

The Authority requires an Implementing Partner that is low risk with extensive experience successfully managing and delivering CSSF programmes. Torchlight's work for CSSF across the Middle East, North Africa and South Asia, including multiple years of delivery on highly relevant programmes in Lebanon and Morocco, means we are confident in our ability to proactively identify and manage risk ensuring the project *meets and exceeds its objectives*. We identify the highest risk to the programme delivery as Human Rights--the provision of additional tactical capability using the latest technology and investigational skills enabling partner nations to recover vast swathes of data of both private and personnel nature may be misused, breaching the rights and liberties of its citizens and leading to human rights concerns. To mitigate this, our approach ties together strict compliance with the UK's Overseas Security and Justice Assistance (OSJA) Guidance, International Human Rights, and recognised data protection principles. Our risk mitigation strategy includes provision of assurances and safeguards in the form of clear policies and guidance on proper usage to ensure working practices conform to the standards set and legal powers and where abuses are identified, they are reported on immediately. Misuse of data could lead to criminal and civil actions and/or contribute to miscarriages of justice. Our mitigation strategy will (a) analyse, assess and risk assess all material (b) set out clearly the threats to citizens' rights and how protection and classification of material is undertaken, (c) work within the framework of the countries laws, ensuring the principles of Capturing, Exploiting and Analysing evidence is lawful and support fair justice outcomes. Some risks which are specific or particularly relevant to this project, with an outline of our mitigation approach include.

Political	Terrorism: we assess that terrorism in all three countries currently poses more of an incidental than a direct risk, with most attacks targeting personnel and facilities associated with the security forces and occasionally politicians and political parties and their communities.
