
British Foreign Office Files on Ukraine and Ukrainians 1917-1948

with supplementary files from The War Office, The Cabinet Office and The Empire Marketing Board

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Introduction

The discovery of a large collection of British government files on Ukraine and Ukrainians at the Public Record Office (PRO) was accidental. I was hired to locate documents about the 1932-33 famine in Ukraine (published as *The Foreign Office and the Famine: British Documents on Ukraine and the Great Famine of 1932-1933*, edited by Marco Carynnyk, Lubomyr Y. Luciuk and Bohdan S. Kordan. Kingston, Ontario: Limestone Press, 1988.) While searching for these documents, I came to realize that there were many more on Ukrainian questions, and persuaded the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies to sponsor this research project.

After viewing as many as 25,000 files of documents, totalling several hundred thousand pages, I selected slightly more than 2,000 files numbering about 15,000 pages for photocopying and deposit at the University of Alberta. This was done so that students there could get a head start in researching PRO documents without the expense of travelling to Britain.

Since this report is a finding aid for researchers, the headnotes and summaries of documents have been reproduced without change from the original docket sheets. Consequently, the spelling of personal names and toponyms reflects British usage of the period (Kiev or Kieff, not Kyiv; Roumania, not Romania, etc.). The reader will also encounter variant forms (e.g., Charkoff, Harkov, Kharkof, and Kharkov for Kharkiv; Petrouchevytch, Petroushevytsh, and Petrushewytsch for Petrushevych), misspellings and inconsistencies of usage. Some documents, especially those in the Confidential Print series (see p. viii below), lack official headnotes. In such cases, headnotes have been supplied in brackets by the compiler of this report.

The files and the Author Index

The vast majority of the 2,138 selected files are from the Foreign Office archive, while only fifty-six are from the War Office, fourteen from the Empire Marketing Board, and one from the Cabinet Office. While a Foreign Office file might contain more than one document, a War Office and Empire Marketing Board file normally contains only one document, except for one selected War Office file that includes 147 documents.

Following the file summaries in this catalogue, there is an Author Index to the files that includes more than four hundred names. Most of the authors were members of the British political establishment, including some well-known names from the Foreign Office, a few Prime Ministers, about fifty Members of Parliament, two dozen military officers, and a number of leading British academics. Most of the other authors were Ukrainian political personalities from Ukraine, Canada and the United States.

The Author Index includes only authors of documents that initiated files. As each file may contain more than one document, there are many more authors of documents than those listed in the index. For example, ninety-seven files initiated by dispatches or telegrams from the British Minister to Poland, Sir W.G. Max-Muller, were selected. Much of his correspondence consisted of prefaces to reports by members of his staff, the British Military Attaché in Poland, British Counsellors in Warsaw, Lviv (Lwów) or Boryslav (Borysław), and by Polish or Ukrainian politicians.

As the catalogue was entered on a database computer programme, this project has also created an electronic database. As additional files are added to this database, it will become the ultimate guide to the documents available at the PRO concerning Ukraine and Ukrainians.

A rough breakdown of the Author Index shows who initiated files:

more than 500 files by government offices in London; 180 files by the Foreign Office in London; more than 100 files by other government ministries; 99 files by questions in Parliament;

more than 150 files by intelligence and military services;

about 1,300 files by dispatches and telegrams from British embassies, legations, consulates, and League of Nations:

The remaining files (some 300) were initiated by correspondence sent directly to the Foreign Office by private organizations and individuals. About seventy files were initiated by the Ukrainian Bureau in London. Approximately fifty files were started by petitions sent by Ukrainian organizations and individuals in Europe and North America. Many files were initiated by correspondence from the Union of Democratic Control, the League of Nations Union, the Jewish Joint Foreign Committee, the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, etc.

More than half of the files selected were initiated by correspondence from British diplomatic missions, such as embassies, legations and consulates. If the head of the mission is an ambassador, then the mission is an embassy. Otherwise it is a legation, and the head's title will be Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, usually abbreviated as Minister. The title Chargé d'Affaires is generally used for a temporary head of mission in the absence of the permanent head. It may also be used on a permanent basis for a minor mission.

A Consul is a representative to a particular province, district or colony of a state. A Consul-General is the senior Consul in a district to which a number of Consuls, as well as Vice-Consuls, may be assigned. All the Consuls in a particular state work under the direction of the head of their diplomatic mission.

