1. In late November 1959, Julia Cellini, Assistant to Edward K. Moss, Public Relations, attended a dinner party where she was introduced to the Deputy Finance Minister of Rumania. This individual was in Washington for consultations with the International Bank, ICA, State, etc. He asked her what he should see in Washington, and she recommended the usual places, plus Charlottesville.

- 2. The following week she was invited to a farewell dinner for the Rumanian Cultural Attache, whom she had previously met. The Deputy Finance Minister came up, remembered her name and said that he had seen everything she had recommended, including a weekend at Charlottesville. He had taken along his superior, the Finance Minister, and at the party, introduced him to Miss Cellini. The conversation was in French, although the Minister did understand English.
- 3. The Minister asked her what else to see during their remaining week, and she recommended the Monastery, Mt. Vernon, etc. He thereupon asked her to accompany them to lunch, and she explained that she could not, that she worked. On Friday, the Minister called her to accompany them on the trip to Mt. Vernon on Saturday. She did not wish to do so, but could not gracefully get out of it. On Saturday it was raining and the trip was called off when she said she could not join them on Sunday. The Minister called her once more before leaving Washington.
- 4. This memorandum is written for the record of the fact that both the Minister and Deputy Minister of Finance had shown considerable interest in Miss Cellini, in the event that it might be of any use at some future date.

Edward K. Moss notified this office today that the Ambassador From Guinea is in the process of setting up his Embassy in Washington, having returned to the U.S. last week. He is looking for a chancery, an embassy, and a residence, as well as his basic staff.

- 2. He requires a female secretary, whom he states must be attractive, with shorthand abilities in French and English. She must not be a French citizen or have had employment by the French Government. Her salary would be in the vicinity of \$400 a month, tax free. A white woman is preferable.
- 3. Moss said that the Ambassador has had difficulty in locating such a person and has asked Noss to help, so that anyone we wished could properly be introduced through this means. Moss pointed out that, since the girl would be the first employee of a small staff, she would attain a very important position. He felt that this might be significant in that Frime Minister Toure is politically "on the fence". Toure himself will be in Washington on a State visit on 25 October 1959.

THURSDAY, NOV. 27, 1958 STATEMENT OF THE AMBASSADOR OF THE REPUBLIC OF THE SUDAN Dr. Ibrahim Anis, Ambassador of the Republic of The Sudan, today reaffirmed his country's friendship for the United States in a statement issued on the eve of his departure for Khartoum, scheduled originally for early this month but delayed until tomorrow because of the formation of a new government in The Sudan earlier this month. Dr. Anis' statement follows: "I would like to thank the American public and especially the American press for the thoughtful consideration with which they received and appraised the news of the recent developments in my country. Thanks to your refusal to jump to hasty conclusions and make comparisons with events in other countries which would not apply to The Sudan, the relations between our countries have not been strained as they might have been through misunderstanding and we remain today good friends. "The Government of my country was changed because partisan strife between political parties threatened to bring about a demoralization of our people and a loss of confidence in our ability as a nation to preserve the principles of freedom and independence to which our people are determined to adhere. "A government of stability, including both military and civil leaders. acting with the approval of the spiritual leaders of our country, has assumed responsibility to the people to resolve our internal problems and to maintain cordial relations with all other countries as befitting a free and independent, democratic Republic. It has assumed the responsibility in a peaceful and orderly manner without impairing the rights of dissident elements or freedom of movement of any of our citizens or visitors to our country. It has assured complete freedom of the press. It has pledged itself to be bound by and give full effect to the agreements into which the Republic of The Sudan has entered since our independence nearly three years ago. (MORE)

"In doing this my country has not been moved by external pressures or by any feeling of unfriendliness towards other countries. On the contrary, our Prime Minister, El Ferik Ibrahim Pasha Abboud, and his Government will work to improve these relations on the basis of mutual respect, friendship and mutual interest.

"Paramount among the problems of relations with other countries to which our Government will address itself will be to give expression to the conviction of every Sudanese that it is of utmost importance to bring about a fair division of the waters of the Nile which flow from our country into Egypt and which are of great importance to the economic development of both nations.

"Our new Government has now been recognized by virtually every other country, including your own. As my nation's representative in the United States since our independence I have seen the steady growth of closer relations and greater understanding between our countries. I am made confident by the recent events in my country and the sympathetic response to them by your country, that these cordial relations will endure and, indeed, can now be made even more strong.

"It is my pleasure that my diplomatic career began and ended with my service as Ambassador to the United States. It is a happy coincidence that my last day in the United States is Thanksgiving Day. For me it is a day on which I give thanks for all the wonderful friends I have made here. It is a day on which I congratulate all Americans for the friendship they have extended to me and to my country. Although I am returning to private life, I want them all to know I shall never cease my efforts to bring about increasingly close relations between our two nations."

- The Sudanese Ambassadors to the US and to the UN are both quite happy with the recent change in government in their country. They strongly discount Communist influence and stress the continuity and stability of most personnel and of government policies.
- 2. The basic underlying issue which provoked the change was corruption centering around the "axis" of the Deputy Defense Minister and the Minister of Foreign Affairs. President Abboud himself was on several occasions so "fed up" with the situation that he resorted to the "Nehru tactics" of absenting himself and threatening resignation. Be did not dare fire the two Ministers. Eventually others became so unhappy with the situation that they took it out of Abboud's hands.
- 3. The Communists have hadly overplayed their hand, with a power play far beyond their real strength. The failure of their effort to provoke a coup d'etat by announcing without foundation an army move to assume power, merely displayed their weakness and thus foreclosed for some time at least any possibility of their exerting great influence.
- 4. It is hard to judge which of the two political parties will be victorious in the forthcoming elections but the odds appear to favor the UMA. In any case, with either party in power, and with the interim government at present, every sign points to continuity of policy and of stability. Instructions to the two diplomats mentioned are in this category. Other evidence is found in the continuing normal procedure with routine diplomatic transfers. The new Foreign Minister is at least as pro-US as his recently ousted predecessor. He probably leans much more to the US.

