Re: Unidentified object sighted over Holbeach St. Johns 23rd January, 2000

I am writing to you in the hope that you may be able to identify an object which was sighted by my parents on the 23rd January 2000 at approximately 21:00hrs.

My parents live in the small village of Whaplode, some 3 miles from the town of Holbeach, Lincolnshire. The object was similar to a navigation light on a plane - flashing intermittently at regular intervals. My mother was the first to see the object, and due to the way it appeared also thought it to be a plane.

The object was flying from the direction of Whaplode, Lincs towards Holbeach St. Johns, at which point the object stopped - approx. 3 miles away and 3 miles in altitude. At this stage my father was also watching, after my mother quizzed him about what sort of craft it could be. Obviously amused by the fact the object was just 'hovering', they continued to watch. The object's light then stopped, faded, then 'relit'. It appeared to be the centre 'underside light' of the object, which now remained static. This was followed by a ring of flashing, intermittent lights around the object. My parents were keen to stress that it did not necessarily have moving lights around the craft - simply flashing.


This happened for about 10 minutes, at which point the craft dipped slowly to one side, and shot off at great speed 'up and away'. My dad used to be in the air-force for over 20 years, and is familiar with aircraft flight patterns and characteristics. He does not recognise the object he saw as any craft known to be in service to date. They are also used to aircraft flying low over their area, as their house is directly under one of the flight paths used by Tornadoes and Hercules.

I am hoping that you can either identify what they saw, or received any other reports of this nature on the day in question.