Documents sent by British diplomats from Russia/USSR

In tsarist Russia, the British Government had an embassy in St. Petersburg and consulates dotting the vast expanse of the Empire. In tsarist Ukraine and intermittently in 1917-20, there was a consulate-general in Odessa and vice-consulates in Kharkov (Kharkiv), Kieff (Kiev), Kherson, Mariupol (Mariiupil), and Nicolaieff (Mykolaiv). In Poland during the inter-war years there was an embassy and consulate-general in Warsaw, as well as vice-consulates in Lwów (Lviv) and Borysław (Boryslav). During the revolutionary period of 1917-20, the British embassy in Bucharest and consulate in Jassy proved to be good observation posts for reporting on Ukraine.

The selected files show that in 1917-18 the Foreign Office, British diplomats and agents worked hard to convince emerging political parties and governments in Ukraine to maintain the Eastern Front. Files have been found that show how much money the British Cabinet allocated for Ukraine and how much of it was actually spent. For this purpose, the Foreign Office sent Major J.K. Fitzwilliams to dispense the funds, while J. Picton Bagge became the official British representative to the Ukrainian Central Rada. Their reports provide some of the most interesting eyewitness accounts of the Rada and the Bolshevik occupation of Kiev. The reports of the British Vice-Consul in Kiev, J.F. Douglas, are of some value, as are the reports from the British General Consul in Odessa (J. Picton Bagge before January 1918 and J. Lowdon intermittently from 1918 to 1920). Sadly, I was able to locate very few of the reports from the Vice-Consul in Kharkiv, Charles Blackey, the general manager of Sadet Ltd.

British allies often shared their reports. The government of the Netherlands provided the Foreign Office with the account of its Consul in Kiev, Fokker, concerning the Hetman and Directory Governments. (J.J. den Butter was kind

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enough to provide me with additional material on Fokker, as well as his manuscript on Ukraine's diplomatic service in the Netherlands and Belgium (J.J. den Butter, "De Oekrainse Vertegenwoordinging in Nederland en Belgie, 1919-1922," Utrecht, November 1989).

A large number of files selected deal with the British and French Governments' massive financial and military support for General Anton Denikin and the Poles, as well as their denial of the same to the Ukrainian Republican forces. The selected War Office files of the British Military Mission to South Russia (DENMISS), especially the reports written by its officers in Odessa, complement many of the Foreign Office files on this subject. The DENMISS reports on the Russian Volunteer Army's negotiations with the Western Ukrainian Military Command are unique.

The files on British Military Missions to Romania and Denikin (1919) contain intelligence reports on the political and military situation in Ukraine. This information was used to advise the War Office in London and General Denikin. A few of these files were found and selected. After completing this project, however, I discovered an excellent collection of weekly intelligence reports on the situation in Ukraine during part of 1919. I could not copy these documents because the project funds had been spent.

In an attempt to gain the support of the Allies, the Directory dispatched countless diplomatic missions in 1919. One Foreign Office file refers to the Ukrainian diplomatic missions as the most active in Europe and question whether Germany or the Bolsheviks were secretly paying for this activity. The Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean Fleet and British High Commissioner in Constantinople, Admiral J.M. deRobeck, ordered a raid on the Ukrainian diplomatic mission to Turkey. Some of the original documents have been selected, including copies of "Ukrainian passports."

As World War I, the revolution and the civil war came to an end, Foreign Office files on Ukraine were initiated by dispatches and telegrams from the heads of the diplomatic missions to the Soviet Union (Table 1) and to Poland (Table 2). Although officially there were no diplomatic relations between Britain and Soviet Russia in 1921-23, unofficially they were kept up by the British Commercial Mission to Russia. Its reports on Ukraine, especially one concerning a meeting with Khristian Rakovsky, then head of the Ukrainian Soviet Government, show that Ukraine had begun to develop independent economic relations with Britain. After the formation of the USSR in 1922, all these independent initiatives, including the formation of a British-Ukrainian Bank and other companies in London, came to an end.

Also important were the numerous secret reports produced by British intelligence agencies (see SIS, DMI, and DNI in the Author Index). Almost all the twenty-two selected SIS (Secret Intelligence Service) and MI6 reports cover the period from December 1921 to July 1923.

