Following my colleague, Section 40 letter of 12 May in answer to your previous correspondence, it would appear that you have misunderstood the Ministry of Defence's limited interest in reports of 'unidentified flying objects'. It may therefore be helpful if I clarify our position.

The MOD does not have any expertise or role in respect of 'UFO/flying saucer' matters or to the question of the existence or otherwise of extraterrestrial lifeforms. While we remain totally openminded, to date we know of no evidence which substantiates the existence of these alleged phenomena.

Reports of sightings of 'UFOs' received by MOD are examined solely to establish whether they contain any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Once it is established a report does not contain such evidence we do not attempt to establish the precise nature of the sighting, as this would go beyond our specific defence remit.







We could not justify expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond our specific defence remit.

With regard to your particular observation, I have looked back through our sighting report files and can confirm that we received no other reports of 'UFO' sightings for 28 June from anywhere in the United Kingdom. We are satisfied that there is no corroborating evidence to suggest that the United Kingdom's airspace was breached by unauthorised air activity.

Finally, you said that you saw a medium sized aircraft fly into the area, about 5 minutes after the lights and enquired whether there were any aircraft in the area at the time. You may be interested to know that at the request of the local Police Helicopter Support Unit, low level military aircraft temporarily avoid the Glastonbury area during the festival. The arrangement, which is to prevent military aircraft conflicting with the increased level of emergency services and civil aviation, was in place between 26 and 30 June inclusive. I had thought the MOD would be the best people to inform about the following. To be quite honest its fairly cliched and embarassing actually having to write this, but there may be a possible UFO sighting last Saturday night, funnily enough about 300ft above the Pyramid stage at Glastonbury festival this year.

I don't believe that it was a lighting effect, plane or helicopter. There was cloud cover a few hundred feet above the lights. People noticed them moving from left to right across the the stage at about 11.22 pm it was directly above at 11.24pm at which point I took a photograph, the lights moved slowly along for another few minutes, then disappeared instantly.

The lights were shaped like this:

They were orange in colour and moved as a group, the lights appeared to be moving in a small circular motion. The points appeared to pivot along the lower left point to the right by about 60 degrees and continued on before disappearing. A medium sized aircraft flew in what appeared to be the same direction about 5 mintues later. I was hoping that you may have some record from air traffic control of any aircraft in that area at that time. 



We examine any reports of 'UFOs' we receive solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the UK from an external military source, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each reported sighting. We believe it is possible that rational explanations could be found for them, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. We could not justify expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond our specific defence remit.

With regard to your particular observation, we are satisfied that there is no evidence that UK airspace was breached by unauthorised military aircraft on 26 June.

As for identification of the type of aircraft you saw, you may wish to be aware that military aircrew conducting low flying training (below 2000 feet) are required to book their routes through particular low flying areas and it is therefore possible to say which aircraft are booked into which areas at a given time. However, above 2000 feet, outside of Military Air Traffic Zones, they fly in uncontrolled airspace, where there is no such requirement. We are therefore unable to assist with your enquiry. As you were unable to see any markings it is also possible that the aircraft you saw was civilian.





The reason for this letter is a new enquiry about a reported event in the Hull area currently proliferating the Internet and involving a UFO/s observation conjointly with the Humberside Police Helicopter, occurring on 30 May 2003 at 23:25. I ponder if you have received any correspondence and/or other enquiries about an alleged UFO incident on this date in the East Yorkshire and Lincolnshire areas and what you may be at liberty to divulge about them?

I have written to the local 'Humberside Police Helicopter Support Section' to enquire with them, but wonder if any report has reached the MoD from them or any other source? If so, how many reports/enquiries and what is stated, asked? Does the MoD have an explanation for what may have been observed?

Here is the report as it appears on the Internet, verbatim:-

I am writing with reference to your letter of 21st January addressed to my colleague Section 40 regarding your daughter's telephone call to this office on the 10th January. It may help if I clarify matters.

I spoke to your daughter at approximately 09.10 on the 10th January when she told me she had seen lights in the sky in the early hours of that morning. She described the lights as formed in the shape of a worm, wriggling around in the sky and then described events similar to those in your letter. Your daughter told me you telephoned Peckham Police and that they had sent Policemen and people dressed in "space suits" with dark glasses to visit you. She was particularly concerned as to who these people might be.

As Section 40 Informed you, the only interest the Ministry of Defence has in sightings of unusual lights or objects seen in the sky is whether they present any evidence that UK airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Following your daughter's call, I made enquiries with our air defence experts, who confirmed there had been no events of air defence concern. I also spoke to Peckham Police who confirmed that they had sent Policemen to visit you.

With regard to the people in "forensic boiler suits" as mentioned in your letter, I should inform you that Ministry of Defence investigations do not go beyond those described above and we do not send anyone to visit people who report sightings to us. I am sorry to hear that you are experiencing problems with your eyes, but I can assure you that these events were not instigated by the Ministry of Defence and we were unaware of them until your daughter's telephone call. If you have any enquiries about the Police handling of your telephone calls these should be directed to Peckham Police.

We are in receipt of your letter dated 16th Jan '03 and I reply on behalf of my daughter Section 40 r myself.

