bridlington area.

She said: "It was six years ago, but when I read in your story that strange things happened to Mr Taylor in Blackbird Leys everything came rushing back like it was yesterday."

"It was 2am and for some reason I got up and went outside. Suddenly this thing appeared, it looked like a

man, and I was terrified. But I thought, 'you're not going to frighten me' so I shouted at him 'You silly s@d!' He didn't answer and walked away stiffly like he was sleepwalking.

"I never used to believe in these sort of things, but now I think something is happening. I don't think we are alone."

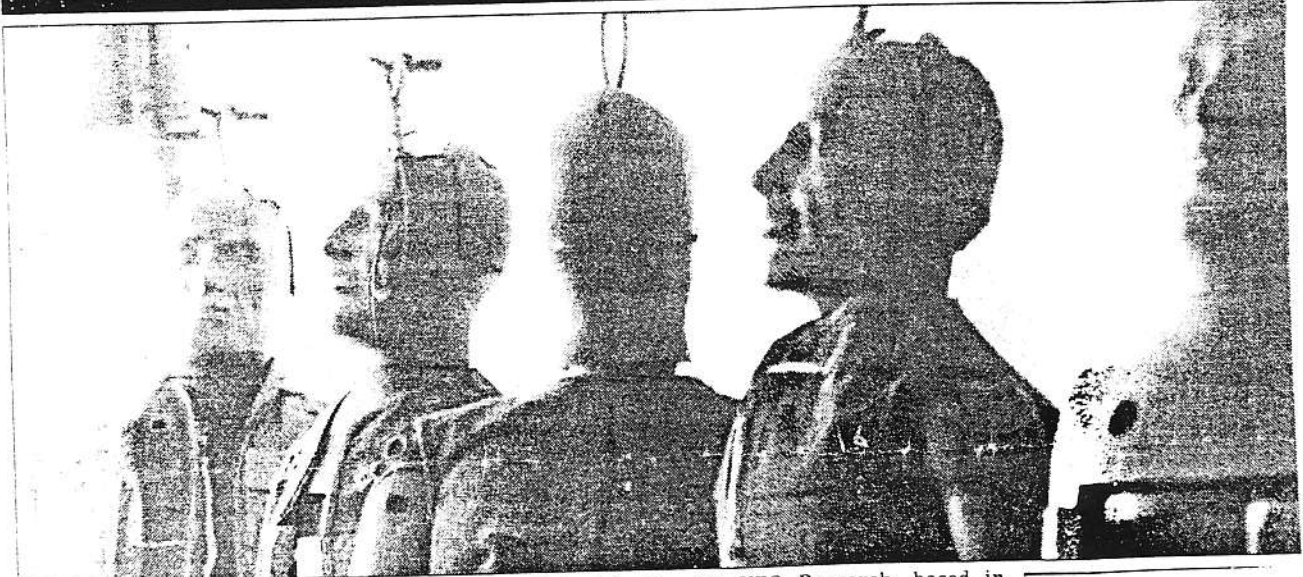

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## Roswell test dummy claim alien to UFO group



CONSPIRACY theorists and UFO-spotters today dismissed a report from the American Air Force which insists aliens never crashed-landed in what became known as the Roswell Incident.

In the report published yes-

terday, military chiefs claimed the alien-like bodies removed from the New Mexico desert 50 years ago were aluminum and plastic test dummies, of the type pictured above, used in high-altitude parachute drops.

But America's Private Fund

for UFO Research, based in Maryland, attacked the report, saying dummies were not used in parachute tests before 1955.

It asks how all the witnesses involved could have mistaken dummies for "creatures from outside the Earth".

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# Walter seeks the truth about his alien encounter

MANY of you will still be recovering from the media's recent 'alien invasion' to mark the 50th anniversary of the first modern-day UFO sighting.

But for Walter, of Workington, who believes he has been abducted by aliens, there is no such escape. Memories of his terrifying experience continue to haunt him, almost half a century on. And he's desperate to undergo regressive hypnosis to get to the bottom of what really happened to him when he was just seven years-old.

This week's *S-Files* continues Walter's extraordinary close encounter.

