Thank you for your recent Freedom of Information request asking whether, as reported in a number of articles, nine of the UFO files due for transfer to The National Archives had never been passed to the "UFO Desk".

I have not seen the articles you refer to and therefore cannot comment on them. However, the release of UFO files covers those held by two separate branches; DAS and DIS. Each branch holds its own set of files and, quite naturally, neither branch deals with the others files. Neither DAS, nor DIS, have any idea where the stated figure of nine files comes from.



Thank you for your Freedom of Information request of 10 June 2008 asking for details of any MoD classified or unclassified investigations into UFOs in the UK to date. Additionally, you asked for details on the incident that occurred in March 1993.

The MoD holds records relating to UFOs on some 160 files covering a period of over quarter of a century. Searching through 160 files would far exceed the permitted £600 limit set for compliance with the Freedom of Information Act and as provided by Section 12 of the Act, the Ministry of Defence is not obliged to comply with your request. If you could narrow the scope of your request to a particular incident or issue, I may be able to help.

However, you may be interested to know that UFO files for 1967 to 1987, and any files prior to 1967 which have survived, are now available for examination at The National Archives, Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DU, Telephone: 0208 876 3444. Details of how to access these records and The National Archives on line catalogue can be found on their website at www.nationalarchives.gov.uk. The MoD will be transferring the 160 UFO files from the Directorate of Air Staff and Defence Intelligence Staff to The National Archives as part of a three year programme. Those files covering the period 1979-92 will be released during 2008, 1993-2000 in 2009 and those from 2001 onwards will be transferred in 2010.

The MoD holds documents which I can release to you immediately on what has become known as the Cosford incident which occurred in March 1993. If this is the 1993 incident you were referring to I can forward you a copy on disk or a printed version. Please confirm this is the incident you were referring to and the format you want to receive the information in.

"Joint Services Publication 551 – Military Flight Safety Regulations Volume 1: Flight Safety, Section 200, Occurrence Reporting" covers incidents that may occur during flying and provides guidance on reporting. However, the emphasis is on flight safety and it does not specifically mention UFOs.



Thank you for your Freedom of Information request of 4 November 2008 asking for copies of all information regarding the alleged UFO incident at Rendlesham Forrest in 1980.

Answering your request would involve manually checking, as a minimum, some 100 DAS files, and then preparing relevant documents for release, the cost of which would exceed far the £600 limit set for compliance with the Freedom of Information Act and, as provided by Section 12 of the Act, the Ministry of Defence is not obliged to comply with your request.

Whilst it is not possible to quantify without undertaking a major administrative exercise, my experience would suggest that the overwhelming majority of documents mentioning the Rendlesham incident are requests for information or correspondence from members of the public such as yourself, which may not provide you with the information you are looking for. However, the MoD has a file on this incident, that was created sometime after the incident and which is currently being prepared for release to The National Archives as part of a programme to transfer 160 MOD files on UFO matters. The MoD had previously placed the file on its own website, but has had to remove this for copyright reasons. If you would like a copy of our file on Rendlesham, please let me know whether you can accept a PDF copy on disk or a paper copy, together with your address and I will forward it to you. I am afraid that due to the size of the file, I am unable to e-mail it to you.

You may wish to be aware that the MOD has already released a great deal of information about UFOs which is available for public viewing. MOD files were routinely destroyed after five years until 1967 when they were generally preserved for The National Archives. A few have survived before 1967 and these together with records up to 1992 are now available for public viewing. The National Archives can be contacted at Ruskin Avenue, Richmond, Kew, Surrey TW9 4DU or telephone, 020 8876 3444. The National Archives also have a website giving information about the records they hold and how to access them. Thank you for your Freedom of Information request of 2 November 2008 asking for details on the Rendlesham Incident. I enclose a copy of our file on the subject in paper format, in line with your e-mail of 4 November 2008.

Some personal information such as names, addresses and telephone numbers has been withheld under exemption s.40 (Personal Information) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. The file is a compilation file comprised of documents that were removed from their original file and placed on this file. This would account for the non sequential enclosure numbering. Although the file cover states the file was opened on 25 October 1982, it is clear that this was not the case. Sec(AS) was not in being at this time, only being formed in early 1985 and therefore no file with a reference number commencing with D/Sec(AS) could have been in existence in 1982. No record of when the file was created can be found.



Thank you for your Freedom of Information request of 26 September 2008 asking for details on the Rendlesham Incident. I enclose a copy of our file on the subject in CD format, in line with your e-mail of 15 October 2008. Additionally, you asked for base schematics for RAF Woodbridge and RAF Bentwaters.