In recent weeks his firm has been conducting negotiations with the Ambassador of Guinea regarding possibilities of representing that country in the US.

- In recent weeks we have been negotiating with the Guinean Ambassador to the US, Dr Seydou Conte, regarding the possibilities of doing some work for his government in the US.
- 2. During one of these meetings at the Guinean Embessy about 14 May 62, Ambassa/or Conte received a telephone call from Bouphouet-Boigny, President of the Ivory Coast, in New York City. The conversation was conducted in French and was obviously a continuation of previous talks on the same subject. The two men were discussing ways, means, and desirability of persuading President Toure to reduce further his connections with the Soviet Bloc and to align his country with the West.
- 3. There was no attempt on the part of Ambassador Conte to conceal the tenor of the conversation from my associate in his office. He could easily have taken the call in another room or excused himself temporarily. It is probable that he wished to be overheard.
- We have speculated over why Houphouet-Boigny negotiated personally and directly with the ambassador during a visit to the US. The reason undoubtedly is that Conte has the ear and confidence of Toure and is the best qualified number of the Guinean diplomatic service, as evidenced by his appointment to Washington.
- 5. Conte has indicated to us that Guinea is not too pleased with the type and quality of aid from the Soviet Blee and has come to realize that the most stable and significant economic development from abroad since independence has been the US aluminum installation. Conte himself impresses us as being an African first but very pro-US and West.

- During the sessions at the United Nations [week of 1 Oct 60] I was in frequent touch with Komla Agbeli Obedemah, the Finance Minister of Chans, and was able, I believe, to get the true reaction of President Krame Moruman to Secretary Herter's remark lumping Maxumah with the Communists.
- Goedemah told me that Nkrumah has no personal regard whatsoever for Limmina of the Congo, but regards him merely as an individual tossed up by political tides - basically "an empty head". However, Ekrumah's badly phrased remarks were intended to convey his rusa views which are, according to Goedemah, that the new countries of Africa must develop strong national government, or else they will revert to regional or tribal chaos. Hkrumah, therefore, feels strongly that the United Rations has given its support to the enti-Lummba factions, just because it does not like him nor his actions, thereby furthering a split around the duly installed Prime Minister.
- Nkrumah's personal reaction to Secretary Herter's remark was one of deep laurt and anger. In effect, he now feels that "if the US does not understand what I am trying to do, to hell with it"! During the past year Ekrumah was coming out of his sulk at the US over his bad press on arrests, etc in Ghana, but this incident has set him back again and has played into the hands of the pro-Soviet faction in his country.
- Efforts were made to have Mkrumah appear on the Dave Gerroway television shows with prepared questions approved by him, to clarify his views on the position of the neutrals. It was also arranged for him to be in one of the future debates planned by NFC, in which he could expound on the future role of non-African states in Africa. This would be filmed in Accra, or anywhere he vished, with an upponent agreeable to him. Goedsmah urged both prospects to Maximah and was refused flatly, through general annoyance and personal frustration.
- As a sidelight to this matter, I also talked to the prospective Foreign Minister of Sierra Leone (upon attaining independence) and to several Indians. All expressed shock at the apparent US misunderstanding of what the Africans feel about the importance of strong central governments in the new states.

- 1. Komla Agbeli Goedemsh, the Finance Minister of Ghana, spent the week of 7 Aug 60 in Washington, primarily seeking loans for the Volta River project, which has now been scaled down to a gractical size. Discussions with US officials and bankers led to agreements to advance funds for the next five years, at the end of which time the dea will be producing power. The total cost will be US\$168 million, of which Chema itself will put up US\$184 million. The World Bank will advance US\$40 million at 5 3/4 percent interest, the Development Loan Fund US\$25 million at 32 percent interest.
- 2. Grederich verited US\$5 million more from the DLF because the job cannot be carried out without it. Faced with a gap of US\$19 million, Gbedesah, on his own authority, offered to add US\$1's willion to Chana's contribution by taking Al million per year out of current income. This, however, still leaves the necessary US\$5 million.
- 3. The Finance Minister is leader of the pro-Western group in Chana, but there is a powerful faction of high Cheamiens, headed by Kojo Botsio, Minister of Agriculture, that continually urges President Evens Nurusah to stop dealing with the West and to turn to the USSA. Goedesch feels strongly that if he does not get the additional US\$5 million, he will not be able to maintain the pro-West position in the battle, the ground having been cut out from under his feet, particularly for comparatively so small an amount. He realizes that this plea to the US is regularly made by small countries seeking aid, but he impressed me as being sincere about the true argency of his mission for Chana.
- 4. He pointed out that the Volta project is a good benkable one, and the loan will be paid back out of proceeds from resulting power. He said that Ghana has never before asked the US for a nickel; is not new looking for a grant but a businesslike lasm. Even if the power matter failed for some unexpected reason, the country rould and would pay the debt. Goedenah pointed to the national budget which increased from 129 million ten years ago to 1104 million in 1960, all from texetion. The Ghansian Government has put \$150 million in development projects during this period from current income. It has done no berrowing, has no external debt, and has shout [100 million invested in the UK. The economy is sound.