First of all I would like to point out that neither my daughter nor myself have any interest in flying sourcers, UFO'S or the like and only informed Peckham Police Station Vecause what we saw, by pure chance, was so unusual. We did not ask the police to come to our house as we did not feel threatened or frightened. It was their suggestion to come.

We do not doubt your integrity in the way you maintain air defence in the U.K. and we did not ask you to investigate anything on our behalf, as your letter implies.

you also state in your letter that two officers called on us at approx 3-15 am. This is incorrect. Two officers called on 9/1/03 at approx 2:15 am, the same two officers came back at approx 3:15 am, this time dressed in white forensic boiler suits and black anti uv binocular glasses and they were accompanied by two other police offices in normal police uniforms. They told us they had made a definite confirmed sighting and advised us not to look at the object through binoculars as we had been doing. They asked us if we would like to see a Police Doctor or use a solution to bathe our eyes, although our eyes were Smarting and watery we did not think we needed to see a

doctor at that stage. The afficus advised us that should our eyes worsen or if we developed head-aches we should call the estation and the police doctor would come to examine us.

The afficers asked us if we had called the media or told neighbours, which we had not and still haven't. They suggested if any neighbours asked we should say use had a gas leak. They spoke as 'Mork to Mindy' over their walkie-talkie and they asked us what our birth signs were, They also asked us if an ambulance had called alour house that day which we thought was a very estrange thing to ask. His reply was "these things are attracted to ambulances".

We have since learned that Mork & Mindy was a T.V. programme about aliens, your men have fed us with a lot of uubbish, presumably to make us look foolish and our story unbelievable, which they have isucceeded in doing. The cruellest play of all came from a P. C. Section 40 (I doubt that he exists) when my daughter phoned Peckham Police Station to request a visit from the police doctor and he told her up she quoted code CAD 670 when we attended the Rhounatology Clinic at Jup the following day 13/1/03 the doctor would know what to do. He said all hospital consultants and C.P.s had been alerted to this code. Of course when we told the doctor this she wondered what on earth we were talking about. She phoned Peckham police Station and was told CAD 670 was our serial no and they would not confirm our report of events. at this time my daughter, who is physically disabled and already has quite a lot- to contend with medically, was feeling unwell and on the journey to hospital by ambulance, could not bear the sur in her eyes and could not open her eyes fully. The Rheumatology Clinic

could not help us and we were transferred to the A & E at ist. Thomas'. The doctor tried to look into her eyes but when he whome a light into her eyes whe suffered a servere seizure.

Now the situation is serious, Own E. P. Dr. Section 40 is arranging appointments for us both to see an eye specialist but we need to know what we are dealing with. Its there any danger of radiation in the eyes and if so how do we deal with it?

There is obviously a web of conspiracy and lies and whilst we realise that some matters must remain covert to prevent public paric, we have, unfortunally, become involved and our health is at stake. It would be morally wrong to deny what took place and repuse to give doctors the correct quidelines on the kind of treatment we may need.



First, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, MOD does not attempt to identify the precise nature of each reported sighting. We believe it is possible that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. We could not justify expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond our specific defence remit.

With regard to your particular sighting, Section 40 contacted the Police who confirmed that they had sent two officers to see you at around 03:15, but they were unable to see anything. We received no other reports from the London area. Enquiries with our air defence experts has confirmed that there is no evidence to suggest that unauthorised military activity, or any other activity of air defence interest, occurred on the 10 January. Finally, I should wish to assure you that the integrity of the UK's airspace in peacetime is maintained through continuous policing of the UK Air Policing Area by the Royal Air Force and we remain vigilant for any potential military threat.

I hope you can help me with my enquiry. This regards two sightings of unidentifiable flying craft, I live in Exeter close to Exeter Airport. On Monday September the 30th just after 22:00hrs a craft flew from the west in an easterly direction through the sky over my area, Whipton. I have been in contact with Exeter Airport, Air traffic control and they were not in any contact with any plane at the times stated, which is strange because this craft was not high enough to have been out of their range. This was no plane or helicopter as it displayed no warning system, and had two neon blue lights at the rear, and after some research I have found no aircraft that share this lighting pattern.

The second sighting was from my house again on Thursday October the 3rd from 20:20 to 20:23, this was visible for a short period of time as you can see. This craft approached my area again from the same direction as the other craft and once again flying East. Again Exeter air traffic control were not in contact with any planes or helicopters at the times stated. I could see no warning light systems or furthest point markers like on planes and helicopters. All that was visible was one ball of red glowing light. Which in the time I lost sight of it over my roof top and going to the front window it was no longer visible.

I know this is a strange question but as my local Airport cannot help me identify these craft or even acknowledge them I hope you can give me an answer. Have you had any similar questions or reports? Do you know of anything on your records that could shed some light on the situation? Was it tracked on any other radars?

I very much appreciate your time and effort and if you can answer any of my questions I would be most grateful.


The machine cut-off my message within five seconds hence this letter.

I will copy this letter to my District Controller and Section 40 and would be very grateful if your department, should it decide whether or not to follow-up this report, will advise us accordingly.