AFTER being stripped and strapped down onto a bed, Walter (not real name) recalls seeing a terrifying machine, with a drill-like attachment, coming down from the ceiling towards him.

"I felt pains in my nose, ears and the back of my throat. My private parts were sore to touch and I felt as though I had in some way been violated," he said.

After the aliens had finished their



trance-like state. When Walter awoke, he found himself two miles away from the spot where he had first seen the craft. About three days had elapsed.

Semi-naked and mumbling incoherently, he was discovered by a policeman and taken home, where he remembers being confined to bed for two weeks.

"Eventually I started to get my confidence back. But I found that a lot of changes had happened to me. My intelligence had radically improved," said Walter, who at that time, had no recollection of what had happened to him.

Where previously he had struggled at school, he now found he was able to grasp maths easily and could answer questions he knew the teacher was going to ask next.

He still experiences some form of pre-cognition, which he calls his 'extra-

He claims to be able to read minds and predict certain events.

A year after his close encounter, Walter's powers were put to the test when he was assessed, along with other children, on a variety of psychological and mind-reading tests at a centre in Carlisle.

That's where he remembers having his first taste of regressive hypnosis - it brought memories of his alien encounter flooding back.

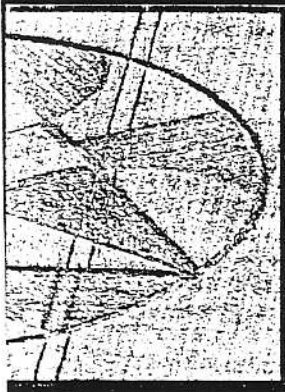
But today, believing he has much more to learn about what happened to him, he wants to go under hypnosis again.

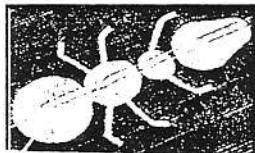
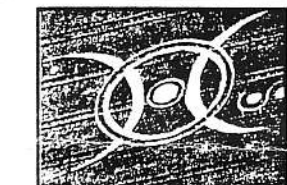
Debbie was 18 when she was abducted one night in November while in a car with two girlfriends. Afterwards she found herself back in her bed at 5am.

### WHY PEOPLE BELIEVE WEIRD THINGS

**Pseudoscience, Superstition and Other Confusions of Our Time**

THE United States is a country where phone lines are clogged by people dialing the Psychic Friends Network to get some hints as to their future prospects. If you are among these psychic friends, or if you are one who believes in creationist science or has had an out-of-body experience during which you had a taste of the world to come, then this book by Michael Shermer is going to challenge some of your most cherished notions.

Shermer teaches the history of science at Occidental College in Los Angeles and is the publisher of *Skeptic* magazine, which wages the battle of rationalism and science against superstition and wishful thinking.

In "Why People Believe Weird Things," he provides a catalogue of silly and sometimes pernicious notions, ranging from iridology (by which specialists claim to be able to diagnose, say, kidney disease by examining one's iris) to Holocaust denial to recovered memory syndrome, reliance on which has actually

sent a few people, accused of having committed crimes decades earlier, to prison.

Beyond his exposé of contemporary superstition and other forms of nonsense, Shermer attempts to describe not just what people believe but also why they believe it. His book is far better in the exposé sections than in the explanatory ones, where despite the promise of his title he has little new to say. Early on he demonstrates the pervasiveness of mystical beliefs, citing a Gallup Poll of 1991 that showed 52 percent of Americans believing in astrology, 46 percent in extrasensory perception and 42 percent in communication with the dead.

"Other popular ideas of our time that have little scientific support include dowsing, the Bermuda Triangle, poltergeists, biorhythms, creationism, levitation, psychokinesis, astrology, ghosts, psychic detectives, UFOs, remote viewing, Kirlian auras, emotions in plants, life after death, monsters, graphology, crypto-zoology, clairvoyance, mediums, pyramid power, faith healing, Big Foot, psychic prospecting, haunted houses, perpetual motion machines, anti-gravity locations and, amusingly, astrological birth control."