- 5. Goedensh was profoundly disturbed when he talked to me on 11 and 13 Aug 60. We have known each other well for a long time, yet he has never before "let his hair down" as he has on this matter. He must report to Nkrumah on Friday morning, 19 Aug 60, regarding the success or failure of his mission. He talked by telephone to the Fresident il Aug 60 but did not talk him about the US\$5 million shortage, merely saying that there were still a few difficult details. Kkrumah replied that Ghana would not be put into the position of beseeching the US for the loans he would rather give up the whole thing and turn elsewhere. Goedensh is sure that if he must report to the Prosident that he has returned without the additional US\$5 million, that Nkrumah will immediately have his secretary call the Soviet Ambassador.
- 6. The Finance Minister teld me that there had been considerable unhappiness in Ghann when Narusah decided to become President rather than remaining Prime Minister. If the discretent over this mong high party members had been allowed to break out, the opposition could have exploited the schime and the government would have fallen. The conflict was contained within the cabinet and at the highest party levels, but the tensoness and danger remain. (Dedcamb said that Narusah is an egotist and some poverful people do not like his self-glorification. Sedemah commented that "Narusah's days are numbered" but would not enlarge further.
- 7. Gbedessh is convinced that if the US\$5 million is not constitted, "it will be the straw to break the cessel's back". He does not know why the REF was so adament in the matter, but says that "this is a question of saving a country for the cost of a B=7 beambor". Extumel, he assured me, is leaning more and more away from the West, and failure to get the loan from the US will finally make the President turn to the UEER for the entire amount. The Soviets will surely agree to such an opportunity, so that the US position in Ghama is "hanging in the balance" in the next few days. Gbedessh is still hopeful that he will have favorable word, before he has to report to Marassh is Actro, that the US\$5 million has been granted, but he does not think this will really come to pass.

Has been informally consulted by two friends concerned with developments in the Philippines. One is a UB businessman of many years standing in the area and the other is a Wilipino who was very close to President Magseysay and his administration.

- I. I have been informed by one whom I consider a reliable source in the Embassy of the Philippines that Carlos Repulo will be relieved of his post as Ambassador to the US in early 170. Though there have been other minor amoyaness which have contributed to President Carlos Garcia's disaffection with Romalo e g, Romalo's recent appearance in US macasine advertisements enforcing the Lincoln automobile, Garcia's real loss of faith in Romalo came after Garcia's return to the Philippines from his US visit in the Summer of 1958 with assurances from Romalo that considerable US economic aid would be forthcoming in the near future / See 00-B-3125330 7.
- 2. Enumilo's removal as Ambassador has been delayed because he is a symbol of US/Failipp'ne friendship, and Romalo has let it be known to Garcia that h's removal as Ambassaior will certainly lend such credence to acti-US charges levelled against the Garcia administration. Garcia will have to find another assignment with some prestige for Romalo in the Philippines.
- 3. I am told that the new Asbassador to the US will be Eduardo Z Remaldez, the president of the Philippine Estimal Bank. Romandez was in the US for the World Bank sestings this month / September 1959 / and I met and talked with him. I was very favorably impressed with him. He recognizes the need of the Philippine Government for good public relations representation in the US, and has stated that funds for such a public relations program should be supplied by the Central Bank of the Philippines. He cited the assistance which could be rendered by a competent US public relations firm in advising the Philippine Government in regard to the preparation and presentation of economic surveys to the Development Loan Fund in support of Philippine requests for economic aid.
- b. I understand that Romaldes avoided any contact with the Philippine Rebassy while in Washington. The Rebassy called him to inquire why he had not visited the Embassy; he excused himself because of the press of business matters.

 The real reason, I understand, for his failure to visit the Embassy was his desire to avoid any embarrassing situation or to give the impression that he was previous his future post.

- 1. I have been in touch with the Chaosian Embassy for several weeks in regard to the state visit of President Sekou Trairs of Quinea, which will begin on 26 October 1959. In view of the fact that Quinea has no embassy or chancellery in Washington, the Chinaian Embassy was instructed by its government to render every service possible to Ambassador Walls Disllo of Quinea to insure the successful state visit of Tours. Tells, who presented his credentials in June 1959 and them returned to Quinea, seem back to the US only sign or seven weeks ago. He has been in New York almost constantly since his return to the US, and from all appearances, was not too concerned with Maure's impending visit.
- · 2. Since my firm had done public relations work for the Chanaian Embassy in the past, they contacted us to assist them in Locating appropriate real estate in Washington for the Babassy of Guizea. We selected several good properties and Telli came down from how bork to inspect them. So left without making any decision, saying he would be back again to lock at the properties. Manhile, the Chanaion Exhausy eas becoming rather anxious in regard to arrangements for fluors's visit, and Telli was apparently unconcerned, issuing no instructions for Thurs's itinerary while in Washington, no arrangements for receptions, etc. Telli simply left, saying he would be back. Time passed and felli did not return. The Chanaian Entassy was becoming quite auxious, and their task was doubly hard because of Ambassador # M Chapman's recall to Chama. (Chapman's recall, incidentally, was supposed to have been temporary. I understand that he was recalled because it was discovered that he was committing with the political opposition in Chana.) The ennouncement was then made that William Example Queo Eals would be the new Ambassedor to the US, but Haim had not arrived during the period that the Chanalan Embassy was trying to pin down Telli to discuss arrangements for Toure's visit. The Changian Rabassy was becoming a little amoyed.
- 3. In late September 1959 I discussed this problem with Ghana's Finance Binister. Komia A Ghademah, who was in the US for World Bank meetings, and his reaction was that he did not believe that Telli had funds to purchase an embassy property, and that he was embarrassed. As a result of Telli's unavailability and the understandable annoyance of the Ghanaian Embassy, Antessair Balm on his arrival in Hashington