In summary, the remainder of the selected files sent by British diplomats from the Soviet Union focus on a wide range of issues. The largest selection concerns agricultural problems, specifically the famines of 1921, 1933 and 1947 in Ukraine. The number of selected files on the 1932-33 agricultural crisis in the USSR and the concurrent famine is very extensive, as this question is still little understood, and the information available at the PRO has seldom been used in academic studies. Particular care was taken to select reports by the best experts on Soviet agriculture in that period, the German agricultural attaché in Moscow, Otto Schiller, and the British-employed Canadian agricultural consultant Andrew Cairns. (For further information, see CIUS Press Research Report no. 35: Andrew Cairns, *The Soviet Famine*, 1932-33: An Eyewitness Account of Conditions in the Spring and Summer of 1932, ed. Tony Kuz.) A selected file shows that Cairns was once again involved with the agricultural crisis in Ukraine in 1946-47, this time as a leading UNRRA official shipping food relief to Ukraine.

Another large group of selected files from the Soviet section of the Foreign Office concerns the question of diplomatic recognition of the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic in the period 1943-47. Frank Roberts, the Minister in Moscow, visited Kiev to discuss the matter. As the selected files show, Clement Attlee's Cabinet decided in 1947 to establish diplomatic relations with Ukraine, and the King signed the appropriate statement. This initiative came to nothing, as the Soviet government did not accept the recognition.

Documents sent by British diplomats from Poland

A very large proportion of the selected files comes from the Polish Section of the Foreign Office. The files begin following the Armistice in 1918 with excellent reports by the British Military Mission to Poland (POLMISS) on the political and military situation in Eastern Galicia. Their reports were especially used by the Political Intelligence Department (PID) of the Foreign Office, which existed during World War One and until 1920, and again during World War Two. Its purpose was to monitor countries in which diplomatic representation was no longer possible because of war.

The selected PID files provide the best analysis of the Polish-Ukrainian war of 1919. Lewis Namier, later to become a leading British historian, wrote most of these analytical reports. The best selected document on the Polish-Ukrainian conflict was penned by the historian J. Headlam-Morley, who also worked in PID.

Among the many documents on Jewish-Ukrainian relations which were selected from the Polish and Soviet sections, the most interesting one is on the pogrom in Lviv in November 1918. Some historians claim it was perpetrated by the Western Ukrainian Army. Files selected showed that British government reports and investigations, as well as those by Jewish organizations and others, concluded it was done by Polish military units.

The best reports came consistently from Poland, where British representatives and agents had relatively easy access to information. More than four hundred files were selected from the despatches of just four heads of the diplomatic mission to Poland in the inter-war years (see Table 2) and from Consul Savery, who was the Foreign Office's most prolific writer on Ukrainian questions. Frank Savery headed the Consulate-General in Warsaw from July 1919 to September 1939. Also of merit are the selected files with reports by the British Vice-Consuls in the cities of Lwów (Lviv) and Borysław (Boryslav). In Lviv, the Vice-Consul was J.J. Whitehead from 1920, followed by B. Taylor in 1929, and G. Middleton from April 1939 until the Nazi-Soviet occupation of Poland.

A large majority of the selected files on Poland concern the political instability of Eastern Poland. All available documents on the military pacification carried out in Western Ukraine in 1931 and the political uproar that followed it were selected, including the large number of protests in the West, especially those produced by members of the British Parliament and by organizations such as the League of Nations Union and the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. The League of Nations became the international forum for this campaign, in which petitions by British MPs and Ukrainian deputies from Poland condemned the Polish government for its policies in Eastern Poland.

In Britain the main lobbyist for this campaign was the Ukrainian Bureau and its Bulletin. Among the many MPs who signed numerous petitions of protest and made interventions in Parliament, the most active was Lieutenant-Colonel C.L'E. Malone, who also headed a political lobby group, the Anglo-Ukrainian Committee. On this question and others. a number of lobby groups represented various political persuasions, including supporters of Hetman Skoropadsky, the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists, the former Government of the Ukrainian People's Republic, and the former Government of the Western Ukrainian People's Republic, led by Ievhen Petrushevych. The most prolific writer of petitions was Petrushevych. Although many of his rather long petitions were selected because of the detailed information they present, many more are available in the files.

