- 1. On 4 March 1955 Emilio NINEZ Portuondo, Cuban Ambassador to the United Nations, wrote a personal letter to Octavio MARKEA, Panamanian Minister of Foreign Relations. The writer stated that after seven months in the Ministry of Labor, during which tire he met and solved many problems, President RATIBLE and offered him his choice of any Ministry, the Embassy in Washington, or continuation as the Cuban Ambassador to the United Nations. NUMEZ said that he chose the latter post and that it was in that capacity that he was writing to PARRIMA.
- 2. He then recalled that in the U. M. General Assembly of last year Oaka and aspired to a seat on the Security Journal and had had the promise of the support of Panama in this matter. However, Cuba had bowed out at this time when Peru claimed precedence in its right to a seat on the Security Council. At this time Juba announced its desire for the seat on the Security Council in the Jeneral Assembly scheduled to meet in November 1955.
- 3. NUMEZ then said that Cuba, through its diplomatic representatives, is soliciting support in this matter and that because at the present there is no other Latin American member of the U. N. with similiar aspirations he does not anticipate any conflicts of interest. He stated that to date their request for support had been replied to affirmatively by Chile, Argentina, Henduras, Haiti, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, and Peru.
- 4. NUNEZ then asked WABREGA to reply favorably as quickly as possible to the Guban request for support in this matter and added that, because of the excellent relations which they have always maintained, if he becomes a member of the Security Council, PABREGA may consider that he will represent Panama as well as Guba. NUNEZ continued by reminding FADRIMA that due to recommendations made by NUNEZ Guba voted in the General Assembly for RicardoyALFATO, Panamarian jurist, for a position on the International Court of Justice as well as a position on the International Law Corrission when this was requested by the Panamarian Government.