Telli, I was informed, had requested funds for public relations from President Tours, but had received no reply.
- J. I then called several hotels in Washington to determine whether or not any arrangements had been made for receptions at which Tours would be host. The Mayflower Hotel is handling a Tours reception for a thousand guests on 27 October 1959. I asked who was handling the arrangements for the reception and was referred to a Counsellor of the Liberian Embassy. The reason for Ambassador Telli's disregard for the repeated and frantic inquiries from the Ghamaian Embassy in regard to Tours's visit immediately became apparent. In my opinion, this deliberate snub of the Ghamaian Embassy is indicative of very strained relations between the governments of Ghama and Guinea. Further, Ambassador Halm of Ghama has not yet presented his credentials, so be is still in Washington in an unofficial especity. I am sure that he does not intend to present his credentials until after Tours's visit. In this way, he successfully avoids being identified in any official capacity with Tours's visit.
- After my brief chat with Finance Minister Chedemah at the World Bank meetings, I had dinner with him the following week in Bow York. Though he does not receive the public recognition abroad enjoyed by Kojo Dotsio, Chana's Minister of Economic Affairs, Goedenah is recognized in Chana as Nkrumah's right ham wan and most influential adviser. Everything of major importance done by Mirmah has been discussed with Gbedemah, and has his approval. He has Exrumah's respect to the point where he is apparently quite independent in his actions. This was illustrated to me in our discussion of the meeting of African leaders last summer [1959] in Liberia. According to Obodersh, he had strongly advised against Nkrumah's attendance at the conference and ked flutly refused to accompany Herewin. Glodeniah said that the conference was a major set back for Firezah, where Marumah's dream of African Federation had been successfully punctured by President William Tulaman's moderation policy and urgings that any final decisions be delayed until the next aseting in 1960 when the leaders of new independent African states would be present. Basai, who was formarly Chisf Minister of Bombey, and is presently Jawaharial Behru's right hand, told me that the Indian Government had conclusive proof that the recent food riots in Bombey and Calcutta were communistingspired. Failure of food prices to decline in Bombey and Calcutta when India has just hervested a humber food crop, he said, was directly attributable to communist activities in the farming area villages around the two cities. Communist activities in the farming area villages around to insure higher prices for their crops when they do sail, that the crops should not be sent to the cities for marketing. This, according to Desai, quite naturally forced food prices in the cities to remain at a high level. The communist agitators then incited and organized the riots in the cities against the high cost of food.
- 2. I asked bessi what chance the communist party had of returning to power in Kerala when elections are held in early 1960. His reply was that the communists did not stand a chance of re-election, that the people of Kerala were completely disillusioned, and under no circumstances would wote for the return of a communist government in Kerala.

- 1. I have been in touch with the Ghanaian Ambassy for several weeks in regard to the state visit of President Sekow Toure of Guinos, which will begin on 26 Oct 59. In view of the fect that Guinea has no embansy or chancery in Washington, the Chancian Embassy was instructed by its government to render every service possible to Ambassador Diallo Tella of Quinen to insure the successful state visit of foure. Telle, who presented his credentials in Jun 59 and than returned to Guinea, came back to the US only six or seven weeks ago. He has been in Hew York almost constantly since his return to the US, and from all appearances, was not too concerned with Toure's impending
- 2. Having done public relations work for the Changian Embassy in the past, they contacted my firm to appist them in locating appropriate real estate in Washington for the Embensy of Guinea. We selected several good properties and Telle care down from Hew York to inspect them. He left without making any decision, saying he would be back again to look at the properties. Meanwhile, the Chancian Embassy was becoming rather anxious in regard to arrangements for Toure's visit, and Tella was apparently unconcerned issuing no instructions for Tours's itinerary while in Hashington, no arrangements for receptions, etc. Telle cimply last, saying he would be back. Time passed and Telle did not return. The Chanaian Embassy was becoming quite envious, and their task was doubly hard because of Ambassador C H Chapman's recall to Chana. (Chapman's recall, incidentally, was supposed to have been temporary. I understand that he was recalled because it was discovered that he was couniving with the political opposition in Chara.) The announcement was then made that William Marmon Quao Halm would be the new Ambassador to the US, but Halm had not arrived during the period that the Charaian Embassy was trying to pin down Telle to discuss arrangements for Toure's visit. The Charles Embasey was becoming a little
- 3. In late 8ep 59 I discussed this problem with Chang's Finance Winister, Komla A Gbedemah, who was in the US for World Hank meetings, and his geaction was that he did not believe that Telle had funds to purchase an embassy property, and that he was embarrassed. As a result of Telle's unavailability and the understandable annoyance of the Ghanaian Embassy, Ambassador Halm on his arrival in Washington was instructed to be polite to Telle and to Toure's party on arrival, but to attempt to give no further assistance and to let the visit fall on its face, so