I also tried to select as many documents on the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists (OUN) as possible. Among many important documents selected on the OUN was the 211-page English translation of the prosecutor's indictment of Stepan Bandera and others for the assassination of Bronisław Pieracki, the Polish Minister of the Interior, in 1934. From the post-World War II Polish files, especially noteworthy were the eyewitness accounts of what happened to Ukrainians remaining in Stalinist Poland, as well as to the OUN and its military wing.

Documents on Carpatho-Ukraine and post-World War II repatriation

The third largest group of selected files concerns the 1938-39 crisis in Czechoslovakia, with the focus on Carpatho-Ukraine. This involved searching the files not only of the Foreign Office Czechoslovak section, but also the sections on Germany and Hungary, as well as Poland, Romania and the Soviet Union.

The fourth and final large group of selected files focuses on post-World War II repatriation from Western Europe. There was an attempt to focus on the repatriation of the 30,000 Soviet citizens who were held in POW camps in Britain, but this was abandoned, as the subject was outside the brief of this project. I concentrated instead on selecting files that show how the Soviet authorities, including Stalin, tried to persuade the British government to hand over the 10,000-strong 1st Ukrainian Division (formerly the Waffen-SS Division Galizien). A file of 147 documents was selected concerning the internment of the Division in POW camps in the United Kingdom in 1948.

The selected War Office, Cabinet Office and Empire Marketing Board files supplement the Foreign Office files. The selected files of the British Military Missions to South Russia, Romania and Poland provide details of events in 1919. This is also true of the post-World War II AFHQ and POW Department documents on the 1st Ukrainian Division.

The selected Empire Marketing Board documents focus on their employee Andrew Cairns, the Canadian agricultural specialist. These include his diary of prices throughout the USSR in 1932. The one Cabinet Office document refers to the Cabinet called meeting to discuss relations with the Soviet Union in light of the Metro-Vickers' affair. The famine of 1933 was also mentioned on that occasion.

Criteria for the selection of files

As the research into PRO documents on Ukraine and Ukrainians was a pioneering study, it was impossible to select files for photocopying on the basis of preconceived criteria. Because of the large number of files, it was only possible to view most of them once, and a decision had to be the made then and there on whether a given file should be selected. In some cases these were regrettable decisions, as better documents on the same subject appeared later. Also, many excellent documents were not selected, including those for the period 1948-60, because the funds allocated for the project were exhausted owing to the increase of photocopying charges during the second half of the project.

In the process of viewing files, certain principles of selection developed. In order of importance, the selected material may be divided into the following categories:

- 1. eyewitness accounts of events in Ukraine;
- interviews with prominent individuals concerning Ukraine; for example, there are interviews with Symon Petliura, Metropolitan Andrei Sheptytsky, Khristian Rakovsky, and many other individuals prominent in Ukrainian history;
- 3. reports by military intelligence, secret agents, etc.;
- 4. FO minutes, memoranda and research papers;
- 5. views and decisions taken by members of the FO and Ministers of State
- 6. how the FO prepared answers to Parliamentary Questions;
- 7. petitions, especially to the League of Nations, which contained interesting details and facts;
- 8. correspondence from individuals and organizations;
- 9. bulletins published by the Ukrainian Bureau in London, 1931-39.

The FO archives contain a large number of bulletins issued by various Ukrainian organizations, the photocopying of which alone would have consumed the entire budget for the project. An attempt was made to photocopy select issues of some bulletins, as well as many of the bulletins published by the Ukrainian Bureau in London, whose specific aim was to lobby the British political establishment.

The documents were selected with a view to providing enough materials for students to begin writing scholarly papers on a number of topics:

- 1. British intervention in the revolution in Ukraine;
- 2. Britain's role in the creation of nation-states in Eastern Europe, with the focus on the Curzon Line;
- 3. the Ukrainian problem as a cause of political instability in inter-war Poland;
- 4. the Polish Government's pacification of Western Ukraine and the role of the League of Nations;
- 5. the Ukrainian Catholic and Polish Orthodox churches;
- the famines of 1921, 1933 and 1947 in Ukraine, with an in-depth study of the 1932-33 agricultural crisis in the Soviet Union:
- 7. the 1938-39 Czechoslovak crisis and Carpatho-Ukraine;
- 8. post-World War II repatriation, with the focus on the 1st Ukrainian Division;
- lobbying by Ukrainian organizations, especially those from Canada, which had the greatest effect on the British Government:
- 10. how Britain, then a world power, dealt with the Ukrainian national liberation movement.