Some personal information such as names, addresses and telephone numbers has been withheld under exemption s.40 (Personal Information) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. The file is a compilation file comprised of documents that were removed from their original file and placed on this file. This would account for the non sequential enclosure numbering. Although the file cover states the file was opened on 25 October 1982, it is clear that this was not the case. Sec(AS) was not in being at this time, only being formed in early 1985 and therefore no file with a reference number commencing with D/Sec(AS) could have been in existence in 1982. No record of when the file was created can be found.

Turning to your request for schematics for both sites, I am afraid there are only slim pickings but I enclose a map of each site. You will notice that a small amount of information in the key of the Bentwaters map has been withheld. Again these are names of individuals. I am informed that the MoD gave a set of photographs of the various buildings at both bases to the Duxford Imperial War Museum who can be contacted on <a href="http://duxford.iwm.org.uk/">http://duxford.iwm.org.uk/</a>. It may also be worth contacting the relevant local council planning departments to see if they can assist.







Thank you for your freedom of Information request of 3 November 2008. I will deal with your request for information on UFOs for the period 1950-2007. The non UFO related material will be dealt with by colleagues in another branch who will write to you separately.

You may be interested to know that the MoD has commenced a programme to release some 160 UFO and UFO related files to the National Archive. The files from the Directorate of Air Staff and the Defence Intelligence Staff will cover the period from the late 1970s to 2007. The files themselves will be released in accordance with the same principles that the MoD applies when it releases information for Freedom of Information requests such as yours. The files will be released in chronological order and the programme is likely to take some three years to complete. To date some 24 files have been released. Therefore, as provided by exemption s.22 (information intended for future publication) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 the MOD is not obliged to comply with this part of your request.

This is not the end of the matter, of course; section 22 is a qualified exemption, meaning that the MOD must assess the balance of public interest in release of the information.

Whilst there is undoubtedly public interest in this information being released to the public as it will enable them to have a more informed view of the MoD's role in the UFO phenomena, there is no overriding reason why the public should have the information immediately. It is part of effective administration of government that the publication of information is planned and managed within the department responsible. Copies of UFO photographs will be of great interest to researchers and writers and, by placing the information requested in The National Archives, all interested parties will have access to the same information at the same time, which ensures no one has any particular advantage over their competitors.

That having been said, you may wish to be aware that the MOD has already released a great deal of information about UFOs which is available for public viewing. Thank you for your e-mails of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2008. You raised a number of questions and I will try to answer them.

Firstly, you asked why the MoD would not send you the information you requested. As I explained in my response of 31 October 2008, providing you with the information you asked for would exceed £600. The Freedom of Information Act allows government departments to make an estimate of how much work it will take to answer a Freedom of Information request and, if it exceeds three working days, which equates to £600, it is not required to provide the information requested. I apologise for not making this clear.

To put your request in some context, you asked for all the information the MoD had on UFOs. This equates to some 160 files, each of which needs to be checked for personal information such as names and addresses before they can be released. Additionally, we must check for other sensitive information that would be covered by the exemptions contained within the Freedom of Information Act. This is an extremely time consuming process and on average it would cost more than £600 to prepare a single file for release. Releasing all 160 would be a task that would take years, rather than days.

That having been said, as I explained in my e-mail, the MoD has established a programme to release these files. 

Section 40 has responded to my reply to his FOI stating amongst other things that he does not understand why his request was refused. Although his e-mails are somewhat difficult to absorb, I have treated his 2<sup>nd</sup> Nov e-mail as a request for formal review.

Can you confirm you are content with my draft response below?



Thank you for your e-mails of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2008. You raised a number of questions and I will try to answer them.

Firstly, you asked why the MoD would not send you the information you requested. As I explained in my response of 31 October 2008, providing you with the information you asked for would exceed £600. The Freedom of Information Act allows government departments to make an estimate of how much work it will take to answer a Freedom of Information request and, if it exceeds three working days, which equates to £600, it is not required to provide the information requested. I apologise for not making this clear.

To put your request in some context, you asked for all the information the MoD had on UFOs. This equates to some 160 files, each of which needs to be checked for personal information such as names and addresses before they can be released. Additionally, we must check for other sensitive information that would be covered by the exemptions contained within the Freedom of Information Act. This is an extremely time consuming process and on average it would cost more than £600 to prepare a single file for release. Releasing all 160 would be a task that would take years, rather than days.

That having been said, as I explained in my e-mail, the MoD has established a programme to release