- 4. I was, nevertheless, still interested in the Tours visit from a professional standpoint, and could not believe that arrangements vore not being made to take care of Toure's party. When the Department of State put/out an itinerary on Toure's visit on 19 Oct 59, I knew that someone had to be making arrangements. I learned that Ambassador Telle had come down from New York for one day the week of 12 Oct 59 with a public relations man of Olin Mathieson, but that Telle had not gone near the Channian Embassy. I assumed that Olin Mothieson was performing the services offered by the Chammian Embassy. I contacted friends in Olin Mathieson and was informed that because of their extensive aluminum project in Guinea, they were extending whatever assistance and courtesy they could to Telle, but that they were handling no publicity for the Tours visit, her were they arranging for any state functions in Washington. Olin Mathieson had supplied a Frenchspeaking secretary to assist Ambussedor Telle during the course of legal transactions involving, I am told, the purchase of a very fine building in New York -- this would tend to discredit Goedemah's assumption that Telle did not have funds for purchase of an embassy in Washington }- but Olin Mathieson had done no public relations work for Telle. Telle, I was informed, had requested funds for public relations from President Toure, but had received no reply.
- 5. I then called several hotels in Washington to determine whether of not any arrangements had been made for receptions at which Toure would be host. The Mayflower Hotel is handling a Toure reception for a thousand guests on 27 Oct 59. I asked who was handling the arrangements for the reception and was referred to a Counsellor of the Liberian Embassy. The reason for Ambassador Telle's disregard for the repeated and frantic inquiries from the Ghanaian Embassy in regard to Toure's visit immediately became apparent. In my opinion, this deliberate smab of the Ghanaian Embassy is indicative of very strained relations between the governments of Ghana and Guinea. Further, Ambassador Halm of Ghana has not yet presented his credentials, so he is still in Washington in an unofficial capacity. I am sure that he does not intend to present his credentials until after Toure's visit. In this way, he successfully avoids being identified in any official capacity with Toure's visit. I do not believe, however, that any open rupture is imminent between the two governments. It would do Kwame Nkrumah's dream of federation no good to have the first African state with which he has formed a federation blow up in his face; I believe he will bide his time until the next meeting of the heads of African States in Liberia next year 19607.
- 6. After my brief chat with Finance Minister Goedemah at the World Bank meetings, I had dinner with him the following week in New York. Though he does not receive the public recognition abroad enjoyed by Kojo Botsio, Ghana's Minister of Economic Affairs, Gbedemah is recognized in Ghana as Mkrumah's right hand man and most influential adviser. Everything of major importance done by Murumah has been discussed with Chedemah, and has his approval. He has Nkrumah's respect to the point where he is apparently quite independent in his actions. This was illustrated to me in our discussion of the meeting of African leaders last summer [1959] in Liberia. According to Goedemah, he had strongly advised against Nkrumah's attendance at the conference and had flatly refused to accompany likrumah. Gbederah said that the conference was a major set back for Mcrymah, where Mcrymah's dream of African Federation had been successfully punctured by President William Tubman's moderation policy and urgings that any final decisions be delayed until the next meeting in 1960 when the leaders of new independent African states would be present. President Toure of Quines - supposedly federated with Chana - supported Tubman. I told Goedemah I found this hard to understand and asked him for his personal opinion of Toure. I was annoyed at his reply, for Ghedemah, though a direct and frank individual, is not given to making derogatory statements about other heads of state. Gbedeman said of Toure, "The man is a crook, a damagogue and an opportunist".

- 1. Indian government and business visitors to the US have been aghast in recent weeks at the anti-US statements of the new Indian Ambassador Mahomed Ali C Chagla. These include charges against US shipments of arms to Fakistan. The Indians feel that the Ambassador is being highly undiplomatic and cannot believe that he is acting under orders from home.
- 2. On 22 Jm 59, I talked with an important Indian industrialist, who formerly held a high post in the Indian Government and is quite close to Javaharlal Mehru. He told me flatly that the Ambassador is following an independent line and is not under Mehru's instructions, although it may be possible that he has tacit consent to proceed. I received the impression that the Indian Government is not too happy with the situation but has not yet instructed the Ambassador to desist. Mehru is always inclined not to interfere with his diplomatic representatives unless they get completely out of line.
- 3. My informant said that he thinks the real reason for the Ambassador's actions is a personal one. Chagla probably recognizes the fact that he is one of the last of the old Muslim leaders whose careur dates back to the fight for independence. At that time he was a strong supporter of Mohassad Ali Jimah, but broke with Jimah when he supported a partition of India into two separate countries. Chagla then joined the Congress Party with Nehru and became the Chief Justice of Bombay. Now, he has political ambitions for a Cabinet post. He is making the brash statements primarily for home coasumption to accomplish his desire.
- 4. I was also told that the Ambassador is trying to take credit privately for the fact that the US Congress has moved to send less arms aid abroad.

- 1. During a conference in the US on Indian conomic development on 4-5 May 59, I had several opportunities to talk informally with the Indian Eccialist Party leader, A Liehta. Under questioning, he told me that the Socialist Porty actually coincides almost 99 percent with the beliefs of the Echru Covernment, but disagrees on aspects of policy and administration. In effect, his is just another "opposition" party. Eccialism in India means equality of opportunity and not too great a concentration of wealth in anyone's hands. He pointed out that he is for private enterprise and used as an example the fact that he persuaded the Indian Covernment to get out of the fertilizer business and permit it to be handled by private enterprise. He believes that business should do the jobs for which it is capable and the government handle those it
- 2. At the time of the Tibetan revolt, he demanded that he shows " Mehru make a firm policy against Communist China. How, he is glad that Nehru did not do so because the Prime Minister knew that any such move would jeopardize the flight of the Dalai Lama, which he had been privately informed was then in progress. Mehta added that the Tibetan incident has had more effect on Indian public opinion than any event since Independence. The people at all levels are deeply shocked. He agrees that the Indian Government must maintain its position of non-alignment officially, but the people and public servants can continue to have strongly anti-communist sentiments. India is at last aroused to the darger of communism, which it was not at the time of the distant Hungarian repression.
- 3. He felt that the situation in Kerala State was primarily because of a "botch" by the Congress Party. He thought that the communists won the initial election because the people voted in protest against the Congress Party. They were not communist sympathizers but were merely disgusted with the government. Communist success the second time was traceable to much the same situation - second rate Congress Party conditates and ineffective policies. He is certain that the communists cannot long remain in power in Kerala if the Congress Party will put up good people. During these statements, it was obvious that, though an anticommunist himself, Mehta was not particularly concerned over Kerala. He regarded it almost as an example that elective democracy is actually working in India.
- 4. Mehta is concerned over Kehru's drive to implement the new cooperative farming plan. He agrees that India must increase farming production but this plan will not be popular. Anything which affects peasant community of land cannot get

While in the US, he had a quiet conference with the Pukistani Ashassador on this subject and told me that he frequently makes trips to Pakistan itself, to talk to its leaders. Mehta felt that Nehru may be coming around to drop his personal acti-Pakistan feelings, which were brought about largely by what he considered ill use by Pakistan at the time of the Kashmir crisis. Mehta also believes that the Tibetan revolt has made both the Indians and Pakistani more conscious of the fact that they must get together to solve their problems, a correlate a more activities.
- 6. Nehta agreed that the West had taken the correct steps in the cold war to contain communist night and aggression. However, he did think that there must be some method by which the strains of the cold war could be relaxed.