British scholarship has made very little use of this huge archive on Ukraine and Ukrainians at the PRO. This is mainly due to the fact that Ukrainian studies have only begun to develop in British academic institutions. However, a number of leading British academics were engaged by the Foreign Office to produce papers on various aspects of the Ukrainian question. Besides the already mentioned L. Namier and J. Headlam-Morley, they were B.H. Sumner, F.B. Bourdillon, C.A. Macartney, and the grand historian of civilizations, Arnold Toynbee. If it were not for the needs of the Foreign Office, there would have been an almost total absence of research on Ukrainian subjects by established academics in Britain.

The Northern and Central Departments of the Foreign Office

Almost all of the selected Foreign Office files are drawn from the group classes FO 371 and FO 417-18, which represent the correspondence of the political departments. During the years 1917-48, the nature of these departments and the states they observed was continually changing. The selected files were found mainly in the archives on five states (Soviet Union, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Romania, and Germany). Files on these states had to be searched for documents on Ukrainian questions, as there was no sovereign Ukrainian state with which to establish diplomatic relations.

Throughout World War I and its aftermath, until 1920, the FO dealt with all the countries of Europe through a single institution, the War Department (prefix W). During 1920, Eastern (E), Central (C), Western (W) and Northern Departments (N) developed out of the War Department, which was dissolved on 7 October 1920. The Soviet Union (or Russia, as it was officially designated in the FO until 1927) was assigned to the Northern Department, as were Poland, the Baltic States and Scandinavia, and Afghanistan after 1924. A Central Department was created to include the sections on Germany, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Austria and Hungary, Italy, Albania, Yugoslavia and Greece.

In 1933, there was a major organizational change to reflect the new situation in Europe and Germany's threat to the UK. Poland was moved from the Northern to the Central Department. A new Southern Department (prefix R) emerged, including, among others, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Italy, and the Balkan states. In March 1938, the Czechoslovak section was moved back to the Central Department. In 1945, the Polish section once again moved to the Northern Department.

The outbreak of World War II brought about another major change in the internal structure of the Foreign Office. Most of the country sections of Europe came under the Central Department, except for the Soviet Union, which remained in the Northern Department.

In 1939, the Political Intelligence Department was resurrected and given the task of preparing the widely distributed *Weekly Political Intelligence Summaries*. Background political research was done by the Foreign Research Press Service (FRPS), which was housed at Oxford and administered by the Royal Institute of International Affairs (RIIA) under a grant from the Foreign Office. In 1943, FRPS and PID were combined under the name of the Foreign Office Research Department (FORD) and integrated with the Economic and Reconstruction Department.

In 1942, post-war aims, planning and questions relating to war crimes were transferred from the Central Department

to the newly created Economic and Reconstruction Department (prefix U). The Refugee Department (prefix WR) was formed to deal with refugees.

In 1945, four separate departments were formed from the Economic and Reconstruction Department: Economic Relations (UE); Reconstruction (U); Relief (UR); and Prisoners of War (KW). (Note that files for this study were not selected from any of these departments. Foreign Office files in this collection were selected from only the following departments: Central, Northern, Southern, Refugees, PID and Historical Research.)

The selected FO 417 and FO 418 series of documents are part of the so-called the Confidential Print, i.e., single documents chosen by Foreign Office staff from the files of the FO 371 series to be printed and circulated within the Foreign Office, Cabinet and other government departments. The FO 417 series refers to Poland and the FO 418 series to the Soviet Union. Approximately 100 of these documents were selected for this report.

In retrospect, these FO 417-18 documents probably should not have been copied. Although they are identical to those in the FO 371 series, they are not accompanied by the written comments of Foreign Office officials or by other documents that may have gone into FO 371 files. However, the advantage of FO 417-18 documents is that they are printed compactly and can be easily scanned and inexpensively photocopied, while FO 371 files have a cover sheet, a docket sheet, and accompanying materials.

I tried to avoid photocopying the same document twice (once in the FO 371 series and once in the FO 417-18 series), although this occasionally happened. However, I tried to photocopy only the top pages of FO 371 files for each FO 417-18 document whenever these pages contained interesting comments by Foreign Office officials.

The FO 373 series documents were produced by the Historical Section of the Foreign Office, which was established during World War I. Four documents (booklets) on Ukraine, Galicia, Bukovyna and Ruthenia were selected from this section.