No doubt superstition is widespread. Still, Shermer would have done well to exercise a bit of the skepticism he proclaims as his guiding principle, asking how this alarming poll was conducted and whether it measured real conviction

or a casual flirtation with notions of the invisible. Do more than half of Americans really believe that being a Taurus makes them different from being a Capricorn, or do they just consult their horoscopes for fun? The distinction is too important to have been neglected.

In any case, when Shermer recounts some of his own adventures in the debunking trade - he is often invited to appear on television, for example, to refute the claims of psychics - his account is lively and interesting.

In the best parts of Shermer's book he shows how some of the more popular mystical practices work - how, for example, a skillful psychic can stun an audience by seeming to know intimate details of the lives of some of its members, when, in fact, all he or she is doing is uttering generalities and making shrewd observations of particular individuals.

"Why People Believe Weird Things" turns in its final chapters into a kind of intellectual autobiography, not devoid of self-promotion, in which Shermer anoints himself expert on a huge array of subjects.

But in those areas where he is expert - the persistence of superstition is the most important - his book provides a useful antidote to the nonsense that surrounds us.

## Close encounter with witnesses to UFO mystery

**E**XCITED skywatchers have contacted the Mail to confirm reports of a mysterious UFO sighted near the Humber Bridge.

The Mail reported this week how a Hessele couple spotted a silver dome-shaped object clearly visible and hover-

ing above the river as they strolled along Sullivan Way at 8pm on Sunday, July 27.

The RAF said they had not received any similar reports about the sighting but people from all over the city contacted us to say they had seen the object at the same time.

Kim Misbett (19), from Sutton Park, observed an oval-shaped object for nearly 20 minutes as she enjoyed a drink with friends at the Century Park Inn at around 8pm on the same day.

"It definitely wasn't a plane or an aircraft, it was silver in colour and had very bright lights at the front. We couldn't believe our eyes," she said.

Shane Ford (22), from St Luke's Street, Kingston upon Hull, saw a similar object at around 8pm as he walked down Freetown Way to meet his girlfriend.

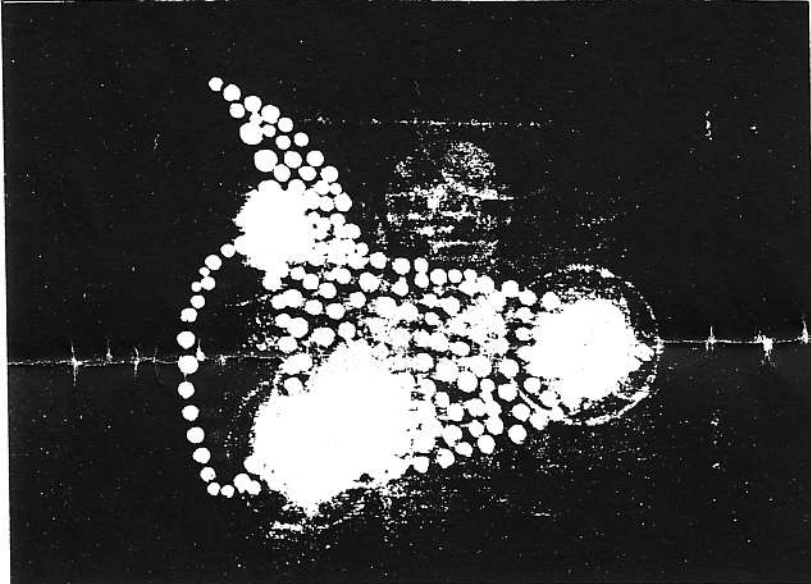

## Stories of mystery lights flashing through the sky

SIGHTINGS of mysterious flying objects and strange lights are not new to the area with most reports having no obvious explanation.

In February, 1996, Jean Iveson and husband Gordon were returning to their home in Hull Road, Eastington, when a mysterious blue light enveloped their car.

Mrs Iveson claimed the light hovered over the car for several min-

utes before shooting off into the night sky.

In November, 1995, Tom Delph, a pigeon fancier from Lowther Street, Kingston upon Hull, observed a series of coloured lights hovering a mile above the city.

Mr Delph claimed the lights were too large to be a conventional aircraft and definitely wasn't a helicopter.

