What could it be? UFO's? The night was totally still, and slightly hazy, and the orange flickering lights were bright. I didn't hear any sound at all. They stayed in the same formation for the several minutes I was watching them. They were fairly evenly spaced.

Would you know where I could report these, if it isn't military? Would you know what it could be?

Also, about a year ago, I did see one very strange object in the sky, at night, darting around - I thought it was a star, but unlike the stars, it was zig-zagging around, and darting around at enormous speed. Definitely not a helicopter - far too fast, and the movement was too sharp. Most definitely not a plane (as I know it). It zoomed off and disappeared into the sky - further from the Earth, I presume. Very strange indeed. I'm afraid I can't give an exact date for that one.

I would be interested to hear if you know of anything which was in the skies last night.

Dear Sirs,

After reading in the press, other witness reports, of what I saw last night, I thought I'd report it to you too. I was in my garden photographing stars with a new lens I took delivery of yesterday when I saw the following - sadly I didn't consider photographing what I saw as I just dismissed the lights as helicopters, at first. I did turn my lens towards them and focus upon them with maximum magnification but could see nothing other than the lights themselves, i.e. I could not see any aircraft, balloon or any other structure - just the lights and since it would have meant setting my camera up for photographing them, I couldn't be bothered as they were not static and would have posed a bit of a challenge to capture.

13/8

At approximately 10:45pm I was in my garden and saw what initially appeared to be two helicopters flying north in parallel to my house, in Houghton Le Spring. They were probably no higher than 1 - 2 thousand feet and were moving very slowly and were no more than a mile or so away from my home. It then became apparent to me that there was no engine sound from them, which was odd. I had assumed they were helicopters since their flight was slow, erratic, changing direction, suddenly slowing and stopping, reversing direction slightly, then moving on. Both were heading in the same direction and strangely both emulated each others manoeuvres, almost exactly, as if they were linked by something, but they were at least half a mile apart.

The sky was mostly clear with light, thin, scattered cloud cover and for about five minutes they moved slowly north. They were east of my home and heading towards Sunderland. The light from each was a single constant light source, reddish orange in colour, bright, with no evidence of flashing or any other lights. After a few moments they started to climb upwards as the lights became smaller and one entered cloud cover, a few moments later the other also disappeared behind cloud. A few moments later I was able to see one of these through thinning cloud and it appears that it had gained height substantially as it was very small, at that point.

I was puzzled by this and dismissed it as weather balloons being released by somebody, or a joke being played upon the population of Houghton le Spring. However, they were very bright light sources and would have required a considerable battery to power them, with that degree of battery weight, it would have to be a very serious balloon that could lift such a battery, so not real 'prankster' tactics or budget, I think. Plus it was clear that they were not hot air balloons as there was no propane gas flame visible or audible to keep them climbing. They were not Microlight aircraft as there was no noise and their flight was too erratic. They reminded me of flares, but they didn't issue any smoke, didn't descend, but climbed and didn't flicker as a flare would, plus they lasted for a very long time. They were constant, of the same brightness and moved in a sort of synchronised manner. If I were to compare the brightness of the lights with something I'd say they were like the very bright lights you see on police helicopters, when not directly viewed but looked at from the side, so it was very bright, but there was no directional or focused beam emanating from the light.

With the exception of some kind of helium filled balloons, which were not visible, would have to be pretty big (and so would have been visible, I cannot think of anything that could describe what I saw. And so think to myself that this was 2 objects that I'd classify as UFOs - though I have never seen anything like this.

Please note that I am not a crank, ufo hunter, or believer in ufos - though I do believe that the universe will be teaming with life. I just don't believe that any sane creature would travel the enormity of space, the universe, etc, to visit Houghton le spring and Sunderland - they're not exactly the hub of the universe, if you know what I mean... and I'm sure there are much more interesting places to visit.

So, were they a sophisticated prank? Not sure, but I note from the local press that this is the second time this has happened in under a week...







I am writing this letter to you in the hope that you may be able to assist me in the identification of a very unusual aerial object seen by my daughter and I last night.

(Tuesday 7th August)

Please allow me to explain?

We had been in our rear garden last night, waiting to catch a glimpse of the space station as it passed briefly overhead travelling roughly east to west, and if possible record video footage of the said object.

As predicted the space station came into view at 21.45, and I managed to film it for about twenty seconds.

I was very pleased with the result, and therefore decided to watch the sky for a little while longer, this decision was aided by the fact that we had seen one or two meteorites/

shooting stars, which were also nice to watch.

At around 23.00hrs I had gone back inside to make a cup of coffee, but as I emerged from the kitchen, my daughter draw my attention to a strange triangular object which had

from the kitchen, my daughter drew my attention to a strange triangular object which had passed directly over our home. I noted the time as 23.07hrs

The object was moving 70 degrees east north east, to 230 degrees south south west. object was an elongated triangular shaped with rounded corners, and sort of a satin finish charcoal grey colour.

At a guess, I would estimate the object to be around fifteen feet across, and twenty feet long. It was absolutely silent, very low in the sky, and moving quite fast.

I would estimate its elevation to have been very close to forty feet from the ground, or the height of a well grown tree.

I calculated this latter measurement, because of the fact that we were able to see the reflections of street lighting on the objects underside.

Watching the sky is a particular interest of mine, and I am aware of the flight, paths used by commercial airlines in my locale, and although I am not an expert by any means, I am familiar with lighting patterns and shape of commercial aircraft flying at night. The object I saw didn't fit into any aircraft pattern I know of.

I understand fully the fact that your time is taken up primarily with your duties, but I would be very appreciative of any help or explanation you may be able to offer me as regards solving this mystery! Or if the object had appeared on radar or anything!