Not selected, except for cover pages, were FO 371 files fully reproduced in *Anglo-American Perspectives on the Ukrainian Question*, 1938-51: A Documentary Collection, edited by Lubomyr Y. Luciuk and Bohdan S. Kordan (Kingston, Ontario: Limestone Press, 1987).

While the number of War Office files is astronomical, there are no indexes to them. Even the class lists (e.g., class lists for WO 158 or WO 204) provide minimal information about file contents. The WO files, unlike FO files, seem to have been carelessly thrown together, most of them without even a registry number.

The Foreign Office hierarchy

The head of the Foreign Office is a Cabinet member with the title of Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs (SSFA). There were thirteen SSFAs during the period for which documents were selected (see Table 3).

To assist the SSFA's work in Parliament, there was a Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State, and in some years there were two Under-Secretaries. At times between the wars, some foreign affairs functions, such as the League of Nations, were assigned to a non-departmental Minister, the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

The hierarchy of the permanent Foreign Office staff changed slightly during the years 1917-48. There were eight Permanent Under-Secretaries, as follows:

Subordinate to the Permanent Under-Secretary were the Assistant Under-Secretaries, who supervised the various departments that made up the Foreign Office. The heads of the political departments formed another layer of management. Before 1919, the department heads were called Senior Clerks, then Assistant Secretaries, and later Counsellors.

Before 1920, the professional staff within a department was divided into three grades of Clerks: Assistant Clerk and two junior grades. After 1920, the Clerks were renamed to conform to the grades in the Diplomatic Service, with which the Foreign Office was amalgamated. The Assistant to the Senior Clerk was called the First Secretary, while the junior clerks were renamed Second and Third Secretaries. Table 5 lists the heads of the Foreign Office departments relevant to this study.

Registration of documents in the Foreign Office

In 1920 the FO adopted a new registration system whose aim was to consolidate papers on a particular subject for an entire year, with the registry number of the first paper serving as the file number. The full registration number of a file would have four elements (e.g., the file N 976/33/38):

- 1) the designation of the FO department (i.e., N for Northern)
- 2) paper number (i.e., 976)
- 3) file number (i.e., 33)
- 4) index number (i.e., 38 for Russia, Soviet Union from 1927).

At the PRO, the FO files produced until the end of 1938 are kept in volumes. Each volume is identified by year, country, and file number of the first and last files in the volume. From 1939, each file is kept and listed individually, with a title for each file of documents. Each volume of files or file has a specific Piece Number. When this Piece Number, for example, 5407, is added to the Political Department Class Group, FO 371, the volume identification number is complete (FO 371/5407).

To obtain a file at the PRO, one must have the Class, Group and Piece Number (i.e., FO 371/5407). To find it, one must know the file's registry number (i.e., N 976/33/38). The researcher must first consult the annual FO subject indexes for a paper and file number and country designation (i.e., in the 1920 subject index under General Petlyura, the registry number is N 976/33/38). The registry number is used to obtain the Piece Number by checking the annual lists of FO political correspondence under department (e.g., N), country (e.g., Russia), and locating the file number (e.g., 33) and paper number (e.g., 976), which in turn corresponds to the Piece Number (e.g., 5407) in an adjoining column. The researcher then goes to a computer terminal and enters the Class, Group and Piece Number (e.g., FO 371/5407). Within an hour or so, an electronic pager in the PRO will announce that the volume is ready for viewing.

The listing of FO 371 files in this report

The layout of information in this catalogue is illustrated in Figure 1. The data for each file are taken from the file's cover sheet or docket sheet, as illustrated in Figure 2.

The first file listed in the catalogue shows in boldface the date of the file's receipt at the Foreign Office (April 10, 1917), its Registry Number (W 74243/74243/38), and the Group Piece Number (FO 371/3009). In the right-hand column, the first entry lists the sender and recipient of the file's initiating document (Spring-Rice to Balfour), its point of origin (Washington), and the date of dispatch (April 9, 1917). (The Author Index gives brief biographical notes on Spring-Rice and Balfour.) Beneath these two columns is the title and summary of the file as written by an official of the section dealing with the relevant country, in this case, the Russian section of the War Department.

Finally, all the FO 371 files listed in this report are organized by year, department and country section; the listing within each section is chronological. The sole exception to this rule is the listing of War Department documents for the years 1917-20, where the files for all country sections are simply listed in chronological order.
