ACTION REQUESTED - REFERENCES			
<p>1. On 27 February 1968 COS met with LIHUFF/1. During the meeting, LIHUFF/1 was reminiscing about World war II and his days in the U.S. Army and specifically in MIS/X. The "X" indicated that their primary function was to recover and debrief Americans who had been captured by the Japanese. The unit in China with which LIHUFF/1 served as known as "A.G.A.S." (Aid Group of the Armed Services) for cover reasons.</p> <p>2. LIHUFF/1 and his group worked in the part of China bordering Vietnam; and, particularly after the French were practically all been arrested, they established a very close working relationship with Ho Chi Minh (known as Chi Minh HOO).</p> <p>3. LIHUFF/1 had many personal meetings with ho Chi Minh who, at that time, claimed to be an admirer of Americans, American-type democracy and President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Ho Chi Minh repeatedly said, in those days, that he wished "Dominion Status" in the French Empire for his people. He also said he considered the "Atlantic Charter" a great and historic document which he hoped could be duplicated for, or extended to, the Pacific area.</p> <p>4. At the end of the War, Ho Chi Minh sent a personal letter in English to LIHUFF/1. A Xerox copy of this letter is attached under separate cover. Ho Chi Minh speaks Vietnamese, Chinese, French, Russian and English.</p>

LIHUFF/I is willing -- should this be desired -- to write to Ho Chi Minh (attaching a copy of Ho Chi Minh's letter to him) and ask if Ho Chi Minh would permit him to visit him and talk with him in Hanoi.</p> <p>6. LIHUFF/I realizes that Ho Chi Minh may know he is a "Right Wing Capitalist" and may never reply; or, if he does reply, may refuse to give LIHUFF/I permission to enter North Vietnam.</p> <p>7. It is requested that Headquarters reply, indicating whether or not there is any interest in having LIHUFF/I make this effort. If there is interest, Headquarters assistance in drafting the letter is requested, and suggestions on how best to get the letter to Hanoi are needed.</p>

We thank you very much of sympathy & aid you have given us. We remain sure that in the USA or wherever you be, you will win more friends for our country & our cause.

On behalf of VFL, I send you a small souvenir - a lacquer painting by a Tongking artist, member of the VFL.
