Dear Sirs,

After reading in the press, other witness reports, of what I saw last night, I thought I'd report it to you too. I was in my garden photographing stars with a new lens I took delivery of yesterday when I saw the following - sadly I didn't consider photographing what I saw as I just dismissed the lights as helicopters, at first. I did turn my lens towards them and focus upon them with maximum magnification but could see nothing other than the lights themselves, i.e. I could not see any aircraft, balloon or any other structure - just the lights and since it would have meant setting my camera up for photographing them, I couldn't be bothered as they were not static and would have posed a bit of a challenge to capture.

13/8

At approximately 10:45pm I was in my garden and saw what initially appeared to be two helicopters flying north in parallel to my house, in Houghton Le Spring. They were probably no higher than 1 - 2 thousand feet and were moving very slowly and were no more than a mile or so away from my home. It then became apparent to me that there was no engine sound from them, which was odd. I had assumed they were helicopters since their flight was slow, erratic, changing direction, suddenly slowing and stopping, reversing direction slightly, then moving on. Both were heading in the same direction and strangely both emulated each others manoeuvres, almost exactly, as if they were linked by something, but they were at least half a mile apart.

The sky was mostly clear with light, thin, scattered cloud cover and for about five minutes they moved slowly north. They were east of my home and heading towards Sunderland. The light from each was a single constant light source, reddish orange in colour, bright, with no evidence of flashing or any other lights. After a few moments they started to climb upwards as the lights became smaller and one entered cloud cover, a few moments later the other also disappeared behind cloud. A few moments later I was able to see one of these through thinning cloud and it appears that it had gained height substantially as it was very small, at that point.

I was puzzled by this and dismissed it as weather balloons being released by somebody, or a joke being played upon the population of Houghton le Spring. However, they were very bright light sources and would have required a considerable battery to power them, with that degree of battery weight, it would have to be a very serious balloon that could lift such a battery, so not real 'prankster' tactics or budget, I think. Plus it was clear that they were not hot air balloons as there was no propane gas flame visible or audible to keep them climbing. They were not Microlight aircraft as there was no noise and their flight was too erratic. They reminded me of flares, but they didn't issue any smoke, didn't descend, but climbed and didn't flicker as a flare would, plus they lasted for a very long time. They were constant, of the same brightness and moved in a sort of synchronised manner. If I were to compare the brightness of the lights with something I'd say they were like the very bright lights you see on police helicopters, when not directly viewed but looked at from the side, so it was very bright, but there was no directional or focused beam emanating from the light.
