1.5 Risk Management

Building trust, knowledge and a nuanced understanding of the environment in which the Consortium engage is key to our approach to ensure local commitment and ownership. Besides building on previous engagements in the region, partners feedback, targeted research, key experts and in-country support, our approach to ensuring work is locally driven and politically sensitive is strengthened by our commitment to building on long-running partnerships, relationships and trust built up with key beneficiaries across Eastern Partnership countries. This collaborative approach will empower beneficiaries to articulate their needs and co-define priority areas as well as ensure local relevance, sensitivity to context and inclusion of the local operating context.

Understanding and managing risk is also an overarching priority for the Consortium's delivery and as such, a live risk register has already been developed to include risks to the organisations, to long-term operations, as well as Duty of Care to personnel, and will be updated on a monthly basis.

Assumptions

The governments in Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine remain stable and there are no concerted attempts to interfere with the broadcasters and media outlets selected for the project.

The selected media outlets are truly independent and current leadership and management seek to develop them into an objective media platform.

The media outlets have the capacity and willingness to work with the consortium members to help improve their organisational and professional capacity. Progress and continuing management commitment, together with selected outlets' ability to absorb capacity development support, will be assessed on a regular basis in the quarterly reports.