In June, 1995, five separate sightings of the same strange lights hovering over the city were reported.

One witness, Mrs Carol Kennedy, reported seeing a long object with a row of coloured lights along the side, moving slowly over her home in Laughton Road, Beverley.

In May, 1995, Mr Dave Ombler saw two large white lights in the sky over his home in Humbleton.

The lights hovered in the sky for 10 minutes before moving noiselessly off towards the coast.

In December, 1994, Sandra Walton and her mother Muriel Rowbottom observed giant orange balls hovering over their bungalow in Sproatley. Mrs Walton then watched a white craft in the sky which filled the sky.

Later, Mrs Walton found strange markings and indentations in the ground near her house where she believes the UFO landed.

In September, 1994, student Lucy Brooke saw a huge glowing orange ball of light flash across the night sky as she drove from her home in Burton Pidsea.

She said: "It darted across the sky and looked like it was playing about then it just disappeared. It didn't fade away, it just disappeared out of the sky."

REPORTS of a mysterious object hovering or flying near the Humber bridge have flooded in from all over the city.

Mr Len Ledger (61), of Padstow Close, Bransholme, reported seeing a strange light in the sky at around 8pm on Sunday, July 27.

He said: "My wife pointed out a light in the sky. It hung in the sky for a while then slowly dimmed and went out. It was a maroon colour which made me think it was a distress flare but my wife said it was a UFO."

Teenager Nell Stable (14), from Glenfield Drive, Kingston upon Hull, also claims to have seen a UFO as it hovered over the Humber Bridge at around 7.45pm on Sunday, July 27.

He said: "It was like a disk shape, I only saw it for about 10 seconds because it was moving so quickly."

Mr Shane Ford, (22), from St Luke's Street, KuH, saw the strange craft as he strolled down Freetown Way on the way to meet his girlfriend at about 8.30 on Sunday July 27.

He said: "It was towards the Humber Bridge and at first I thought it was a jumbo jet but it didn't seem to have any wings. It was cigar shaped and silver and moved very fast. It didn't make any noise or anything."

Pensioner Mrs Kathleen Maule (74), also saw the mysterious craft as she stood in the garden of her home in Amberley Close, near Sutton.

She said: "About nine o'clock I went into the garden and over the houses opposite was a row of three lights. There was no noise."

"I was watching it for about 10 minutes and I just can't explain, it was

strange," added Mrs Maule.

Rebecca Paffley (21), of Cottingham Road, KuH, saw a mysterious object from her window on Friday, July 25, as she watched television with her parents.

She said: "I saw a bright light outside and my Dad and I went outside to get a better look. It was cigar shaped, shiny blue in colour and moved a lot slower than a plane would. We watched it for about half an hour as it hovered over the house and then disappeared. We couldn't believe it."

One of the most recent and amazing sightings of a strange object was reported by Mr Malcolm Bean (49), from The Meadows, South Cave.

On Monday, August 4, Mr Bean observed a strange golden light with a hazy coloured light around it, in the sky over his house.

Mr Bean used high powered binoculars to get a closer look and tracked a mysterious craft as it crossed the sky over his house.

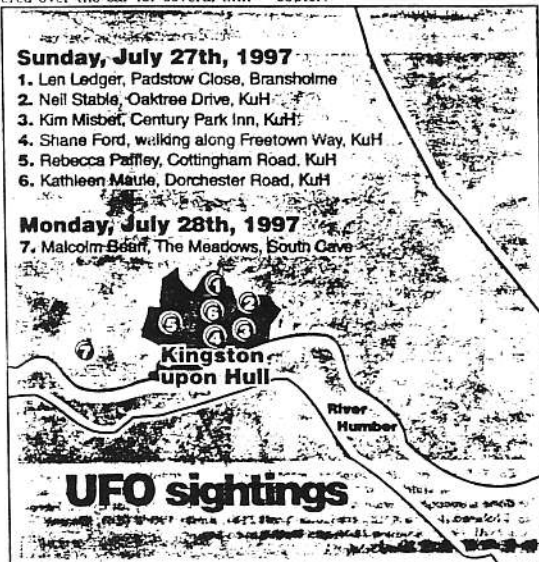
He said: "It began to move across the sky east to west, slowly and with no noise. Suddenly a blue dot flashed past it."