Has been informally consulted by two friends concerned with developments in the Philippines. One is a US businessman of many years standing in the area and the other is a Filipino who was very close to President Magsaysay and his administration.

- Two friends of mine, who are in close touch with developments in the Philippines, are most concerned about the present strained relations between that country and the US. One is a US businessman with many years' experience in the country and the other is a Filipino who was very close to President Magsaysay and still has important political connections with the Garcia regime.
- 2. They have told and fairly convinced me that the main cause for the rift between the countries is the Philippine Ambassador to the US, Carlos Romulo. I could not believe this at first because it seemed to be so completely out of character.
- 3. The story is that prior to the arrival in the US in June 1958, of President Carlos Garcia, Romulo had been forwarding messages that a substantial US loan was a foregone conclusion and he could personally arrange it, in effect by a few telephone calls. After President Garcia reached Washington, Romulo told him that he had the commitment for US\$100 million, which was not true. At a meeting with President Eisenhower, President Garcia mentioned the needs of the Philippines and alsomower replied in general terms about the US desire to be helpful. This Garcia interpreted as confirmation of Romulo's statement about the loan. Garcia cabled his government to this effect and also made statements to the press at the time of his departure.
- t. When the loan was not forthcoming, Garcia became bitter and was strengthened in his beliefs by further misleading cables from Romulo that the US was not living up to its agreement, that he was working on it, etc. It was not until Garcia went to Japan December 1958 and had an opportunity to talk to my Filipino friend that he got the true state of affairs. He asked my friend what was happening in the US and was told of Romulo's activities.

He does not wish to return to the Philippines and does not want to lose his exhaseadorship. For this reason, he has continued to fabricate or to mislead his own government and to foster the difficulties between the two countries. By friends are convinced that Rossilo must be removed in some manner for the good of the Philippines. They support the Garcia administration, because it is legally in power, but their view is the long one. There will be an election in two years and the problems between the US and the Philippines, which are largely misunderstandings, must be solved before it might be too late for the next administration to repair the damage.

- The international maritime boycott, which became effective in December 1958, against the "flage of convenience" of US-owned wessels registered under foreign nations, has caused considerable consternation within the Liberian Jovernment. Liberians realize that the countries involved (Liberia, Panama, Hondures, Dominican Republic) have been made to link like co-conspirators with the US ship operators to defraud the US of revenue and taxes and to avoid the standards of US maritime law. With the continuance of such a boycott, the Liberians fear that their international reputation will be increasingly burt.
- 2. I have learned that in the case of Liberia, the blanket condemnation is not justifiable because the wages of ship crows under Liberian law are the highest after those of the US and the US maritime code of safety was adopted by Liberia verbatim. The operation of Liberian registered vensels is quite effectively administered according to those regulations, and, as a general rule, Liberian consuls inspect every Liberian flag vessel calling in their
- 3. While this data is undoubtedly known, there is another factor involved. Liberia has the fourth largest fleet in the world under its flag, including the majority of the best and nevest US tankers. In the event of war, liberia has a standing agreement with the US that these vessels will be switched to US esthority without formalities. Such an agreement does not exist under other foreign flag arrangements. Some individuals concerned with the Marchant Marine feel, therefore, that this boycott is a highly desirable technique on the part of the commists (probably influential in some of the unions involved). It will be used to switch these vital US vessels to a foreign flag, which would be considerably less accessible in a national emergency, so that the US would not have prospe and effective control over necessary shipping.
- 4. The Liberian Government cannot imperated why the US Government does not publicly state that it has approved the Liberian flag operation, and there is certainly the prospect that a continuance of this situation will hurt US/Liberian relations.

- 1. The negotiations in the US during December 1958 working towards a conclusion of the Development Loan Fund loan to Somalia produced what sypears to me an interesting development. Ostensibly, the Italians have been backing and assisting Somalia in this effort and are encounted all steps towards the independence of that country. In the latter part of December [1958], the loan in question reached a point where it was about to be approved. Officials of the Fund merely requested some additional facts finally to justify the financial commitment. This could enably have been provided by the Italian negotiator, but despite explanations to him in English and Italian, he appeared not to understand the issue involved. At the crutial time, it was learned that he had esturned to Italy for a visit, so that the loan will not be granted at present and a considerable dalay will cortainly be involved.
- 2. This loss, while comparatively small, is of considerable importance to Schmilia. The attitude of the Italians could be charged to ineptness; however, I personally question if this is the case or whether it is possible that the Italians would prefer to work more closely with Ethiopia them with Somalia on the border and other questions.
- 3. I have also heard a rumor that Haji Ferah Ali Omar, Minister of Economic Affeirs for Somalia, has been working closely with the Italians and has made a deal that, in return for Italian support of his being made Prine. Hinister upon granting of independence, he will continue to serve Italian interests.

