Thank you for your prompt reply and for addressing my questions; specifically the MoD appears to not consider UAPs a threat to national security unless an external 'military' source can be evidenced, your responses were indeed helpful.

You indicated that it would be helpful for me to identify where I got the 95% statistic from, you mentioned that you have heard this statistic in the media and on the Internet and I can confirm that this is indeed where I was drawing the statistics from, as I believed it was common knowledge. I have not been privy to any form of statistical analysis from the MoD themselves and would therefore apologies if my questions led you to believe otherwise. However, you state with a degree of certainty that based on experience this figure would appear to be reasonably accurate so I would ask that of the 5% that may have been investigated by the MoD, is there any instances of similarity between them and my own account and, if so, would there be any evidence of misidentified 'military' craft that appear so unusual as to provoke wild claims but which may have a distinctly terrestrial source?

With regard to my second question, you asked if the sighting mentioned in my initial email was hypothetical. May I take this opportunity to state that this was an actual sighting witnessed by myself and my son in July/August 2005 in East Kilbride, Glasgow, Scotland. I did consider this sighting highly unusual and given the nature of the craft, metallic and able to hover against the wind, I assumed, maybe incorrectly, that it was military in nature although there was absolutely no sound of engines or any other form of propulsion. I was unable to capture any evidence of the craft such as photographs, although I am a reasonably intelligent person I was able to reproduce a model of the craft with 3D modelling software, and should such an image be helpful in identification I can, if required, forward you a copy of the image.

Since the sighting I had conducted my own rudimentary investigation, querying blimp and balloon suppliers in the UK, however in conclusion I was overwhelmingly left with the impression by these businesses that noiseless blimps are not capable of hovering un-tethered in the wind, although only 2 out of 3 of the suppliers I contacted responded to my queries.

Given the above account I'm not sure as to whether I should consider the incident a threat, and given that the MoD may not be able to control the behaviour of this and other similar types of unknown craft it may be prudent to consider it a threat and it is from this point of view I was initially seeking clarification from the MoD.

Firstly, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace

Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external military source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

It would be helpful if you would identify where the statistic that "95% of sightings are mundane misidentifications" came from. Although I have seen this statistic mentioned in the media and on the internet, I am unaware of any MoD survey or statistical analysis that came to this conclusion. It would however, be reasonable to state, albeit based on experience rather than statistical analysis, that something in the region of 95% of UFO sightings reported to the MoD are simply never investigated and therefore no conclusions can be drawn from them.

Turning to your second question regarding (I assume a hypothetical?) sighting of a "metallic UAP" some 500ft in the air with associated missing time and memories of strange beings, is that given the above policy, it is not necessarily the MoD's function to investigate the matter or, indeed, to make any conclusion as to whether it was a threat to the individual that saw it.

Finally, you asked what specifically would constitute a threat to UK national security from a UAP. It is not possible to provide you with an all encompassing definition of what constitutes a threat to national security from a UAP. If we were to investigate an incident, it would have to be judged on a case by case basis.

I am sorry I could not be more helpful.



Thank you for your Freedom of Information request of 29 July 2008 asking for details of UFO sightings in Co Tyrone for the period 1958-2008. Additionally, you asked whether the MoD had a specific department or set of experts on UFOs.

The MoD holds some 150 files on the subject of UFOs covering the period 1987 to the present day. Accurately answering your question regarding UFO sightings would involve manually checking them, the cost of which would far exceed the £600 limit set for compliance with the Freedom of Information Act and, as provided by Section 12 of the Act, the Ministry of Defence is not obliged to comply with your request.

That having been said, details of UFO sightings reported to the MoD for the period 1997-2007 are available via our website <a href="www.mod.uk">www.mod.uk</a> by searching under "UFO reports" and this may provide you with much of the information you request.

You may also wish to know that MoD files were routinely destroyed after five years until 1967 when they were generally preserved for The National Archives. A few have survived before 1967 and these together with records up to 1987 are now available for public viewing. The National Archives can be contacted at Ruskin Avenue, Richmond, Kew, Surrey TW9 4DU or telephone, 020 8876 3444. The National Archives also have a website giving information about the records they hold and how to access them. This can be found on the internet at: <a href="http://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk">http://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk</a>. Further, the MoD has recently started a 3 year programme to transfer files covering the period 1979-2007 to The National Archives where they will be available for viewing on their website. The Ministry of Defence Freedom of Information website also contains some released information on UFOs. This can be accessed the internet at: <a href="https://www.mod.uk">www.mod.uk</a>, by searching under UFO reports.

The Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorized foreign military activity.

Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external military source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

To describe the MoD as having a department that deals with UFOs is rather misleading as I suspect it gives the impression of a large organisation within the MoD dedicated to research into UFO matters and extra-terrestrials. There are only two posts within the MoD (including mine) that are dedicated to UFO matters. Although the overwhelming majority of the UFO work in these two posts involves (and has for decades) answering correspondence from the public or recording sightings reported to the MoD, we do on occasion investigate reports. This usually involves liaising with air defence specialists (e.g. radar specialists) on perhaps half a dozen reports per year. These will generally be

rightings made by aircrew, members of the armed forces or the police. We do not do field investigations.

You have asked if the MoD has experts on UFO matters. We have a great many specialists on air defence and scientific matters who can be consulted if we decide to investigate a UFO report. However, whilst incumbents of the two posts to which I referred will by default gain a level of knowledge on the subject of UFOs and Ufology, "UFO expert" is a term I would wish to avoid. We have no official definition for the term and to use it in any but the loosest manner might be to overstate our position.