"I focussed on it with my binoculars and saw a cone-shaped object, without a distinct outline with what looked like glowing crystals covering it."

"I focussed on it several times to check I wasn't seeing things but it was still there."

Mr Bean watched the object for nearly half an hour before it finally disappeared.

"It disappeared really quickly without making any sound," he added.



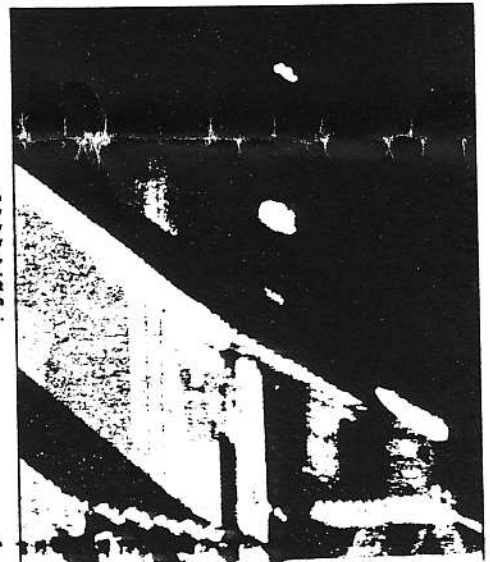

# Flying saucers: Stuart brings us down to Earth

**A COCKERMOUTH astronomer enthusiast has come up with a number of possible explanations for a recent wave of UFO sightings over Cumbria.**

Stuart Atkinson, secretary of Cocker-mouth Astronomical Society, says there is currently a lot happening in outer space, both man-made and natural, which could explain the UFO reports.

His explanations include shooting stars, satellites and even the Russian Mir space station.

"There's a lot of weird stuff going on up there that looks pretty strange if you're not used to seeing it," said Stuart.

"I'm not being a killjoy. I firmly believe in the existence of extraterrestrial life, but it'll be so far out there that it's very unlikely anyone has ever seen an alien spaceship."

Throughout August, he said, there would be a

greater than usual number of very bright shooting stars. He added that Jupiter was currently clearly visible as a bright bluish "star" in the east after sunset.

Weather and communications satellites could also be seen from the ground, and were covered in highly reflective metal panels which were still in the sun long after the earth was in darkness.

At certain times of the month, said Stuart, the Mir space station was visible from Britain and because it was so big it looked like a startlingly bright star and was often mistaken for a UFO.

Stuart stressed he did not dismiss people's claims of having seen UFOs but believed most sightings could be explained as astronomical phenomena or aircraft of some sort.

"I'd love to be proved wrong, and no one would like it more than me if a flying saucer came down in the middle of Cocker-mouth right now," he added.

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## Spybase on 'UFO trail'

**THEY follow in the footsteps of aliens and terrify witnesses into public silence.**

Nobody knows where they come from or where they go... The Men In Black have hit the movie screen this weekend in a smash-hit Hollywood comedy - but one West man says their real life counterparts come from GCHQ, Cheltenham.

Ufologist Robin Cole, from Cheltenham, claims the Government Communications Headquarters is monitoring - and covering up - UFO activity.

This week he has published a report, GCHQ and the UFO Cover-Up, in which he alleges evidence of the spy base's involvement with recent mysterious sightings.

Mr Cole, said: "I'm 100 per cent certain that GCHQ is involved with monitoring UFO activity when there's an intrusion into our airspace". He bases that on "inside" information.

It was an incident off Skegness, in Lincolnshire, last year, that convinced him.

He said: "At 3.14am on October 5, a Mr Leyland of Skegness police telephoned Yarmouth Coastguards to report an object witnessed over the sea by numerous police officers.

"He said: 'We can see a strange red and green rotating light in the sky directly south-east from Skegness.'"

According to Mr Cole, it was the start of a major incident which lasted several hours and involved RAF Neatishead, RAF Kinloss, Anglia Radar, the Ministry of Defence at Whitehall and GCHQ.