The Counselor surprised me by saying that he had quietly approached and "lined" up" twenty substantial US companies which are ready to enter into commercial operations in Rgypt as soon as such a move would be feasible. The Egyptian has been strongly edvocating that there is ample room and much opportunity for US business in his country. 3. One of his projects is to establish a UB-Egyptian Chamber of Commerce. This would be done entirely as a private arrangement without participation of either government. On this basis, he feels that factual connercial information would Then be obtained and exchanged on a free basis, which would give a higher degree of creditability to businessmen of both countries than any government-sponsored organization. This would further serve to create enough confidence to reestablish normal commercial activity. 4. He had gone so far as to have letterheads printed, with the idea of establishing. the first headquarters in Cairo, but is now considering the advantages of initial steps being taken in the US. My impression is that the project is quite far along towards possible fruition. - and -: 24

- 1. I had a chat with my acquaintance, Dr Ibrahim Anis, Sudanese Ambassador to the US, on 11 How E. I asked him whether the Sudan would object to Egypt's building the high Asvan Dam on its own territory. He replied that the Sudan could not object, but that, of course, the dam size would then have to be limited, as would the water storage area and resulting electric power mode available by the dam. Such a development would not cause real trouble with the Sudan so long as the whole operation was kept well within the Egyptian border.
- 2. He said that the Egyptians had admitted that if the two countries were one, they would build a series of low dams, and then some lower version of Aswan. He felt that this was a telling argument against Egypt's present dam position, since that plan is the same as now advocated by the Sudan. It refutes the Egyptian line that the Sudan is a leviess nation which has abrogated the treaty on use of Hile Vater. Honetheless, the Ambassador could not conceive any set of circumstances which would cause a truly serious rupture between the two countries, though Egypt tries to promote propaganda crises. He is sure that Gamal Abdul Hasir would never resort to military force against the Sudan and rather naively added that he did not think that there had been any serious Egyptian-inspired subversion attempts within the Sudan. His opinion is that Sudanese-Egyptian relations will never reach a crisis in fact because both countries wish to maintain at least the scmblance of Arab brotherhood.
- 3. We then discussed the Egyptian propaganda assault on the Sudan over the Hile waters, and the fact that the Sudan had never publicly told its version of the Hile dispute. There is some consideration by the Sudanese Government of preparing a "white paper" on the subject, and possibly inviting prominent foreign newsmen to Khartoum for a perambulating press conference. This would include two or three days of guided tours, conducted by the Foreign Minister, to show on the ground the effects on the Sudan of the Asvan Dam. These plans have not been approved as yet, and may not be, because of the fear by the Foreign Minister and the Ambassador that such a move might prejudice Egyptian negotiations.
- 4. The Ambassacor said that both he and the Foreign Minister are worried that the US is seemingly unconcerned over the Kile problem of the Sudan. Its concentration now is to counter the effects of the announced Soviet aid to Egypt to start the Aswan Dam and the Sudan aspect is being overlooked at an important time, Ambassador semi-seriously recommended that the US should grant the Sudan US\$100 million so that it could go sheed with its own dam projects. This would serve the purpose of countering the Soviet grant to Egypt and would still indicate US interest in progress for Arab states.
- 5. He remarked that the recent US loan-development fund for the Sudan had produced considerable political opposition within the country. He blamed this entirely on mishandling by his own government and said that the amountement and explanation to the people made it appear that the Sudanese Government had "sold out" or had

- 1. I have had several conversations with Lillian Karika, a US citizen of Greek descent, who worked for Greek War Relief and became friendly as a result with many important Greeks. After World War II she learned of the Eank of Kios, which had been an effective organization but had been caught in the postwar inflation and had become inactive, though not liquidated. By negotiation with its private Greek owners she acquired 99.6% of the stock, and thereby became the first US citizen to control a Greek bank through the instrument of a New York City holding company.
- 2. The Bank of Kios owns, free and clear, two iron mines in Greece (one about worked out and not now economical, and the other rich in both iron and nickel), an insurance company and some real estate in Greece. Assets are estimated to be between US\$3-5 million. The main problem is that the bank owes the Greek Government US\$1 million, but is otherwise out of debt.
- 3. She attempted through various methods and negotiations to reactivate the good mine. She had surveys made, indicating good quality ore, and at one time had arranged with a German ecocorn to supply equipment and technical personnel in return for royalties on ore produced. She also had dealings with the French Banc du Nord for further financing, but learned that it was fronting for a Communist organization which wanted to participate. These attempts have not succeeded to date because she could not conclude any final arrangements until the debt to the Greek Government had been aliminated.
- Though many Middle East businessmen would velcome a US-owned bank operating in Greece, she has been unable to obtain any medium or long range development loans without emorbitant interest rates. One offer she has been hesitant to accept came from a Canadian firm, which offered to advance her US\$650 thousand which would settle the Government claim for US\$1 million. In return she would have had to agree to buy US\$3 million worth of gold bullion owned by the Canadian firm in Mexico. The terms were that she would pay about US\$31.50 per gold unit, bring it to Greece and then resell it to the Canadians at US\$32.50. She does not know the reason for the deal except that possibly the Canadians wanted to transfer the bullion to Isracl on a percentage arrangement of the sales price.
- 5. At one stage, a major US sempany / / took two thousand tons of iron ore for testing in the US, and when it proved out well she thought she would have a regular supply arrangement. It turned out, however, that the company has a deal with Biarchos to supply Greek-made steel plate for his new Greek shippard, with the help of another important US technical firm / /. These companies were not interested in working with her but had other plans. She learned that they had hopes of acquiring her mining property through the Greek Government. The syndicate officials did meet

Has negotiated with the Sudanese for some time about the possibility of handling some of their public relations work in the US.

