I am writing with reference to your letter of 21st January addressed to my colleague Section 40 regarding your daughter's telephone call to this office on the 10th January. It may help if I clarify matters.

I spoke to your daughter at approximately 09.10 on the 10th January when she told me she had seen lights in the sky in the early hours of that morning. She described the lights as formed in the shape of a worm, wriggling around in the sky and then described events similar to those in your letter. Your daughter told me you telephoned Peckham Police and that they had sent Policemen and people dressed in "space suits" with dark glasses to visit you. She was particularly concerned as to who these people might be.

As Section 40 Informed you, the only interest the Ministry of Defence has in sightings of unusual lights or objects seen in the sky is whether they present any evidence that UK airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Following your daughter's call, I made enquiries with our air defence experts, who confirmed there had been no events of air defence concern. I also spoke to Peckham Police who confirmed that they had sent Policemen to visit you.

With regard to the people in "forensic boiler suits" as mentioned in your letter, I should inform you that Ministry of Defence investigations do not go beyond those described above and we do not send anyone to visit people who report sightings to us. I am sorry to hear that you are experiencing problems with your eyes, but I can assure you that these events were not instigated by the Ministry of Defence and we were unaware of them until your daughter's telephone call. If you have any enquiries about the Police handling of your telephone calls these should be directed to Peckham Police.

I hope this is helpful.

We are in receipt of your letter dated 16th Jan '03 and I reply on behalf of my daughter Section 40 r myself.

First of all I would like to point out that neither my daughter nor myself have any interest in flying sourcers, UFO'S or the like and only informed Peckham Police Station Vecause what we saw, by pure chance, was so unusual. We did not ask the police to come to our house as we did not feel threatened or frightened. It was their suggestion to come.

We do not doubt your integrity in the way you maintain air defence in the U.K. and we did not ask you to investigate anything on our behalf, as your letter implies.

you also state in your letter that two officers called on us at approx 3-15 am. This is incorrect. Two officers called on 9/1/03 at approx 2:15 am, the same two officers came back at approx 3:15 am, this time diessed in white forensic boiler suits and black anti uv binocular glasses and they were accompanied by two other police offices in normal police uniforms. They told us they had made a definite confirmed sighting and advised us not to look at the object through binoculars as we had been doing. They asked us if we would like to see a Police Doctor or use a solution to bathe our eyes, although our eyes were Smarting and watery we did not think we needed to see a

We have since learned that Mork & Mindy was a T.V. programme about aliens, your men have fed us with a lot of uubbish, presumably to make us look foolish and our story unbelievable, which they have isucceeded in doing. The cruellest play of all came from a P. C. Section 40 (I doubt that he exists) when my daughter phoned Peckham Police Station to request a visit from the police doctor and he told her up she quoted code CAD 670 when we attended the Rhounatology Clinic at Jup the following day 13/1/03 the doctor would know what to do. He said all hospital consultants and C.P.s had been alerted to this code. Of course when we told the doctor this she wondered what on earth we were talking about. She phoned Peckham police Station and was told CAD 670 was our serial no and they would not confirm our report of events. at this time my daughter, who is physically disabled and already has quite a lot- to contend with medically, was feeling unwell and on the journey to hospital by ambulance, could not bear the sur in her eyes and could not open her eyes fully. The Rheumatology Clinic

could not help us and we were transferred to the A & E at ist. Thomas'. The doctor tried to look into her eyes but when he whome a light into her eyes whe suffered a servere seizure.

Now the situation is serious, Own E. P. Dr. Section 40 is arranging appointments for us both to see an eye specialist but we need to know what we are dealing with. Its there any danger of radiation in the eyes and if so how do we deal with it?

There is obviously a web of conspiracy and lies and whilst we realise that some matters must remain covert to prevent public paric, we have, unfortunally, become involved and our health is at stake. It would be morally wrong to deny what took place and repuse to give doctors the correct guidelines on the kind of treatment we may need.



I am writing with reference to your report of a sighting of an 'unidentified flying object' on 19 December 2002, the details of which were left on the DAS(LA) Ops & Pol 1 answerphone. This office is the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence relating to 'unidentified flying objects'.

First, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, MOD does not attempt to identify the precise nature of each reported sighting. We believe it is possible that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. We could not justify expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond our specific defence remit.

With regard to your particular observation, I have looked back through our sighting report files and can confirm that we received no other reports of 'UFO' sightings for 19 December from Surrey. We are satisfied that there is no corroborating evidence to suggest that the United Kingdom's airspace was breached by unauthorised air activity.