Mr Cole claims to have secretly met staff members of GCHQ, who have been publicly silenced by fear for their jobs, and the Official Secrets Act, which is as effective as any visit from the Men In Black.

# Sky's the limit for UFO buff

A PLYMOUTH UFO expert is snubbing a national one-night flying saucer hunt - because he says it is a waste of time.

Bob Boyd, of the Plymouth UFO Research Group, said he won't be taking part in the national Skywatch night, on August 12, because if you want to spot a UFO you have to look all year around.

The event, organised by a top UFO magazine, aims to get as many people as possible studying the heavens for signs of extra-terrestrial life.

It is hoped the look-out will provide concrete proof of UFOs. But Bob, a UFO spotter for 40 years, said: "They never come up with any hard evidence. "These events are held two or three times a year, but if you are serious about UFOs you should be sky watching all the time."

Bob, 49, from Stoke, has seen unexplained objects on several occasions since he became interested in UFOs as a boy.

He added: "You could see a UFO at any time, anywhere. We used to go to Kit Hill, near Callington, because you can see for miles, but any high spot will do."

"But you are just as likely to see one

when you are sitting in your car.

"I even once saw one on a TV programme about standing stones - I rang the BBC and they checked the tape and confirmed it."

He said there have been a number of UFO sightings over Plymouth, the most recent on May 6.

"A 40-year-old businessman was coming out of a Chinese takeaway in Widewell at 11pm when he saw a silver ball, the size of a tennis ball, flying around in the sky," said Bob.

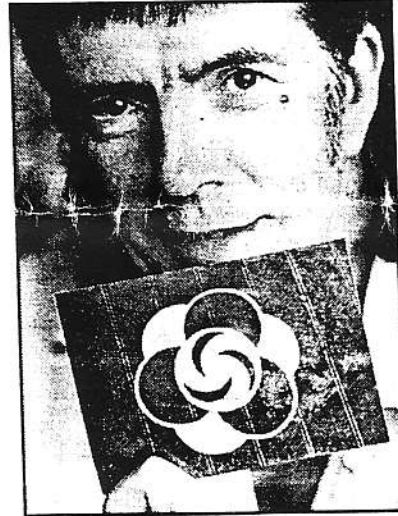
"He said he was shocked rigid, and had not been drinking. That's a typical UFO sighting."

But despite years of research Bob says that ufologists still have no idea what the mysterious sightings are.

He said: "We are no nearer knowing what they are than we were in 1947."

"We have got some evidence but it does nothing to make our understanding any clearer."

"Recently a lot of people have reported seeing a very bright light between 11pm and 1am - but it turned out to be Jupiter which is very bright at this

time of year. But if people do see anything they should contact me and I will log the sighting."

## Abductions: Incidents in Scotland

ON November 9, 1979, a foreman forester, Robert Taylor, aged 61, employed by Livingstone Development Corporation, left home at 10am in a Forestry Department van to inspect young trees in Deans Forest.

He left the van and walked along a track with his red setter dog. At about 10.15am, he turned a corner and was confronted by a large dome-shaped object, hovering silently above the ground.

The estimated diameter of the object was six metres. He stood still for about 30 seconds, when two smaller spherical objects appeared to approach him. Each attached itself to his trousers (one each side) below the pockets. He felt suffocated by a strong smell and lost consciousness.

On recovering, the objects had gone. He had lost his voice and his legs would not support him. He crawled 90 metres and staggered 430 metres to the van. He tried to contact his base by radio but was still unable to speak.

He walked 1600 metres home by a short cut, arriving about 11.30am. The forester's wife telephoned his superior, Mr M. Drummond, who went with the victim to the site of the incident.

They found marks which were not there before that day. After examination by his doctor, he was sent to hospital for skull X-ray but walked out without this being done.

The police were called and made careful measurements of the 58 marks at the site. Photographs have been published of these and of the police diagram. The area was fenced off by the Forestry Department. The torn clothing went for forensic examination.

Police scientific opinion is that the tears could have been caused only by a strong mechanical pull and that they were not made by single points but by a broad attachment. A reconstruction showed that the victim was unconscious for about 25 minutes.