- 1. For some time I have made overtures to the Eudanese about conducting public relations work in the UE for their country. They regularly stated that they would like such assistance but did not have the funds to support a proper program. Early in September 1958 the indanese Ambassador to the US, Ibrahim Anis, received a cable from Khartoum ordering him to do everything possible to inform the US public in favor of the election of Mohammed Ahmed Mahgoul the Sudanese Roreign Minister, to the presidency of the 13th United Nations' General Assembly. In this, the Sudanese Covernment had two objectives - to obtain this honor for Mahgoub and to call attention to the Sudan and its position in world affairs.
- 2. The Sudan has endeavored to maintain a position of strict neutrality since obtaining its independence and has tried to avoid any foreign entanglements. The main reason has been that the Sudanese Government recognized the gravity of the task of vital demestic economic development and felt that all energies must be spent in that direction. It joined the Arab League primarily from the standpoint of "brotherhood" but has still tried to remain completely neutral as a nation. The fact that the Council of the Arab League decided to support Mahgoub in the UN was based mostly on the fact that the Arabs considered Charles Malik of Lebanon, the other major candidate, too pro-west and anti-Arab in his views and orientation.
- 3. In a meeting with Mahgoub before the UH election, he commented that he was puzzled by the phobia of the US people over pan-Arab nationalism, Gamal Abdul Hasir and communism. He said that the US today equates Arab nationalism and pride with Nasirism, when in fact, Arab nationalism has been a fact for years before Hasir. He added that the Sudan has had its troubles with Easir's Egypt but he did not personally believe that Rasir had organized actual plots to overthrow the Sudanese Covernment. Mahgoub also remarked on repeated offers of Soviet aid to the Sudan during the past year. He said that he had frequently challenged the Soviet ambassador to be more concrete and had always been given some sort of excuse. The ambassador recently said under a similar attack that he was going to Moscow and would have something definite to say on his return.
- 4. During the period leading up to the dection, the majority of the Asian, Arab and independent African states backed Mahgoub's candidacy because they considered his to be an unencumbered position, while Malik has become identified with the US. In addition, this support was given to prove, by his election, the emergence of the influence of small nations in the UN, as differentiated from the current leadership of the giants. Until Sunday, 14 Sep 58, the Mahgoub group had pledges enough to make it believe he would win. But at that point the US started actively to campaign for Malik. This move was resented by Mahgoub. Although he

recognized the US need to bener its pledge to support Malik, he believed that US activities far exceeded the commitment to Malik. The Subarese, however, were not so irritated as the Arab states, which felt that the US was trying to influence them to desert the man of their choice in favor of the US selection. They considered this directly contrary to President Eisenhover's suggestion that the Araba should do everything possible to solve their own problems.

- Sabgoub told me he was sure of thirty-nine votes, with five more probables and some additional possibilities an hour before the election. The Scandinavian countries informed him the day before that they would not vote for Malik.

 South America had divided in opinion and would not vote as a bloc. Of these, Mahgoub had six pledges of support but in the final count, he ended without a single vote from Latin American as a result of what he called "threats" from the US. The Ghana delegate felt that he had a higher duty than to support the UK, as a member of the Commonwealth, in voting for Malik. Liberia had been the first nation in Africa to back the Eisenhower Doctrine and to support the US landings in Lebanon, but it too felt that a neutral moderator should be elected.
- 6. The Sudarese were upset by the anti-Mangoub rumors, which they are convinced were festered by the US, that the Sudan is pro-communist and pro-Arab. These stories were common in the UN in the final days before the vote and went so far as to say that Mangoub himsel? was a pro-Masir stooge, despite his record. The Sudanese do not consider themselves "neutral on the side of the USSR", and in fact have an effective anti-communist law. They feel that their country's reputation was blackened unjustly by these rumors and the resulting election. It may now be hard to combat Soviet propaganda opportunities in the Sudan, such as claims that the US opposed a black Moslem in favor of a white Christian and that the USSR backed the Sudan while the US supported the other side to its own national interest. Mangoub fears that it will be hard for the Sudanese people to resist such propaganda in their disappointment at the outcome of the election. He is certain that the Sudanese papers will be full of Soviet-instigated anti-US material and the main job will be to "cool off" the public.
- 7. Mahgoub believes that the Arab nations will be most irritated at Malik's election, but that it will take some time to determine actual effects. He asked me whether the US was interested in justifying its policy regardless of the consequences or was at truly interested in making friends in Africa. He felt that the US had much possibly to lose and really little to gain by such apparent intervention in favor of one man, Malik, who is not even supported by his own Lebanon. Mahgoub was certain that General Shehab did not endorse Malik, as was reported in the US press. Shehab always issues public statements as written commiques, which did not occur in this instance. A US correspondent had telephoned Shehab for a story and in conversation Shehab had casually mentioned that Malik was a Lebanese and he wished him well. The ultimate story did not appear in the Lebanese press because Shehab himself controls cen corship in that country. In fact, the Lebanese press endorsed Mahgoub even more than did the Sudanese papere.
- Malik. Malik's wife was raised in Khartoum and the two men have known each other for many years. Mahgoub commented that before he left the UN the last time Malik had told him that he would withdraw his own candidacy if Mahgoub should be supported by the Arab states. This did not come about and my impression from personal talks with Mahgoub was that the whole affair ended in sorrow for him rather than in anger. He and his colleagues had hoped to gain more world prestige and knowledge about the Sudan, but now fear that its carefully fostered neutral stance has been eclipsed by the stories that Mahgoub was pro-communist. Mahgoub told me that he now plans to stay through the early part of the UN session and then will do what he can to keep Sudan public opinion on an even keel. He added that there might be another chance for him to be elected president of the Assembly.