The temperature was 30C with a light wind from WSW. The reporter of the event had

worked with his employers for 16 years and was considered honest and responsible.

He drank very little and not at all when working. A plaque now marks the spot where the abduction took place.

Bob Taylor was the forester, Malcolm Drummond was the forest manager at the time, now retired.

Ian Waugh was the detective inspector for the case.

On August 18, 1992, Garry Wood, aged 32, an ambulance mechanic from Edinburgh, accompanied by his friend Colin Wright, was driving along the A70, from Oxfangs to Tarbrax, in West Lothian, to deliver a satellite television dish to friend.

They left at 10 pm and the journey should have taken half an hour, but they arrived two and a half hours later at Tarbrax, ashen-faced and shaking.

They had turned a corner near Harperrigg Reservoir to be confronted by a spaceship hovering 25 feet above the ground. Garry accelerated, but as the car was going underneath it, "a shimmering curtain fell and we went into total blackness. I could not see anything."

Catriona Phillip, their friend, said: "they drew identical diagrams of the craft and the little men they had seen and both were adamant that they did not stop on the journey."

Garry agreed to regressive hypnosis by Dr Prem Misra, consultant psychiatrist, Parkhead Hospital, Glasgow.

Under hypnosis he talked about a wee man coming up to him as he lay on a stretcher or platform. He recalled two aliens, like "thin translucent, fragile-looking skeletal beings. They seemed to look right into my life. I didn't think these things existed but whatever they are, they have a life like me and you. They are here and I know more are coming."

Dr Misra has no doubt Mr Wood genuinely believes he had a close encounter and advised him to learn self-hypnosis to help his anxiety attacks (flash-backs, panic attacks and sleepless nights). His work-mates call him 'Starman'.

The following is a transcript from 'Cracking Stories' - Close Encounters, BBC 1, 8.30,

November 19, 1995.

Colin Wright: "We went round this bend, something caught my eyes, I looked up, at first I thought overhanging trees, then I looked again, I thought it's no, it looks like a craft of some sort, it was 20 feet above the car, something on the road."

Garry Wood: "What the hell is that? It did not conform to anything I'd seen like a helicopter or a plane, or anything at all. Actually, I panicked, got frightened. I took my arm and banged the button down on the driving side door, I crashed the car into third gear to accel-



erate really quickly to get underneath this object, to get away from it, but just as we got underneath this object, this light caught me, like shimmering light effect, fell in front of the car.

"I thought this is it, I'm going to crash, my number's up."

Colin: "I braced myself to crash, because when we went under, the whole surrounding area, Garry, the car, everything had disappeared."

Garry: "I was basically sitting in just darkness, no car, no Colin. I said to myself, what's

happened, am I dead? Then suddenly, the car was skiting all over the road. I tried to control the car."

Colin: "Garry was, like, putting his foot down, heading up the side of the embankment."

Garry: "Colin was shouting and bawling. I wasn't that interested, I was trying to get away from the object on the road. I was just terrified, I did... I know what it was."

Garry and Colin lost two hours out of their lives.

Catriona Phillip: "My husband and myself were in bed. Garry and Colin were banging on the glass door. I went to open it, Garry pushed open the door open and actually jammed my toe underneath the door."

"And the two men said, 'we've seen a UFO.'"

"Immediately I started to laugh. Then they drew what they saw. Garry: "Black in colour, it's not a very good drawing. Colin saw it first, he would draw it at a slightly different angle. This is basically what I saw. I never draw a shimmering effect like Colin did. I left Oxfangs at the back of 10."

Catriona: "You did not get here till after 12. What happened?"

Garry: "This craft emitted whatever it was, everything went black, it was (it felt like) only about 15 seconds or 10 seconds, then we were in the car again, driving like maniacs to get away from this craft."

"But from Oxfangs to here would be half an hour but we seemed to take two hours. We're trying to get to the bottom of it, to try and get an answer. What actually happened and why it happened."

Colin: "The fact is Garry and me are different. I'm pretty easy-ony about it now. As far as I'm concerned we got away with it."
